### PURCHASES LIFE SAVING DEVICE

The Red Cross has purchased a lungmotor and installed it at fire headquarters at the city hall, for the resuscitation of cases of apparent drowning, electric shock, asphyxia at birth and from gas, smoke, fumes, strangulation and other uses by physicians. The city firemen are custodians of the apparatus.

In its use, the first instruction of the manufacturer is "send for the nearest physician." The appliance requires adjustments to apply to the age of the subject and the operator must understand it. It is one of the most successful lungmotors manufactured and was adopted and used by the Government in the war service by both the army and navy. It is automatic in measuring the oxygen delivered, and will be the means of saving lives in Bingham county.

It is now in readiness for emergencies, and the fire department will assist in getting it to a case and in its use within the city limits when called; telephone 52. The manner of conveying it to outlying districts has not been determined.
