


ARMS AT DISARMAMENT CONFERENCE

RED CROSS AIDS RUSSIA

Washington—Medical supplies, one of the greatest needs in the famine stricken and disease-ravaged provinces of Soviet Russia, which are being contributed by the American Red Cross and distributed by the American Relief Administration are being shipped in increasing quantities from the European stock of the Red Cross and from the United States. By the end of the year American Red Cross supplies valued at more than \$1,750,000 will have been sent into Soviet Russia to alleviate general distress. Advances just received at National Headquarters indicate the prevalence of typhus fever and the danger of its becoming wide-spread during the regorous Russian winter. Diseases resulting from mal-nutrition are also general.
