



MOORE TALKS RELIEF PLANS WITH FARMERS

Many farmers from Canyon and adjoining counties attended a conference at the state house recently with business men of this section, which resulted in laying the foundation for a big, broad, constructive agricultural policy for Idaho. Charles C. Moore, governor-elect, and Miles Cannon, state commissioner of agriculture addressed the meeting. Governor Moore said:

"I am pleased indeed to have the opportunity of addressing this meeting today, and to speak a few words to you, as one farmer to another."

"I have farmed in Idaho for a quarter of a century, and have prospered when the agricultural industry prospered, and have taken my losses with the rest since the times have been hard."

"My interests and your interests are one, and I come to you on a common ground, and speak from a common standpoint."

"Idaho is a state of varied resources and industries. We have rich mines, large timbered areas—in fact, the largest stand of white pine in the world is in Idaho—we have railroads, and manufacturing industries. But the basic interest of the people of this state is production, and without production we can never hope to prosper or even to live. All of our other resources might be taken away and Idaho could still continue to exist; but take away our agricultural interests—and when I speak of "agriculture" I mean not only the production of grains, vegetables and fruits, but also livestock—take away our agricultural production, and you destroy the very essence of life."

"But strange to say, in spite of the fact that agriculture is the very foundation of our commercial and industrial life, it seems that those who till the soil are always the first to suffer and the last to be recognized. This was illustrated during the late war, by the sudden rise in the price of commodities, farm machinery, wages, freight rates, etc., and since the war, during the period of reconstruction, although railroads, packers, stockmen and others have been recognized, and put back on more nearly a pre-war basis, the farmers are still carrying the burden."

"One of the principal parts of the farming industry that has been improved, and must in my judgment be still further improved is in the grading and in the marketing of our products and in the getting of them to their markets in such condition as to demand the best prices. Much has been accomplished in that direction in Idaho in the past few years through the efforts of our governor and through the cooperation with the

farmers, but much still remains to be done. I know at the present time the efforts of the Agricultural Department of our state we can now sell a car of grain on our home tracks in eastern Idaho, have the car inspected, attach the bill of lading and receive our cash before the grain has left the yard. But it is not yet as satisfactory and as much has not yet been accomplished as should be. Idaho potatoes today are at a premium in Chicago and other eastern cities. There are but few places if any, where desirable varieties of potatoes can be produced equal to Idaho. But we must contend for better marketing conditions. In this, of course, we have to face the problem of national or federal grading as well as that of the state. And I wish to say that I am firmly convinced that we would not receive the real value for Idaho products and the grading of those commodities will not have the recognition that it should have until the federal and the state get together and cooperate. It is only then that there will be equal results or as nearly equal as possible from federal and from state passing upon these products."

"There are now in operation in representing a total investment, including buildings, machinery and stock, of something over seven hundred million dollars. But with our large resources this number should be more than doubled, and it is the duty of the citizens of Idaho to cooperate in promoting this industry."

"The Golden West beckons many from the crowded east, and there is room for many in the Gem state. But homeseekers are attracted only to those states which are prosperous and avoid those where industrial conditions are unsatisfactory."

"One of our greatest problems is the very great increase in freight rates during the past few years; especially when it is taken in connection with our remoteness from the principal markets of the country; which makes it impossible for us to compete with other productions points."

"As I have suggested on various occasions during the past few months, at least a partial solution of this problem may be found in limiting our shipments of the cheap and heavy commodities, and substituting therefore more compact and valuable products."

"The soil and climatic conditions of Idaho make this state particularly well adapted to the production of fruit, poultry, seeds and dairy products. Our possibilities in these productions, both as to quality and quantity, are practically unlimited; and these commodities alone are capable of increasing our income considerably during the next few years."

"And the poultry and dairy industry, in turn, would afford a home market for the cheaper and heavier commodities, such as hay and grain, which of recent years have been so unprofitable to the producer on account of the excessive freight rates."

"Through the efforts of the present Governor of this state and with the cooperation of the producers, a start has been made and results are already being shown in the increasing of dairy herds and dairy products."

"It is my hope and desire that this work may be continued and that outside capital may be interested, in cooperation with our bankers of the state, and that the farmers will see more clearly the necessity of such increased production, to the end that

there may be a continuous daily revenue rather than a dependence on the annual crop.

"If Idaho is to assume the position that she deserves there must be fewer saddles and chaps, more milk pails and cream separators, more hog pastures and more up-to-date dairy production."

"I believe, while watching and favoring the development of mines, timber, railroads, manufacturing and other industries, that now is the one opportunity in the history of Idaho's development to really make it what it should be—the greatest dairy state of the union."

"These suggestions are offered for the consideration of the convention with the assurance that the incoming administration desires to cooperate in every way possible with the development of the agricultural resources of Idaho well knowing as I have stated in the beginning that agricultural prosperity is the foundation of every other prosperity."

"When crops are good and the farmer can market them to advantage times are good; and on the contrary when the farmer has hard work to make both ends meet as has been the case in late years times are hard and there is an economic depression in all lines of business."

"It is well to hold these meetings, and we should urge our Public Utilities Commission to help agricultural Idaho and to earnestly present her case to the Interstate Commerce Commission. We realize that a proper presentation of true facts and conditions can alone demand serious attention or action from the Interstate Commerce body, and that to present these facts and conditions effectively we must have not only the united effort of the producers of Idaho but must also have a united effort from all of the Intermountain states."

"I hope that the agricultural men of this state will continue to counsel together in the solution of their problems, keeping in mind that there must be a unity of demand and action on their part. May you get together untiedly and recommend and support such legislation as will bring about the desired results."
