New York, Sept. 22. The California team will have a special car from the Jersey City depot, in which the trophy won in the international contest will be displayed, the Soldier of Marathon occupying the post of honor in the center of the car.

Newark, N. J., Sept. 24. General McClellan, in acknowledging the official notification of his nomination for Governor of New Jersey, says: Not being a native of New Jersey, although a citizen and resident of the State for the last 14 years, I recognize with all the more pride the great honor conferred on me by so large a portion of the citizens of my adopted State.

St. Louis, Sept. 24. A special from Leavenworth says: A private letter received at Fort Ellis gives an account of a fight between a number of cattle thieves and a party of pursuers in Cheyenne county, Kansas, some days ago. It seems large numbers of cattle have been stolen during the past summer, and it was finally determined by the herders and owners to put a stop to it, and make an example of them.

San Francisco, Sept. 25. Something over a year ago the Savage Mining Company brought suit against the Sutro Tunnel Company to rescind a certain agreement made, by which the tunnel claims to have a lien on the Savage, and to compel the former to execute a release of the agreement.

London, Sept. 24. General Grant was to-day met at the Sunderland railroad station by the Mayor and Messrs. Goarby and Burt, members of Parliament. The day was observed as almost a general holiday. Nearly 10,000 members of trade and friendly societies marched in procession.

PARIS, Sept. 24. Notwithstanding Saturday's decision against Gambetta, at Paris, confirming the judgment against him in default, it is thought he still has at his command, appeals and delays enough to carry him beyond the elections before final sentence, so that he can claim as a Deputy, immunity from arrest.

BUCHAREST, Sept. 24. The weather for the past two days has been extremely bad at Fratsesti, which is now a sea of mud. Hospital accommodations exist for 15,000 wounded, but 7,000 are accumulated there.
