SCRAPS OF OREGON HISTORY.

In 1792 Captain Gray, of Boston, com-  
manded the ship Columbia, discovered  
and ascended the river named after the  
latter. This discovery formed the basis  
for the subsequent claim of the United  
States to an acquisition of the territory  
now embraced in Oregon.

In 1804-5 Captains Lewis and Clark  
crossed the Rocky Mountains and de-  
scended the Columbia river to the Pacific.  
Their official report first made the great  
resources of that part of the Pacific coast  
known.

In 1810 the first house was built in  
Oregon by Capt. Winship, another New  
England sea-farer. In 1811 John Jacob  
Astor, of New York, established a trad-  
ing post at the mouth of the Columbia  
river, which was named Astoria, in his  
honor. The venture proved disastrous,  
mainly in consequence of the war between  
the United States and Great Britain in  
1812. The British took possession of the  
post in 1813, and called it Fort George.  
Subsequently it became the property of  
the Hudson Bay Company, and it re-  
mained in their possession until 1848.

The Northwest Fur Company disputed  
for a time the rule of the latter company  
on the Pacific coast, but had to succumb  
in a few years, and was absorbed by its  
rival in 1824; from which time, till 1848,  
the latter ruled supreme in the valleys of  
Columbia and Willamette.

In 1824 the first fruit trees were  
planted in Oregon, and in 1831 the first  
attempt at farming was made by some of  
the retired servants of the Hudson Bay  
Company. In 1842 the first school was  
opened. Between 1834 and 1837 mis-  
sionaries of various denominations arrived  
bringing the first cattle with them. In  
1833 the first printing press arrived in  
Oregon. In 1841 Commodore Wilkes  
visited the Columbia on an exploring ex-  
pedition at the instance of the American  
Government.

From 1816 to 1846 the American and  
British Governments held Oregon by  
joint occupancy, under a formal treaty.  
Yet up to 1843 the inhabitants of Oregon  
did not enjoy the benefit of any form of  
civil government whatever; but in the  
year last named the first steps were taken  
toward the organization of a provisional  
government, which was formally ac-  
cepted by the people at a general election  
held in 1845.

General Hardee was one of the martinets  
of the Southern Army, the very model  
of a "villie moustache," immaculate in  
dress, soldierly in bearing and a great  
disciplinarian. On one occasion he was  
sent to Arkansas to deal with some very

one day near camp came upon a soldier  
who was sitting down under a tree, had  
taken his gun apart, and was cleaning it  
diligently. As the General approached  
he looked up, but neither rose nor saluted,  
and presently went on rubbing and  
singing as he worked. The General  
pulled up, intent on reproving a breach  
of military etiquette.

"Do you know who I am, sir?" he  
asked, sternly.

"No, I don't know, and I don't care  
—," said the soldier. "Sorter general,  
ain't yer?"

"I am the General in command, sir;  
that's what I am," said Hardee.  
The soldier got up, stuck his hands on  
his hips, cocked his felt hat impudently  
over his eyes, and said: "Well, I said  
yer was a sorter general, didn't I? And  
if you'll hold on till I get my gun together  
and loaded, I'll give you a sorter salute."
