LIVE STOCK MISCELLANY.

The more an animal is exposed, the greater share of his food goes to keep up bodily heat.

Flesh can be easily worried off of an animal, and it is just as well, therefore, to stop worrying either one's self or their cattle.

The main thing is to take good care of your stock, and then there will be no cause to inquire what is the best medicine for them.

When animals are first put up to fat-ten they should be fed cautiously as there is danger that more food may be given at once than their digestive organs can manage.

At the late London Christmas market, cattle to the value of \$650,000 changed hands on the guess work plan—a plan by which English producers are undoubtedly robbed by the acute dealers.

Wyoming stock raisers have paid more attention to hay raising the past season than ever before. Many ranchmen have sown alfalfa and timothy together, and claim that they do better so than when sown separately, as the timothy holds the alfalfa up from the ground, and the latter holds the moisture, so necessary for the perfection of the timothy.

Judge Kregel, in the United States District Court at Kansas City, rendered an important decision. The case was one in which Chas. B. Hudson had shipped 378 steers from Bennington, Kansas, with orders to have them in the Kansas City stock yards the next day in time for the markets. The Union Pacific railroad guaranteed to do this, but failed to comply with the contract, and the cattle were sold next day, when the market was dull, at a loss of \$756. Hudson sued, and recovered the money with costs and expenses.

THE WORLD'S DEEPEST WELLS.

The deepest well drilled in the United States is that of George Westinghouse, at Homeward, near the city of Pittsburgh, which on December, 1, 1886, had reached a depth of 4,618 feet, when the tools were lost and drilling ceased. The Buchanan farm well of the Niagra Oil Company, drilled by Frederick Crocker, in Hopewell township, Washington county, is 4,303 feet deep. The Rush well of the Niagra Oil Company in Washington county was abandoned at 3,300 feet. The deep well of Jonathan Watson, near Titusville, was drilled to a depth of 2,600. J. M. Guffey & Co.'s well on the Wals farm at West Newton, Westmoreland county, was drilled about 3,500 feet. The well of Isaac Willets at Sargent's Mills, near Sycamore, in Green county, was abandoned at 3,008 feet.

The deepest bore hole in Europe is at Schladebach, near Kotschau Station, on the railway between Corbetta and Leipzig, and was undertaken by the Prussian Government in search for coal. The apparatus used is a diamond drill, down the hollow shaft of which water is forced, rising again to the surface outside the shaft of the drill and inside the tube in which the drill works. By this method cores of about fifty feet in length have been obtained. The average length bored in twenty-four hours is from twenty to thirty-three feet, but under favorable circumstances as much as one hundred and eighty feet have been bored in that time.

THE AMERICAN CUP.

Probabilities of a Contest for it this Year.

An English yachtsman arrived in New York in February stated that the owners of the cutter Thistle are building two steel center-board sloops of large size at Henderson's yard on the Clyde. The yachts are to measure at least ninety feet on the water line. Their designing has been kept a profound secret, but it is supposed that Watson, who designed the Thistle, is also responsible for the lines of the new yachts.

Speaking of the possibility of an international race this year, a member of one of the prominent clubs, says: "I believe the talk about Jamison building a cutter and the objection to the deed of gift, was all a scheme to gain time. They have seen the clause in the new deed, which says the American Cup Committee may waive the ten months' time limit, if they wish to accept a challenge, and it is my opinion they intend to take all the advantage possible of that clause, by sending on a challenge in a few days, perhaps in March, giving dimensions of one of their yachts. If they do this we should yet have one hundred days to produce a yacht of similar dimensions and probably better design—say by July 1st—and I think they feel sure we should waive the time limit and pick up the gauntlet. There is no reason why we should not accept if the challenge comes before March 15."

Many other yachtsmen were of the opinion that if a bona fide challenge were to be received within a few days it would be accepted promptly.
