An agricultural society with \$300,000 capital has been organized at Modesto.

Sierra Leader: James Black of Beckworth ate his dinner, last Wednesday and went into his yard and fell dead. Heart spasm was no doubt the cause.

Mrs. Betsy Wixom, one of San Bernardino's oldest citizens, died last Monday. She was born in New York State in April, 1811, and came to San Bernardino in 1852.

M. C. Gordon, night telegraph operator in Gold Run, was stabbed in the back and on the arm last Saturday evening by C. H. Mellor. The wounds are not considered fatal.

A Mission Indian known to be over 110 years old, and who came to San Diego across the plains as one of General Fremont's party, died in San Diego on the 5th of old age.

Says the Albuquerque Citizen: A Mormon boy was sick of pneumonia and it was suggested that the skin of a cat skinned alive contained medical properties that would cure. Hence the cat was secured and the Mormon skinned her alive and placed the skin on the boy's chest, where it remained until it stunk like a polecat. But the boy died all the same. This happened in St. Johns last month.

STATE NEWS.

There is \$305,044 in the State School Fund in the State Treasury.

The Eureka Con. Company expects to start up their two furnaces about the middle of next month.

Governor Stevenson has appointed Alex Wilson as a Notary Public, to reside in Ely, White Pine county.

In balloting for the location of the World's Fair, Bartine, of Nevada, cast his first and second votes for Washington after which he voted for Chicago every time.

The ore reduction works at Reno were destroyed by fire. The original cost of the plant was \$75,000, insured for \$10,000. The destruction of the works is a serious loss to Reno.

The Reno and Virginia City Public Building Bills, appropriating \$75,000 for each city, passed the Senate yesterday, and will now have to run the gauntlet of the House.

Reno Gazette: John Baptiste; the fellow who has already served seven months in the State Prison for selling whisky to Indians; was again arrested last night for the same offense.

The Silver State says Dan Le Barron, just in from the Jackson Creek country, says he saw lots of dead cattle and only a few live ones on Jungo desert. There is a band of horses on the desert that seem to have stood the Winter well, but he did not see a live last Spring's colt or calf on the way in. Every animal on range under a year old is dead.

The Virginia Chronicle says: "At Mc Kinney's, Lake Tahoe, the snowfall last week was 11 feet, making for the season 596 inches, nearly 49 feet. Rain, 11 inches. The lake has raised 24 inches. The snow is 14 feet on the level. It has done considerable damage to the wharf and also to the buildings.

Messrs Ford and Meritt of Eureka county drove 14,000 head of sheep into Nye county to graze, and the Assessor pounced on them. They were afterwards assessed in Eureka county. The Supreme Court has just decided that the Nye county Assessor exceeded his authority. Judgment for the appellants, and order of District Court reversed.—Carson Appeal.

A Remarkable Dam.

A remarkable dam is about to be constructed by a water company at the San Mateo canyon, four miles from San Mateo, Cal., in order to form a reservoir. The canyon is very narrow and steep, and fifteen feet below the bottom is a solid rock, on which the foundation of the dam will rest. The structure will be 170 feet high, 175 wide at the base, 20 feet at the top and 700 feet in length. It will be the largest stone dam ever known to have been built. The dyke will have a curvature of 80 feet, and the convex side will be up stream. The material will be a new sort of concrete composed of stone. The walls will be perfectly smooth. The reservoir that will be formed by it and the adjacent hills will be about eight miles in length and 150 feet deep at the deepest places. Its capacity will be about 32,000,000,000 gallons. The water will be conveyed by tunnels to the city of San Francisco.—Chicago Journal.
