**STATE EXHIBITS.**  
 One of the Most Interesting Features of the World's Fair.

To an American one of the most interesting features of the world's fair of 1893, as it was also of the centennial exhibition of 1876, will be the exhibit made of the respective states of the union. Every state is likely to make an appropriation to set forth its own peculiar products, and most of the states will be represented by special buildings or pavilions, each of which will in its construction and in its contents be characteristic of the state which erects it.

At the centennial exhibition, says the Youth's Companion, thirty-seven states were represented in one way or another, for though Colorado was admitted to the union in 1876, and is therefore called the centennial state, it was not admitted in season to place it among the states which were represented at Philadelphia.

At the world's fair of 1893 at Chicago at least forty-four states will be represented; perhaps the number will be larger.

There is so much diversity among the states that no two pavilions and no two exhibits need be alike if each is thoroughly characteristic of the state. Though Massachusetts and Connecticut, Indiana and Illinois, Oregon and Washington lie side by side there is in each case a considerable difference in many respects one from the other—a sufficient difference to be distinctly reflected in an exhibit.

In respect to products and outward features the difference between distant states, as, for instance, between California and Vermont or between Florida and Montana, is as great as the difference between England and Egypt, between Europe and Africa.

It is this diversity of outward features and products, joined with an essential likeness of the people, which constitutes the peculiar strength of the American union.

We have, in a sense, the world within our borders. In such a land and with a people undivided in their allegiance to a single flag patriotism seems indeed a sentiment easily acquired.

**SHELLS FOR GAMES.**  
 Those which are reserved for the purpose.

For cameo cutting various kinds of shells are used. There are the bull's mouth (Cassis Rufa), which has a red inner coat, or what is known as a sardonyx ground; the black helmet (Cassis Madagascariensis), which also has a so-called onyx ground, and which shows up white on a dark claret color; the horned helmet (Cassis cornuta), white on an orange yellow ground, and the queen conch (Strombus gigas), with a pink ground. The best shells, says the Jewelers' Weekly, are about ten inches long, with a cross-section aperture and an extremely broad lip rounded above.

The bull's mouth and the black helmet are the best shells, for the horned helmet is apt to separate from the ground, or to "double," as the French workmen express it. The queen conch seldom has the two colors distinctly marked from each other, and the pink of the ground fades on exposure to light. The red color of the bull's mouth extends but a short distance within the mouth of the shell, and becomes paler as it proceeds inward; hence this shell affords only a single cameo, large enough for a brooch and several small pieces for shirt studs, while the black helmet furnishes on an average about five brooches and several stud pieces. The queen conch yields only a single piece.

Cassis flammula, which is about six inches long, C. decussata and C. tuberosa, which are white upon a dark claret color, are also occasionally used. The bull's mouth shells are derived from India and Ceylon, and the black helmets and queen conches from the West Indies.

Snipe shooting on an Irish bog is an excellent test of a gunner's skill and enthusiasm. In "Forty-five Years of Sport," Mr. Coballis says that he was out shooting with Lord Gormanstown, who weighed two hundred and thirty pounds, and his agent, weighing two hundred and ten, when they came to a wave of the sea.

Suddenly Lord Gormanstown put his feet on a tuft of grass, and down he went up to his armpits. The agent shook with laughter which so disturbed the bog he stood on that it gave way and let him in up to his armpits.

A man was sent to the nearest house, a mile away, for a rope and the two heavy men, after remaining in the bog for three-quarters of an hour, were hauled out.

An experienced bog-shooter, if he finds himself going down, throws himself flat on his side or back, and at the same time throws his gun to his attendant, generally an unskilled "grasson," who rarely fails to do it.

The sensation of being tugged is very unpleasant, but if a man throws himself on his side or back, there is strength enough in the peat to support him.

One Irish snipe shooter, Mr. Foster, Dublin, was so cool that he had been known, when bogged and going down, to kill a bird with his right barrel, another with his left, and then throw his gun to a friend to catch.

Plenty of Money in London.

The superabundance of money awaiting safe investment in London was well put in evidence a few days ago when the chancellor of the exchequer invited tenders for £1,000,000 of treasury bills. Applications for ten times that amount were at once sent in, and the chancellor was able to get the money he wanted at the lowest terms ever secured for an English loan—namely, 3 1/2 per cent. At the same time, the bump of caution has been largely developed in the English investor by his calamitous experiences with gaseous South American securities, and it is the universal testimony that shaly enterprises never found it so hard to get backing in the London market. Financiers there as here have no confidence in the future, and propose to be found ready for a financial storm if one comes.
