Governor Colcord has named March 22, 1894, as Nevada Day at the Midwinter Fair, in commemoration of the day that Abraham Lincoln appointed Senator James W. Nye, Governor of the then new State of Nevada.

Only the best singers will be chosen to come, about 150 being the number expected, which will comprise practically the same vocalists who were in attendance at the World's Fair.

Midwinter Fair Rates.

A circular has been issued by the passenger department of the Southern Pacific company relating to a reduction in passenger rates to San Francisco during the continuance of the Midwinter Fair. Rates to San Francisco and return during the holding of the Midwinter exposition, from Portland, Oregon, Ogden, Utah, and El Paso, Texas, including intermediate stations and stations on local lines Southern Pacific company, Pacific system, will be half fare, or one way rate for round trip with \$2 added, from all stations located over 300 miles from San Francisco. Entrance ticket coupons to the fair grounds will be sold with the railroad special tickets, five coupons to each ticket. The return portions of these special tickets will be limited to a stay in San Francisco of ten days.

The Railroad Company seems determined that people shall not see much of San Francisco, nor spend much money there. If the managers want people to come to the Fair they should see to it that the ten day limit is set aside; otherwise thousands of people will refrain from visiting San Francisco this winter.

FERGUSON DISTRICT.

Ed. Prudenthal was in town Monday and left for Pahranagat Wednesday.

Golden ought to have a postoffice. It is directly on the line and one could easily be secured.

Pat Sheehan and Ernest L. Godbe spent Friday and Saturday here, looking into claims they own.

Messrs. Nesbitt, Denton and Osborne, owners of the Fisgotaff property, were making a general examination of the premises during Sunday and Monday.

George Petty is about to open a saloon for the benefit of the thirty ones of April Fool gulch. He will be located at the foot of the mountain below the Monitor mine.

Hy. Empey and the Syphus boys are taking out some promising looking quartz from the Richmond claim, at the foot of Timhorn Mountain and south of the April Fool gulch.

Each week brings hope and comfort of an early recognition by the outside mining world of our latent wealth, and with that fact once generally known, this district will take on new life.

Joe Cassidy brought in a piece of high grade silver ore for assay, a day or two since, said to have been brought from some new find, west of Pahranagat, in which A. W. Geer is interested. The sample created considerable comment.

Golden, as a town, is not to be deserted. The Magnolia operations have caused it to take on new life. Mrs. Webber has moved from Helene and opened a boarding house, and a good water supply is provided for in the erection of a new supply tank at the Garret Wells, three miles up the canyon from Golden.

The lessees on the Flagstaff mine continue to get fair assays and hope soon to have ore in quantity to ship. Six men are now employed and the force will soon be increased to ten. A road from the mine to the April Fool main roadway is to be built at once. Twenty-five feet or more has been run on the north cross cut from the tunnel and the strike of the ledge is apparently toward the north-east part of the claim and the showing is good. Now that long effort promises soon to be rewarded, adjoining claim owners are looking sharply after their lines, and charges and counter-charges of moved monuments are made, with some talk of law suits over the north boundaries. In the eyes of old timers this is a favorable sign, since every good mine usually passes through an ordeal of this character before settling down to steady production.

Operations at the Magnolia are resumed and promise to be permanent. A small force only is now employed and ore is being shipped to the mill at Hiko, ten teams being engaged in the work since Saturday last. About eight hundred tons of ore are already out, which is expected to average \$100 a ton in gold, and on this grade of material milling will be commenced. Seven men are employed about the mill, and it is expected to be running in about ten days. The mill is in excellent condition considering the length of time it has remained unused. As soon as milling begins, about fifteen men will be put on at the mine, and this force is expected to supply ore enough to keep the mill running steadily. The ore is brought down on the Golden, or north side of the gulch, and a grade is constructed, from the divide on the Helene road, through Golden. The Ferguson brothers and Jerry Manning have the work in hand.

Mr. F. P. Swindler, accompanied by his family, left for Salt Lake on Tuesday's stage, on a business trip.

Sam E. Wertheimer has gone to Ferguson and will go over to Pahranagat Valley for a week, where hunting is said to be fine.

J. A. Denton has sold his interest in the Helene sawmill, and the Mill Company is now composed of Wm. Calverwell, Chas. Lytle and W. D. Maynard.

Hon. Geo. S. Sawyer has gone over to Beaver to attend the sitting of the District Court there, as attorney for J. C. Lynch in the case of the Con. Impl. Co. vs. Lynch.

G. R. Walker, Past Grand High Priest of Royal Arch Chapter of Nevada, died at Winnemucca last week. He was also Past Grand Chaplain of the Grand Lodge of Nevada. Deceased was about 80 years of age.

THE RECORD has received copies of bulletins No. 20 and 21, issued by the experiment station of the Nevada University. The first treats of potato and tobacco culture, and the latter of the noxious plants of Nevada. The bulletins are of value to farmers and will be sent free upon application to the experiment station, Reno.
