"The Mines of J. R. De Lamar" is the name by which the recently purchased Monitor Jim Crow group at Ferguson will be hereafter known. This title in turn may be embraced in the name of some townsite as soon as a permanent and favorable location can be secured.

Geo. S. Sawyer, T. J. Osborne and A. S. Thompson have been appointed as the Lincoln County members of the State Central Committee of the Silver Party of Nevada. Preparations for the fall campaign have already begun and a meeting of the State committee is noticed for the 23rd inst., to take place at Reno.

The Italian lessees of the Jim Crow mine are said to withhold possession of the mine from the new purchaser, Capt. J. R. De Lamar on account of a failure of the Jim Crow owners to settle with them according to the terms of the lease under which they hold. The difficulty is temporary one and liable to be arranged at any time.

George Nesbitt returned last evening from Salt Lake where he went with the second lot of Bullion from the Condon mill from Jim Crow ore. The value of the shipment is not generally known but is said to have been about \$25,000. This is a good showing for the mill and for Ferguson district generally. With half a dozen such mills in operation no complaint of dull times would be heard hereabout, and there is already plenty of material to keep that number busy.

The Ballionville mill has made a handsome little clean up of the proceeds of the 57 tons of Monitor ore just put through. The assays showed an extraction of over ninety per cent, which assures successful working of the ore by the pan process. Some slight loss occurred in the slimes, which in this character of ore are found to be very rich. This is now provided against and the mill started again two days ago and expects to make even a better showing this time than in the run just completed.

Matters political are beginning to engage attention. One or two announcements for State offices are already out, on the Silver Party side and others are quietly mentioned. Which is to be the dominant party this year? That is the first question for the office seeker to solve. The Republican and Silver party State Committees have already arranged for meetings to discuss what shall be done. Nothing from the Democratic party has yet come to light. Another month or two and the path of each party will be clearly outlined. Will the People's Party of Lincoln County maintain a separate organization or will it affiliate with the Silver Party of the State generally, which in principle is practically the same, differing in name only. Lincoln County alone at last election had a People's organization and if it is to be continued, some preparatory work will need to be done to enable its members to vote for State officers.

Murray Gothe and wife were up from Ballionville the first part of the week.

Angelo Clark, our County Clerk, has returned from his recent indisposition and is again attending to business.

S. E. Wertheimer went to Helene Sunday to look up his branch store and restock it preparatory to the great season.

F. P. Swindler went down to Ferguson district today to make a lot of general surveys of the recently purchased mines there.

Max Schaefer having finished the business which called him here on Monday, departed promptly the following morning for Helene.

The stage lines between here and Ferguson district note an improvement in business of late, both appear to run with loads all the time.

Cattle are reported to be still dying in and around the mountains. General weakness from last winter's exposure is supposed to be the main cause.

The genial countenance of George Petty was seen on the streets the early part of the week. He is up from Helene on business connected with his mines there.

The majority of the Chinese in town have put in an appearance at the office of the Registrar and complied with the law compelling registration by May 5th, 1894.

Supt. H. A. Cohen of the De Lamar mines at Ferguson was in town from Sunday to Tuesday on business connected with the Jim Crow and the mines generally.

The prospects for Nevada farmers are said to be very bright. Hay and grain will be in great demand in California as the crops there this year amount to very little.

Our merchants report this to have been about the dulllest week for business that they have experienced in a long time, though a fair number of outside visitors have been in.

A. S. Thompson has just received a carload of Salt Lake Beer, also assorted Soda and Sarsaparilla, which he is offering at reasonable figures and delivered free to any part of town.

A game of base ball will be played on the grounds below town next Sunday afternoon at two o'clock, between the factions of Denton and Donohoe, for a stake of two horses and a cow and calf.

Our merchants have bestirred themselves and have given the streets a thorough overhauling. The rubbish that has been an eyesore so long has been removed and a general air of cleanliness now pervades the town.

The run of John Koster's furnace at Bristol last week was not a profitable one, after a day's run it was found the bottom of the furnace had burned out and he was forced to shut down and all the men were brought back to town.

John Wheatley was in town Saturday and left Sunday for Reeves the next town in April Pool canyon. He was so busy with loading up teams with furniture for his new boarding house that he failed to hob nob with many of his old friends.

J. A. Denton, who takes the Milford mail route on the first of next July, is arranging to complete the present term of service and begin work at once, by buying out the Con. Implement Co., or the Utah & Nevada Stage Co., now operating on the line.

The location of the permanent townsite is the question which interests the general resident of Ferguson. It is generally conceded that some other point than Helene will be selected. Some point considered more central to the whole district.

Mr. Hastings, from all accounts, was sent for to do some experting in Ferguson district. The latter has been examining the Chairman mine since the 15th of March, and from what we can learn, which is strictly hearsay, he finds the mine all that Mr. Jackson represented it to be. —White Pine News.

Telephone Line.

The work of putting in the telephone line between Pioche and Ferguson district is to be rushed. The contracts made call for its completion within thirty days from May 1st. Charley Lytle has the contract for supplying and erecting the poles and Murray C. Godbe has charge of the construction generally. The line will run direct from Pioche and not by way of Ballionville as at first contemplated, unless different arrangements to those already existing shall be made.

The Jim Crow mine will be the terminus at the Ferguson end, while here, several stations will be put in and a general system provided by which the line may be utilized by the public at reasonable charges.

Heretofore the men have been getting forty dollars a month in harvest time and one dollar a day in winter months. It is said the men will not submit to such a radical reduction and refuse to work.

He predicts also that a storm wave will cross the western mountains to day, this disturbance will develop extreme temperature, dangerous storms and possibly tornadoes and will have unusual force. The election of officers for the next term was had and J. Cook was elected President, J. O. Gelabert Vice-President, E. Rawlin Secretary, N. Johnson Sergeant-at-Arms. The chairman said that before proceeding to business he wished to venerate the chair as he felt an old affliction coming on mainly numps, had been told it was a nervous affliction and might result in gout and the least excitement might precipitate it. The vice took the chair and business was opened. 
