

TELEGRAPHIC NOTES.

CRIPPLE CREEK, Colo., May 28.—Nearly 400 men have been recruited in Denver and only await the slightest outbreak to be forwarded to Cripple Creek and sworn in as deputies. The strikers have been searching for arms and ammunition in the mining camps, and wherever arms ammunition or provisions were found, they were confiscated and receipts given for them. No one about the camps except strikers, who reign supreme, have issued the order that every able bodied man found in camp when the outbreak comes will be forced to carry arms in their ranks. Three hundred deputies are camped at the Midland terminal, and are likely to be kept there, pending the efforts of arbitration. Should they attempt to proceed to the mines a desperate battle is sure to result. Every mine in the camp is "loaded" and the men who took their place in the mines would be in imminent peril.

PITTSBURG, Kan., May 28.—Every shaft but one now working a full force is now employed at the 87 cent rate. The men at the Fleming mine of the Western & Coal Mining Co., held a meeting and decided to go back for the same price, but as yet the company has taken no action on their proposition.

DENVER, Colo., May 28.—News was conveyed this morning to F. H. Hegwer of the Coxy home reserve, that the Coxy contingent at River Front Park was likely to be restrained from taking possession of cars to leave the city. Hegwer replied and said that if the people wanted them to remain they would have to feed them, then the chief calmly turned to his desk to sign a new commission. Three hundred and seventy-five of the Salt Lake contingent, under the command of General Carter, reached here today, and the question of feeding the army is a serious one, for unless Denver charity will daily furnish food for from 1000 to 1500 men the consequences will be the grave.

WASHINGTON, May 28.—The motion made by counsel for Colonel W. C. P. Brockridge to file a bill of exceptions, by virtue of which the suit of Madeline Pollard against him might be carried to a higher court of appeals, was overruled by Judge Bradley. Therefore this will prevent an appeal being taken.

HELENA, Mont., May 28.—Governor Rickards announced today that the sun dance, which was to be held the middle of next month at Great Falls would not be allowed to take place.

CLEVELAND, O., May 27.—The convention of the Amalgamated Association of Iron and Steel Workers has adjourned. It was agreed to hold the next meeting in Cleveland May 15, 1895. The scale is now printed, and will not be made public until next Saturday, when it will probably be promulgated from Pittsburgh.

LONDON, May 27.—El Esparato, a famous matador, was ripped open by an infuriated bull at Madrid, and he lived five minutes. The bull had killed four horses and he became extremely fierce when the banderillas fixed their darts in his neck. The spectators, at least the greater portion of them, did not propose that their pleasure should be spoiled by the death of a man who had been well paid to assist in making a holiday for them, and so the fight was continued as soon as the excitement had subsided. All the bulls fought well, killing fifteen horses and flooring two of the toreros, who were severely bruised.

HAZLETON, Pa., May 27.—Victor Timokki and Peter Yosmoski were fatally shot in the Polish church at Freeland. A factional fight has been waged for a year in the church, and today the enemies of the pastor, Father Mozgott, attempted to prevent him from entering the church. His police escort was attacked by the mob and the officers fired upon them with the above result.

St. Louis, Mo. May 27.—The labor leaders have completed preparations to receive General Kelly's fleet. The fleet will be met fifteen or twenty miles above the city by an excursion steamer with music, conveyance of the men most prominent in the labor cause in the city. The "whealers will land at Ferry street, and will camp near the feet. A mass meeting will be held on Lucas Market Square as soon as possible after the arrival of the Industrials.

Los Angeles, May 27.—A sensational affair occurred in the San Jose hills, in a little fruit town. A young Englishman was set upon by a gang of hoodlums and beaten into a state of insensibility, and was then tied to a tree in a barren spot and left to perish. The young man is Robert Beauchamp, nephew of the Archbishop of York. He finally extricated himself from his perilous position and succeeded in making his way home. He is very indignant and will lay his case before British Consul Mortimer.

CRIPPLE CREEK, Colo. May 27.—The striking miners of Cripple Creek district and the deputy sheriffs had a blood battle at 3 p. m. in which the miners were victorious. The trouble was started by an attempt on the part of the deputies to make a night march and gain possession of the city of Victor, with the intention of using it as a base of operations in future attacks on the miners. Thirty-five armed miners followed the deputies when they retreated Friday afternoon, guarding against just such an attack as was made yesterday. The train bearing the deputies steamed down within a short distance of the miners' line and stopped. The deputies disembarked 128 strong, and advanced on the miners in full force. They were met with volley after volley from the Winchester's carried by the miners and the fire was briskly returned. Newspaper correspondents have all been ordered away from the hill by the miners and only representatives of one local paper and the Associated Press have access inside the lines. The local reporter of the Denver News was ordered to keep away from Victor and when he came there today his horse

was taken away from him and he was put in a wagon and sent to this city. A representative of the Times was served in a like manner.

SPRINGFIELD, Mo., May 26.—Resolutions were passed at a meeting of the sympathizers of Coxy last night, denouncing the treatment of Coxy in Washington. A petition asking Cleveland to pardon him was prepared and signed by 690 persons. Senator Vest was requested to present this petition in person and report to the chairman of the meeting what the President said.

WASHINGTON, D. C. May 26.—The result of the debate in the Senate of the United States was that the McKinley rate of 13 cents on silver-lead ores was reduced one half, but an amendment was added, providing that the method of sampling and assaying shall be that usually adopted for commercial purposes by public sampling works in the United States. This amendment, which was introduced by Senator Dubois, was agreed to by Senator Shoup, who introduced the first amendment to that effect.

St. Paul, Minn., May 26.—Mr. Blatz, the millionaire Milwaukee brewer, died very suddenly of heart disease. He was returning with his wife to Milwaukee from California.

MEXICO, Ind., May 25.—It has just been found out that John Vanniman, who is serving a life sentence in the Michigan State Prison, is not guilty of the crime of murder for which he has already served four years. The man that was supposed to be murdered is John Crow, who left today for the purpose of setting the supposed murderer free.

WASHINGTON, D. C. May 25.—The Bi-metallic League considered the report of the committee on resolutions. As finally adopted, they declare the League is unalterably opposed to the further use of interest bearing bonds; that before casting their votes for Congressmen the members of the league will require assurance of adherence to the free-coinage of silver and gold at 16 to 1, and pledge that if a bill providing for such coinage is passed by Congress and vetoed by the President, they will work and vote to pass the bill over the President's veto.

QUINCY, Ill., May 23.—General Kelly's army is still here and it is not likely they will get away before this morning. Kelly has unbounded faith that the army will get to Washington and says that Baldwin the aeronaut, as promised him a balloon when he gets there, from which he will make a speech and will not tread on the grass.

The strangest strike on record is that of wet nurses in Vienna. The financial side of the question is that the registry officers get too large commissions.

The patents applied for in Washington last year numbered 40,000. The total number of patents outstanding on January 1st was 545,000. The receipts of the patent office were \$1,200,000 and the expenses \$150,000 less. New York stands first in the number of patents applied for.

The small electric light installation in the world is said to be in the village of Bremen in Thuringia. It comprised a single arc lamp installed in a church, the lamp being operated by a small dynamo, driven by the wheels of the village mill.—New York World.

George McRay aged 9 and Arthur Johnson aged 11 years, were badly injured by the explosion of three sticks of giant powder Saturday afternoon at Victor, Colo. The boys were playing with the explosive when it went off. The McRay boy had his right hand blown off at the wrist, in addition to serious injuries all over his body. Johnson's face was badly lacerated.
