

TELEGRAPHIC NOTES.

WICHITA, Kan., June 25.—At 7:30 this evening, a terrible cyclone from the south-west struck the village of Keighley, Butler county, and nearly wiped the town out of existence. The telegraph wires are down and the information was brought to Leon by a courier. A freight train was standing on the Frisco track at the time and six box cars were turned upside down. This would indicate that the cyclone was about 200 feet wide.

BATESVILLE, Ark., June 25.—The sheriff of Baxter county arrested two men believed to be the Taylor brothers, wanted at Brown- ing, Missouri, for the butchery of the Meeks family six weeks ago. The men have confessed that they are the Taylor brothers who, being long absent from their homes at Denver, June 24.—Adjutant-General T. J. Farney, who received a coat of tar and feathers at the hands of the mob at St. Louis, day morning, is resting easier. The strain upon his nerves was so great that he was nearly prostrated when he found himself among friends, but he is in a great degree recovered from the prostration.

LYONS, France, June 24.—The attempt to assassinate President Carnot has caused an intense excitement all over France. The President was visiting Lyons in connection with the International Exhibition, and after spending some time at the Exhibition he proceeded to a banquet which was given in his honor. After the banquet he proceeded to the theater, where a gala performance was to be given because of his presence in the city. Several carriages were in the procession and President Carnot's was the first, they were driving along slowly and the street was lined with enthusiastic crowds, when suddenly a man rushed out of the crowd and sprang upon the step of the President's landau. The bright blade of a knife was seen as the assassin's arm descended and President Carnot was seen to fall back in his seat. The physicians have decided that the President will not recover.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 23.—Reports have been received at the Marine hospital of yellow fever in quarantine at two points. The "Jassmore" reached Galveston to-day from Vera Cruz via Tampico, with one case on board, and reported that two had died on the trip. The British brig "Albatross" from Havana, reached Quarantine at Tortugas, with one on board.

CARDIFF, Wales, June 23.—A dispatch says that a terrible explosion occurred in Albion colliery. Two hundred miners, including twelve boys, were buried beneath the debris of the mine. None of the rescuing parties which went down to night have yet returned, and this indicates that great difficulty is being met with in reaching the places where the miners are entombed.

ST. PAUL, Minn., June 23.—A hotel clerk named Allen, murdered a salesman in the Merchant's Hotel, in a quarrel over a woman. Shortly before midnight Miss Leyde and a woman friend were passing the Metropolitan Hotel, when they were accosted by J. H. Clapp the salesman. The woman ran across the street to where Allen was standing. Clapp followed and without a scuffle of any kind Allen slashed Clapp across the throat with a knife. He fled to death in twenty minutes. Allen and the Leyde woman were placed in jail.

ST. LOUIS, June 22.—An A. P. A. leader and the financial secretary of Compton Hill Council No. 23, were sandbagged on Tuesday night while on their way home from the lodge and robbed of the records of their society. On the same night A. N. McBride, recording secretary of the council, was waylaid in a lonely spot by four masked men, but he fought his way out of the trap by the aid of a loaded revolver, and escaped unharmed. Compton Hill Council is one of the largest branches of the A. P. A. in St. Louis.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 22.—The largest and most costly organ in the United States if not in the world, the gift of Edward F. Searles to Grace Episcopal Church, was dedicated to-night. The organ was given in memory of Mrs. Mark Hopkins, who married Mr. Searles.

The silver plank in the platform adopted by the Republican State Convention at Sacramento two days ago, which declared in favor of the free and unlimited coinage of silver at the rate of 16 to 1, was framed by M. H. De Young, whose newspaper, the Chronicle, has been an advocate of bi-metallicism for many years. It is considered probable now that when the State Democratic Convention meets here in August next it will insert a silver plank in its platform equally explicit.

CAMDEN, S. C., June 22.—In the joint speech-making of Governor Tillman and Senator Butler, the Governor said: "Mr. Cleveland would rather see Butler in the Senate than Ben Tillman go there. If I go there I promise that I will use a pitchfork in his old fat ribs."

LOUISVILLE, Ky., June 22.—Kelly and Baker, leaders of the Industrialists, were acquitted in the court to-day. General Kelly then spoke to 4,000 people, comprised principally of workmen. At a low estimate he realized \$800 from them.

HELENA, Mont., June 22.—Indications were very favorable for a white to-day, of the hanging of Robert Anderson, alias Fields, at Livingston, despite the fact that the Governor late last night decided to respite him until July 6th. When the Governor wired Sheriff Conrow of Livingston that he had respited the condemned murderer, the officer wired back that he would postpone the execution until the papers arrived. An hour later he notified the Governor that if the respite was not in his hands by four o'clock, he would hang Anderson. Some lively correspondence by wire occurred, the Governor telling the Sheriff that if he persisted in hanging Anderson, he would be held for murder himself. Upon advice of his attorneys, the Sheriff

decided not to hang Anderson this afternoon. An offensive rancher who lived on the edge of town, was murdered by Anderson and a man named Mortimer, who turned State's evidence, a few weeks ago.

BOISE, Idaho, June 21.—A special to the Statesman from DeLamar says that Wm. Franks shot Allen McFayden at South Mountain to-day. The trouble grew out of a dispute over the settlement of wages. The ball went through his right lung just above the nipple. McFayden was in a critical condition at last accounts and will probably die.

MACON, Ga., June 21.—A double tragedy occurred in Crawford county to-day. Wart Dent and O. P. Wright had a difficulty in Dent's store. Dent was cut across the abdomen. Friends interfered and Wright went across the street and was followed by Dent, who, with entrails protruding, plunged a pitchfork into Wright's breast and broke the fork to pieces over his head.

CLEVELAND, O., June 21.—John Litzki was arrested and jailed to-night on a charge of murder. It is alleged he killed Mrs. Elizabeth Jasicki, who was a partisan of the Rev. Kolozowski, for imparting information to the priest of a plot to assassinate him. This was one of the many branches of St. Stanislaus Church fight.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 21.—The Comptroller of the Currency was advised to-day that the Black Hills National Bank of Rapid City S. D. had suspended payment. A bank examiner was placed in charge at once. It is understood that the last report of the bank to the Comptroller was unsatisfactory and its suspension, therefore, was not a surprise.

GRAND JUNCTION, Colo., June 21.—A few members of the Smith army, straggled in here to-day and report that about 150 of their comrades are stranded in the desert between here and Salt Lake, without food or water. The Rio Grande railroad will not carry them, and the trainmen have strict orders to keep them off. General Smith is here and is endeavoring, with poor success, to send aid to them. If something is not done many deaths may be expected.

LONDON, June 21.—Fire broke out at 9 o'clock at Agnes's cabinet manufactory in Tabernacle street. The flames assisted by a fierce wind, spread furiously, and within an hour eight or ten other factories were burning. The wind carried sheets of flames and sparks a great distance, and the illumination attracted enormous crowds of people to the vicinity. Thirty engines were summoned, but the greatest difficulty experienced was approaching the burning buildings. Almost the entire London brigade, over fifty engines and 400 men were in attendance. Walls of burning buildings fell from time to time with loud crashes. So far as ascertained there were no casualties although a whole block was completely destroyed.

ROME, June 21.—The Princess Colona, the daughter of Mrs. J. W. Mackey, has entered an action for separation from her husband. The case will be tried at Naples where the Princess will appear in person.

Nevada's Native Flax.

Although the fact appears to be little known, Nevada produces a native flax which is precisely the same in appearance as the cultivated variety. The wild flax, however, is a perennial plant, the root sending up new stocks every spring, whereas the common flax is an annual and requires the sowing of new seed each season. The ordinary flax cultivated in Europe and America is a native of Egypt and some parts of Asia. It does not seem to be known to our scientists in the Atlantic States that the same plant, except that it is a perennial, is indigenous to the Great Basin region of the Pacific Coast.

It grows in and about the mountain meadows, and attains a height of about three feet. Before the whites came to the country the Indians gathered this wild flax and used it in making nets for catching fish and rabbits. The stocks produce a long, very strong and beautiful fibre. The flowers are blue, and the seed capsules are round and firm. It might be worth while to cultivate this wild flax; being native to the country, it might prove of greater value in some respects than the variety at present grown.

A story is told of a young minister who, on going to a new church, was told by the official brethren that his salary would be \$1000, and that, as every summer a wholesale liquor dealer visited the town with his family and paid regularly \$50 for a pew in the church, it would be policy for the minister to touch the liquor question gently. The young man replied: "Take \$50 off my salary for I want to get a shot at that pew."

We recently asked a miner who was getting fine gold by sluicing how he saved it. "I use silver," he said, "and squeeze it through calico, and when I have got the amalgam as hard as I can—" "You retort it," we said. "No I don't, and yes I do—I don't as you mean retort, but I do as I mean it myself. I get a potato, cut off one end, and scoop out a cavity in it large enough to take my ball of amalgam. I next take a spade or piece of flat iron and place that over the fire, and then upon that I place the potato with the cut side down. As the amalgam gets hot the silver evaporates and goes all through the potato; but it can't get through the skin and neither can it escape by the iron, for the spud is stuck to the spade. When it is done I take the spade off the fire and let it get cool, and then I have my gold in a button on the spade and my silver all in fine globules in the potato up under water and I have all my silver. Many persons don't believe this can be done but I tell you it can, sir, and also tell you that I don't know how it is, but my gold is always of good color, and I have often wondered if the juices of the potato have anything to do with that."

At the examination of applicants for teacher's certificates at Visalia, Cal., last week, the whole forty-five failed. Twelve were dropped because they could not spell, and the remainder because they could not solve the arithmetical problems that the board propounded.

Sam Davis had a warrant sworn out for James H. Love, manager of the Forty-nine camp at the Midwinter Fair, charging him with embezzlement. Davis claims that Love has gotten away with thousands of dollars, which should have been divided among the stockholders of the Forty-nine camp scheme.—Silver State.

Byron was delighted when he woke and found himself famous. It pleased him to know that his name was the topic of every tongue. He was amused, at least, to find himself the lion of the London season, the hero of the day. Then his pleasure was turned into pain; he had to pay the penalties of greatness. And he had to continue to pay them, with as it were, his heart's blood, his whole life long.
