George Williams went to Bullionville this afternoon and will continue on in the morning for Salt Lake to be absent several weeks.

Mark Church and Wm. Wheatley are finishing up the repairs to the timbering at the top of the pump compartment of the R. & E. shaft.

W. H. Perry returned yesterday from the northern end of the state, prepared with stock etc., to enter on the Milford stage line on the 1st, together with J. A. Denton.

News is received of the death of Charles H. Bell, at Butler, Waukesha County Wis., of paralysis. Deceased resided here some years ago and taught school for several terms at Clover, Eagle and Spring Valleys.

The Yuba continues regular shipments of ore of a grade which with silver at its old price would make it a dividend payer, but which now leaves only a fair margin of profit to the lessee, the Polaris Mining Co.

Any report connected with the amalgamation of the P. C. Co., with the Utah & Nevada Company is eagerly discussed, since the building of the U. P. on the existing grade would place Pioche once more, "strictly in it."

George Nesbitt returned from Ferguson District Monday, where he spent several days looking up a millsite. He expects to work ore from the Magnolia and the Flagstaff mines and to utilize the water from the Cedar Wash Springs.

The Board of School Examiners was in session to-day examining applicants. Misses Annie Ronnow and Mary Syphus are applicants for certificates. George S. Sawyer and T. E. Edwards are the local members of the examining board.

A. S. Thompson has just received a carload of Salt Lake Beer, also assorted Soda and Sarsaparilla, which he is offering at reasonable figures and delivered free to any part of town.

After very successful terms in each, both departments of our public schools closed to-day for the summer. Miss Kate Courtney in the grammar department, and Miss Maggie Clinton in the primary, have both made excellent progress with their pupils.

George S. Sawyer has brought suit in the District Court against H. A. Cohen, Mrs. Julia McFadden, the estate of James McFadden deceased and J. Nesbitt & Bro. for \$5000 for legal services connected with the Jim Crow mine up to the time of its recent sale. The case will come up for trial at the next sitting.

Since Pioche is not to celebrate this year, the folks of Eagle Valley have decided to help out the matter and will boom the 4th. themselves. They extend an invitation to all Piochers to come out and join them that day. This will be a good opportunity to enjoy the day, and to see one of the prettiest valleys to be found in this section.

After considerable delay in looking into the matter, the Internal Revenue officers have issued certificates of residence to all the Chinese applicants from this section. The photographs sent in were not as required by law, in being smaller than designated and the subjects in a number of cases having head coverings, etc. The difficulty of securing pictures at all, and the fact that all the applicants had done their best to comply with the law, was considered, and the certificates accordingly issued.

Its Gold Producing Properties Coming to the Front--New Discoveries.

The mining industry of the southern portion of the county is coming to the front. New strikes are being made and old properties are looking more promising.

An important strike has been made in the Forlorn mountains, situated five miles south-west of El Dorado Canyon on some old claims that were located some eight years ago and abandoned. About the latter part of April, John Hens, with another party, went to the old claims and got some ore from them which they assayed for gold and which went very high. Other samples were then taken, all running from \$10 to \$600 in gold to the ton.

There are four parallel ledges and all well defined. The belt is small, being about one mile wide and three miles long. At present some ten locations are made. On the Capital mine two shafts have been sunk, one twenty feet and the other twenty-three feet and about seventy feet apart. The vein is from two to two and a half feet wide and averages the same in both shafts, \$41 in gold to the ton.

A deep cut has been run on what is known as the Big Ledge, situated one mile south of the Capital shaft. The cut is in thirty feet and taps the ledge at a depth of thirty feet; the ledge being about two and a half feet wide and averaging \$70 in gold.

A load of ore from the Monitor mine here has been shipped to the El Dorado mill as a working test and the result is eagerly looked for. The ore is carbonate; formation trinite and the veins run east and west and pitch to the north. The mines are but three miles from the Colorado river and a fine road can be made down a wash with but little expense. In the workings of former years no assays were taken for gold, and the silver value being too small to open up the claims, going only about four or five ounces they were neglected.

About twenty-two miles from the Vegas ranch and on the road to El Dorado Canyon a very promising strike has been made by W. J. Stewart of the Vegas ranch. Samples taken from the croppings go for \$10 to \$100 a ton in gold.

The late trouble at the Keystone mine in Yellow Pine mining district over the thefts of ore ended in nearly all the men being discharged, and replaced by new ones. The company at present is working about thirty men and the mine to-day looks better than it ever did. The workings are down 400 feet and in the bottom the ore is of a higher grade for average than that of the upper workings. The Keystone mining company has also two other valuable mining claims situated in Shadow mountain about thirty miles from Keystone, and in California, across the line. Two men took out twenty tons of ore in a week's time, and teams have commenced to haul ore from there.

The mill is situated eight miles from the Keystone mine at what is now called Sandy City. It is a Gilpin mill from Colorado and built by McFarland of Denver, some fifteen miles from here. The mill is now in operation and the average workings for the last three months have been ninety-six per cent of the assay value.

T. C. Williams, formerly of the Day mine at Royal City is superintendent and he has made many beneficial changes for the company since he took charge.

Some eastern capitalists are at present negotiating for the purchase of the Clementina mine from Mr. J. V. Koeley. The property is one of the best in Yellow Pine mining district and needs but capital to bring it to the front as a large producer.

The population of Keystone and Sandy is about fifty, and there are three saloons, three eating houses, three stores, blacksmith shop, three corral and numerous tents.

Considerable prospecting is going on and new strikes being made. Two sales took place within the last two months, of \$1000 each.

Crescent City is a new place that has sprung into prominence within the last year. It is situated in the southeastern portion of the county about 240 miles from Pioche, and fourteen miles northeast from Vanderbilt, California.

The Legal Tender Mining Company of which A. F. Stevens is the efficient superintendent, has just completed a five-stamp gold quartz mill of the latest modern improvements from the Fulton Iron Works of San Francisco, with a corrugated Frue Concentrator, the capacity of the mill being fifteen tons a day. The engines and boilers were put in heavy enough, should the developments justify it to increase the number of stamps. At present only enough water is to be had to run five stamps, but work is going on to develop more if possible.

The company owns some fifteen mining claims, but so far have confined their work to one mine called the Legal Tender upon which two shafts have been sunk 200 feet and about 100 feet apart, connected at the 100-foot level with a drift run for ventilation. The vein averages four feet and the pay streak about twenty inches. Numerous drifts have been run, all showing up well and averaging about the same for the pay streak in them all. No stopping has been done and the amount of ore taken out is about 400 tons of an average of \$58.20 in gold per ton. Some work has been done on all the other claims and they all show pay ore. The company have been working twenty-five men nearly all winter and have about that many employed now.

A fair estimate of the amount of ore in sight in the Legal Tender mine is \$200,000. The company have expended some \$30,000 already and have just negotiated for the purchase of another mine at \$12,000.

C. E. Goodrich is engineer of the mill. There are about 65 men in the district and a mail service is soon to be established between Crescent and Vanderbilt.

The scarlet fever epidemic at Austin is said to be assuming frightful proportions. Each day new cases are reported. The disease is of a malignant type.

The Vanderbilt Mining and Milling Company this week shipped a bar of bullion weighing 105 ounces and 7 pennyweights. This gold was of good quality and will bring a good price. The company has recently received \$750 for the gold out of the Chippie mine.—Shaft.

OUR WASHINGTON LETTER. Correspondence of The Record. WASHINGTON, June 20, 1894. It would be difficult to say whether the sugar trust Democratic Senators or the men who compose the sugar trust are the most frightened just now.

The week opened with much uncertainty concerning the tariff bill. Senator Harris expected to have disposed of the wool schedule by the middle of last week, but it is still undisposed of, although it will be finished early this week, unless the threat to filibuster until some duty is put upon wool shall be carried out.

Yes, we know Main Street would be more navigable with some of the rocks out of it and the Joshua removed, and as soon as the building boom lets up a little, we'll attend to it.

The lessees of the Flagstaff property are driving for the Apex vein and expect now to cut it in about 120 feet. The tunnel is of good working size and good progress is being made and the Apex may be reached in six weeks.

A short order restaurant, with bill of fare from fifteen cents, up, is one of the latest additions to our business. This is a big drop from old time boom days, but is strictly necessary on account of hard times.

Jack Wheatley began the erection of the Company boarding house last Monday. It is situated below the main tunnel, to the left of the road, going down. It will be 20x40 feet and will be commodious and well situated.

Building progresses as fast as lumber can be got in. Wertheimer's new store building, and fireproof cellar on the lot adjoining are rapidly nearing completion. Goods are already in both. John Franks has the work of building the store.

The well borers arrived last Tuesday and will begin the work of well drilling in a few days. The first borings will be done in the valley within three or four miles of town. The site selected last week in Cedar Wash will not for the present be tested.

Nothing of the particular plans of the DeLamar Company comes to light but they are preparing for extensive work. Three tunnels are now being driven on the ledge, one above the other. All are in ore but not all of high grade. A millsite has been selected below the mine in the same gulch, and to the northwest of DeLamar town.

The City Trustees of Sacramento have passed an ordinance to prohibit gambling by the use of nickel-in-the-slot machines.

M. M. Estee was nominated for Governor on the first ballot by the Republican convention at Sacramento, Cal. He received 661 of the 847 votes.

Numerous bogus dimes and quarters are in circulation in Reno, which has led some citizens to think that a counterfeiters' plant is being operated in the neighborhood.

H. E. Freudenthal of Pioche, Nevada, assessor of Lincoln county, came in from Keystone Thursday. He went from here to San Francisco from which place he will return in about ten days.—Vanderbilt Shaft.

Frank Francis and Al Linn have moved the material of the Lovelock New Era to Kennedy district, and will soon commence the publication of a weekly newspaper at the latter place.—Austin Reveille.

The Silver State says there are two stage lines from Winnemucca to Kennedy and it will not be long, as the future of the camp is almost assured, before a line of six horse Concord coaches will be established between the two points.

The squirrel, which threatened serious damage to the crops in the western part of Churchill county this spring, have all disappeared, and the hay and grain is looking fine.—Reno Gazette.
