The Yuba mine, after several weeks' dead work, is reported to be in operation again, and shipments will shortly be resumed.

Ernest Dawes and F. C. Godbe, charged last week with a criminal assault on a young woman, at Salt Lake, were discharged on a preliminary hearing.

John Roeder accompanied his son and daughter to Reno, yesterday, and he may remain over and attend the People's Party mass-meeting at Reno, which is to be held on the 6th. of September.

A. S. Thompson and T. J. Osborne will leave next Tuesday via Milford, to attend the Silver Party State Convention which is to be held at Carson on the 4th. of next month.

Charlie Thompson, Johnnie Roeder and Tennie Roeder left by private conveyance for Eureka, yesterday, on their way to Reno, where they will enter the State University.

If able to stand the trip, Judge Talbot will hold a short sitting of the District Court here within the next few weeks, but the trial of cases will not be taken up until some time in November.

A. S. Thompson has just received a carload of Salt Lake Beer, also assorted Soda and Sarsaparilla, which he is offering at reasonable figures and delivered free to any part of town.

News from the new Pioche Con. Co. consolidation, is anxiously looked for hereabouts with regard to building the railroad between here and Milford. Unless work commences soon it will not be finished before next Spring.

The assessment list for this year is complete. A general reduction of ten per cent was allowed on all classes of property, over valuations of last year. This makes a difference in the entire roll, this year, of some \$50,000.

Eugene Howell, of White Pine County, is reported as being a candidate for nomination on the Silver Party ticket for the office of Secretary of State. Mr. Howell represented Lincoln in the Legislature of 1883, being elected from Bristol.

Charley Roe was in from Bristol on Monday, arranging for a run of his furnace at Bristol on some custom ore, and a quantity which he recently extracted from the Cave and other mines. The run will last only about ten days.

The third anniversary of the establishment of the B. B. Order here, will be celebrated by a ball at Thompson's Opera House next Monday evening. The admission price will be one dollar. A good attendance is expected.

If each of the political organizations now in existence throughout the State, holds a State Convention, we will have six different tickets in the field this fall. This will be pleasant and under the new system of voting, the old political rouser and bum, with a ticket before him of the dimensions of an ordinary newspaper, will be likely to disappoint the fondest hopes of his readers when he attempts to "cross" his favorite.

Two tickets at least of county candidates will be presented to voters in Lincoln this fall. Heretofore it has been "Democratic" and "Republican"; now it will be "Silver Party" and "Populists" but the same men as formerly, will be there, and the query will naturally arise, "What's in a Name Anyway?"

Thirty of the clerks and employees of the county and notion house of Will & Finck San Francisco, have been discharged for theft. Their plan was to knock down sales and to perjure goods. Their reason given for going into this wholesale stealing is that wages were too low to permit them to dress as well as their employers required.

The Democratic party in this state is badly demoralized. It hardly knows "where it's at." The State Committee of the thoroughly unwashed part of it, is presided over by Major John H. Dennis, who, in response to a recent invitation from the State Committee of the backsliding faction of the party, headed by Harris and O'Toole, to join them in convention, comes out with a scorching letter occupying a column space, and tells the other side in plain unvarnished English, just what he thinks of their action. Both sides announce their determination to hold State Conventions and the chances of ultimate success will determine the character of campaign that will follow.

DE LAMAR DOTS.

DeLamar has in all, about seventy structures, most of which are good substantial lumber buildings.

The registry list shows nearly ninety names enrolled. This is better, we believe than any other precinct in the county at this time.

John Boyle has taken possession of the Cliff Springs station and will endeavor to make it comfortable for Ferguson and other travelers passing that way.

DeLamar is as hot a political precinct as will be found in the county. Party principles, candidates, state and local, and all other matters pertaining to a first class campaign, are thoroughly discussed.

Anticipating a demand for timber, parties here are taking proper steps to secure permission to cut from the government land, all land hereabouts being surveyed. This will avoid expensive litigation at the hands of the government hereafter.

The DeLamar Company is reported to have notified several parties who recently built on the west edge of town, to move their buildings, as they were within the boundaries of a mining claim owned by the Company and the ground will shortly be needed for a millsite.

It looks more and more every day, as though the water supply for this district will yet have to come from Cedar Wash. The artesian well of the company is not meeting with the success expected in several ways; and in the meantime developments in Cedar Wash indicate the water channel to be larger and better than heretofore supposed. At three different points now, a good flow has been obtained, and other favorable spots will shortly be prospected. The Zimmerman well is going down and a fair stream is the result, though it does not increase as rapidly as looked for. This well is the farthest north. The Baker and Schaefer well or spring, is about a mile to the southward, and here a flow of more than an inch is secured and this spring is now used to supply the DeLamar town and mines. Two separate sources of water are found here, each independent of the other, and distant from each other only some fifty feet. Layers of clay are supposed to keep the two channels separate. The tunnel at the Cedar Springs on which Nesbitt Bros. still continue work, has developed a nice stream also, with every probability of increasing as the tunnel is advanced. It is rumored that the DeLamar company will shortly move the drilling machine to the Zimmerman well and test the formation there at a great depth, for a flowing stream.

Herman E. Freudenthal has been regularly sworn in as a clerk, to assist in the Post-office here.

Mrs. Tucker and her son returned to Ely last Friday after spending a few days with relatives here.

Miss Minnie Carman at the Post-office is just in receipt of a fresh lot of confectionery, choice and good.

The Post-office corner in Shier's drug store has been enlarged, repainted and considerably improved.

A considerable number of attendants are expected from the outside at the B. R. B. ball next Monday evening.

The Pousjade residence on Cedar street is now occupied by C. O. Newell, who recently moved in from Jack Rabbit.

The well-known hoodoo, the letter B on the wheat, has made its appearance in Wyoming. Look out for trouble.

Joshua Peckham, Jr., of San Jose, Cal., who was until recently one of the best known students in the State University, has become insane from overstudy.

Secretary of State O. H. Grey, has sent to Boston for 25,000 sheets of election paper 26x36, to be used by the various counties in this Fall's election.

Governor Colcord, A. C. Cleveland, G. F. Turrill, J. Pousjade and Controller Horton are mentioned as candidates for Governor before the Republican State Convention.

Charley C. Ronnow has been appointed Bishop of the Panama Stake of the Mormon Church in this county, to fill the vacancy in that office occasioned by the death of the late M. L. Lee.

M. Casey, found guilty of assault last week on Mrs. Lawson, was fined \$20 by Justice of the Peace Hartung. He was unable to pay it and is serving the amount out in the County Jail at the rate of \$2 a day.

China wants to make a heavy loan and wants about \$250,000,000 of it payable in silver. This will no doubt give silver an upward tendency in the markets and it may go a point or two higher, than now looked for.

Warren & Brown will shortly change to the old route via Bennett and Cliff Springs, on the DeLamar route. The road down the Wash, while possessing advantages, has offsets in the way of distance and new road, which makes it considerably more difficult of the two.

J. Eisenmann wishes to call the attention of those desiring to build, to the fact that he has just received a carload of glazed window sash, all sizes; also plain, sash and screen doors, together with white lead, paints, oils and nails, which will be sold cheaper than ever, but only for cash.

Shortly after noon on Tuesday, a storm cloud swept over Spring Mountain and threatened for a brief time to inundate the town. The water fell in torrents, and fifteen minutes of such a downpour would have resulted in a more disastrous flood than the town has yet experienced. As it was, little damage was done, as owing to the continued threatening weather, all who are exposed on the hillsides, were prepared with drain ditches, etc.

W. D. Maynard has been appointed superintendent of the Reed M. & M. Co. No work has been done on this property for some time, and a few hundred dollars judiciously expended would make it among the producing properties of the district. William Armstrong, one of the corporation, is expected to arrive shortly, when it is thought work will be immediately resumed.

CORRESPONDENCE.

Eureka, Nev., Aug. 7, 1894.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE GAZETTE:

Two years ago ever seven thousand citizens of Nevada, Republican and Democratic, convened that the national platform of both Republican and Democratic parties were in essence and simply framed to benefit the votes of the silver voters of the south and west and the votes of the gold voters of the North and East, and that both of the old parties were controlled by Wall street and the National banks upon the silver question, with spontaneity seldom witnessed in political matters resolved thereafter to act independently of previous political affiliations, and for the best interests of Nevada.

In pursuance of the resolution they organized the Silver party. The party embraced men of all occupations, and in some counties the voters were practically unanimous in favor of the Silver party movement. Only those remained with the old parties who were office-holders or expected office from the incoming administration and those who were in a great measure dependent upon corporations or office holders or others to such an extent that they dare not express their real sentiments except, perhaps, fifteen hundred really independent, honest, reputable citizens, who combined with the old parties from conviction.

To the extent of my ability I aided the Silver party. The count elements in both of the old parties considered this a high crime, and forthwith Tracy, Blanche and Sweetheart, and the numerous pack of curs of both the old political parties, upon my track; fellows who had fawned upon me, getting down in the dust and licking my boots for favors, prompted by the bigger dogs, commenced abusing me personally as only such curs can do one.

The Reno Gazette has been particularly active in this kind of dirty work. The Silver party, composed as it is of an independent, intelligent, honest and able body of men as can be found anywhere in any State of the Union, is insulted by that paper by such phrases appearing in its columns as "Wallace's Silver Party." Why the poor, miserable idiot that wrote that phrase is not fit to black the boots of the hundred member of the Silver party. The top of his head should be sawed off and the empty cavity filled with a can of water; then it would be better furnished than it is now.

A few days since the Gazette published a letter, dated at Carson, but in fact, I have no doubt, written at Reno by a writer, who recently distinguished himself by maintaining with great earnestness that the price of silver was never influenced by legislation. This silly nonsense of this fellow since he has resided in Nevada has made him a stork in the nostrils of the people of this State. When he wrote that letter he lied and he knew it; he lied with malice aforethought. So far as his personal illusions to me are concerned, I shall not notice them, but his miserable slanders upon the State Central Committee of the Silver party, and upon Judge Cheney, deserve to be stamped, as they are, miserable, contemptible lies. The availability of candidates was not discussed at the recent meeting of the State Central Committee of the Silver party of Nevada. It is not true that I have selected Judge Cheney or any other man for office in Washoe county, or that I have in any way meddled with the local politics of Washoe county. I am neither the independent character of the members of the Silver party of Washoe county nor well to attempt anything of the kind. If I were still a member of the Republican party I should know exactly how to reach the Gazette and its correspondent. The letter is simply weak and silly invention of a mischievous fool for the purpose of arousing jealousy and creating division in the ranks of the silver party, and will deceive no one of ordinary common sense.

Now, Mr. Editor, I have been a resident of Nevada for thirty-four years. During that time I have always been engaged in some honest and useful occupation. I was elected Tax Collector of Lander county in 1883, and have been Assessor of Eureka county consecutively for about twenty years. In 1893 I resigned, not because the County Commissioners "turned me down," for they could neither increase nor diminish my salary, but I quit because I found more lucrative employment. During all my incumbency of office I challenge any man to point to a single stain on my official record.

The Gazette scribbler has much to say about the "sack." I have yet to learn that any party in this State has ever failed to use money at elections when they could get it. Has the "sack" any potency with the Gazette? At the last general election, that debatable sheet professed to favor silver, but opposed the only party that was in favor of silver; professing to be Republican, it supported the candidate of the Silver party, who is a millionaire, for Congress, and opposed the Republican candidate, who is a poor man; was there a "sack" in the back-ground? The Gazette also supported Wm. M. Stewart, who is a rich man, for United States Senator, although he was a candidate of the Silver party, and opposed Bartine, the Republican candidate, who is a poor man; did the "sack" exert an influence in that case? Did the Gazette ever advocate any party or candidate of any party without a "sack" in view? I opine that the virulent personal abuse of myself through the columns of the Gazette is paid for, directly or indirectly. All persons who know the antecedents of the Gazette will readily divine "the power behind the throne."

Now, Mr. Editor, heretofore I have not noticed the private or public attacks upon me personally, but forbearance has ceased to be a virtue. If I was a leader of the Silver

party, and I do not profess to be one, I apprehend it would be quite as respectable as a party led by Coffin, Bragg and Company. The leaders of the Silver party of Nevada do not wear the collar of any man or any corporation, nor do they wear the collar of the United States, nor do they wear the collar of the Silver party. Its leaders are brave, independent, honest and able men. Very few if any, of them are in the party as office seekers, and the dirt-finger in the Gazette directed at these men is as uncalculated for as it is false. No decent man would have penned the attack; no decent journal would have published it, and no decent man will pay any heed to it.

Now, Mr. Editor, I am quite familiar with the record of the parties who prompt these attacks upon me, and unless they call off their hounds I will make the forty from more than one of them before the end of November.
