All who are ready to take out their final papers will have an opportunity during the sitting of the District Court here next week. If not done now no other opportunity will occur before election. Judge Talbot will open the District Court here on Monday next for the transaction of minor business. No trials of cases will occur before November month. All who wish to take out citizen papers will have an opportunity during the coming week.

Judge Talbot arrived last evening from Ely by private conveyance. This evening, in company with General Jones he went to Panaca and to-morrow the two will go on to Ferguson district. Judge Talbot will return in season to open the District Court here on Monday next.

General John E. Jones the Silver Party nominee for Governor came in from Ely last night by private conveyance. Today he was renewing old acquaintances about town and this evening went to Panaca from which place he will go to Ferguson district to-morrow. Mr. Jones is making a general tour of the State and will get back to the western part in season to take an active part in the general campaign.

J. E. Morris, who is interested in an extension of the Elko soap mine, brought in nineteen sacks of the stuff to-day to ship to the aluminum works at Los Angeles. Should the test be made prove satisfactory there will be a big demand for the clay and the owners of the property may become millionaires before another year rolls around. There is a fair prospect that something will be done with the property as the deposit carries a high per cent of aluminum.—Elko Independent.

Nearly every candidate on the two county tickets is making free use of printed cards, and since these are novel and surprising are the order of the day, why not depart from the conventional plain card and adopt one with something startling on it, say a photograph and general announcement on the one side, and a certificate of character, or a highly drawn assertive declaration of reason why the applicant should be elected, on the other. Since the main thing is to attract attention, such a course would be very likely to do it.

The conviction of Mrs. Hartley, the murderer of Senator Foley at Reno, of murder in the second degree, meets with general approval in the minds of right thinking people. She may have had a cause of grievance, yet her own testimony of the killing, and as a matter of fact that was the only testimony in the case, outside of proving the death, was sufficient to convict her. She was surprised at the verdict and was very much protested after it, in consideration of which the date for passing sentence has been set for December 1st, and the attorney for the defendant have until the 11th of November in which to prepare and file a bill of exceptions looking to a new trial.

Proposed amendments to the State Constitution are coming on so thick and fast that a safe way to treat the whole subject is to vote against them and support a call for a constitutional convention, as has been urged for some years past. Upwards of twenty amendments are to be voted on at the coming election, some of which are so related to each other that confusion is bound to result. To all propositions of amendment at the last session, our Senator C. H. Patchen stood firm in opposition, in each instance calling for a constitutional convention to adopt another constitution for our government, more in line than the present one, with changed condition of things.

Langford and Smith are pushing machinery and supplies along into Sterling District. The first lot of machinery contained a saw mill and this is now in operation getting out lumber and timber for the mill and necessary houses. The machinery now en route is principally for the mill, also water pipe. The haul from Milford is about 280 miles mostly over a desert road. Teams leave Pahrangat Valley at Eisenmann's ranch and go via Summit and Quartz Springs and Indian Creek.

The lessees on the Gold Cup claim at Ferguson have recently opened up a four foot vein of high grade ore. The find was made in the new shaft which now has attained a depth of about 70 feet. Assays made from the new find run as high as \$130 to the ton and if the quantity continues as at present, another ore producer is added to the mines of Ferguson District. The ledge on this claim is somewhat broken up at the north end where it is a direct continuation of the April Fool, but the belief has always existed that the ore chimneys of the April Fool claim, could hardly terminate with its surface lines, and that belief is sustained in the new find in the Gold Cup.

Since cutting into the immense manganese ledge about a month ago, in their drift toward the Apex vein the lessees on the Flagstaff mine at Ferguson District have been constantly on the lookout for an ore body. The strike of the manganese vein was nearly northwest and southeast. It was early worked, and to the southeast a drift was prosecuted for some 75 feet when suddenly the manganese was abruptly cut off by an immense quartz ledge, the full width of which has not yet been fully determined. In prospecting this ledge two ore seams have thus far been found, one of which runs \$20.50 to the ton, and the other \$92.50. This ledge is thought to be the Boss vein, or to be directly connected with it, and the present development is about 175 feet east of the ore discovery which was made in December last. The outlook is good and ore shipments are looked for within thirty days.

TELEGRAPH NOTES.

Forty persons were injured in a railway accident at Moudry, in Spain. It is rumored that the Russian fleet is concentrated at Vladivostok ready for immediate action. It is unlikely she will admit any control of Korean affairs where her own influence is secondary.

Italy's long-continued opposition to the plans of France in North Africa have brought upon her the displeasure of Germany and England. As long ago as in Bismarck's regime France and Germany came to a close understanding on the entire African question, which has since been maintained.

A Russian newspaper gives the astonishing intelligence that 40,000 well-armed and drilled Poles are in this country and Russia, ready to engage in a war for Polish liberation.

Keeta, Balarios and Bustamente were discharged from the custody of the United States by Judge Morrow, who held that while the acts charged were sufficiently proven, it was not proven they were not the acts of a de facto military occupation not amenable to the civil courts.

Brooklyn, Sept. 22.—Shortly before midnight to night the iron ship "Glen Ellen," lying at Watson's stores, Brooklyn, with 50,000 cases of kerosene, was discovered on fire. An investigation showed the oil in the hold was on fire, and within a short time the entire inside of the vessel was in flames. It is thought the vessel will be a total loss. The ship is owned by J. R. DeWolf & Co., of Liverpool. Fifty thousand cases of kerosene of the 75,000 which were to constitute her cargo had been already loaded.

Topeka, Kan., Sept. 23.—About a hundred of the suffrage women of Topeka will come into an agreement with Dr. Eva Harding and Dr. Agnes Haviland, which is to be reduced to writing. This agreement describes the costume. It is to consist of Turkish trousers, covered by a shirt reaching to the fold, a close or loose waist, as the wearer may prefer, and cloth leggings to match the trousers. It is the intention of the Topeka women to organize into relief squads, so a number of them may be on the streets all day, and thus the community will become familiar with the reform.

Mancos, Colo., Sept. 23.—News of a fatal shooting affair at Gileonda yesterday has just been received. Captain G. A. Jackson, superintendent of the J. M. & E. and Double Standard Mining Companies, discharged a number of employees, among them A. J. Sparks. Sparks armed himself and announced his intention of killing Jackson. When Sparks appeared at the camp Jackson commanded him to throw up his hands. This Sparks refused to do, so Jackson fired twice, the second shot killing Sparks instantly.

Desver, Sept. 23.—During a row between warring factions in the Arabian Settlement to-night in which about fifty Arabians were engaged, Mrs. Eisel Abhan was hit in the back with a brick and kicked in the abdomen, causing her to give premature birth to a child. The infant's body was split open by the force of the blows inflicted upon the mother, who lies at the point of death. Abih Fekan and John Dewallby were arrested, charged with manslaughter.

St. Louis, Mo., Sept. 23.—Dr. Carver to-day, by a score of 95 to 88, defeated Will Crosby, the champion of southern Illinois, in the second of the three 100 live bird matches. Crosby was the victor yesterday. Carver started in with a lead and kept it until the end. About 500 people were present. The remaining match will be shot to-morrow.

PLATFORM. The Silver Party of Nevada, in Convention assembled, at Carson City, on the 4th day of September, 1904, declare that platforms should assert cardinal principles of justice with respect to questions of political interest and present moment without equivocation or evasion. We hold that history has demonstrated that these principles are right and equitable, and their observance necessary to secure the welfare and individual happiness for which this Government was established.

WE DENY THE RIGHT OF ABRIDGING THE RIGHT OF FREE COINAGE OF SILVER TO STANDARD MONEY AT THE LEGAL RATIO OF 16 TO 1 INDEPENDENT OF ANY OTHER NATION, IS A DENIAL OF THE SOVEREIGNTY OF THE PEOPLE OF THE UNITED STATES AS A NATION AND INDEPENDENT STATE, AND A LAW IN RESTRAINT AND ABRIDGMENT OF PRODUCT IN AND COMMERCE.

WE DEMAND THE COLLECTION OF THE INDEBTEDNESS OF THE PACIFIC RAILWAY COMPANIES OF THE UNITED STATES AS A LEGAL TENDER FOR DEBT OF THE PUBLIC OR CHANGE OF TERMS OR CONDITIONS. A public office is a public trust. No person or party should be trusted who has care violated that trust. Every citizen should contribute to the support of the Government in proportion to his means and in accordance with the necessity of good Government, but no Government should augment this burden or enlarge the necessity by unnecessary, needless interest bearing debt making useless expenditures, or by falling to promptly collect what is justly due it, whether it be a loan, a tax or a liability.
