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LOCAL AND OTHERWISE.

J. G. Brown was up from Panaca on Monday.

Reno papers claim that the town is overrun with hard characters.

Sadis Summerfield has been confirmed by the senate as United States district attorney for Nevada.

District Attorney McNamee completed the school examination on Friday and returned to DeLamar on Saturday last.

Fifty miners were drafted last week by the Manhattan Company at Austin. The mill has been closed down and a gloom has been cast over the town.

Coasting has been fine for a week past. The old folks don't appear to enjoy the sport as much as in former years. At any rate we don't see them out so often.

The late cold snap did not interfere with work at the summit mill. Since the cold snap in December heaters have been put in and all exposed pipes wrapped and boxed.

White Pine County manages each year to call in several of her outstanding 6 per cent bonds. The treasurer sends out notice now for the surrender of six, amounting to \$1500.00.

Leaf Stinette died at Eldorado Canyon this county Christmas day. He was a half brother to A. L. Price. He was working for the Southwestern Mining Company.

Sheriff Freudenthal is expected to arrive home next Monday. He will begin his assessing tour in the southern part of the county earlier this year than last and proposes to start south early in March.

Geo. V. Warren is storing ice in the old cellar formerly connected with the Bank Exchange restaurant on Main St. The ice is twenty inches thick of excellent quality and comes from Condor Canyon.

Information is wanted by the postmaster at Ely, of John or Jack Stager, a prospector, who was last heard of by his friends in the east from Ely in 1885. Stager was in and around Pioche during 1888.

Stage business on the Milford route is reported as light, except on the north end where travel to and from Stataline and Deerledge keeps up a steady stream. A special runs from Desert Springs for the accommodation of passengers and to carry mail.

The result of the teacher's examinations last week was that the whole class passed, and with good percentages. Certificates were issued to each applicant and there will be no lack of local material to wield the rod in our county schools next fall.

The new Wilfley concentrating table for the Summit mill arrived on Monday. It will be in place and operating within a day or two. This will enable the mill to put through about 1000 tons of ore a month. The working force will shortly be increased.

John and Phil Smith have bought the Vietti sawmill in the mountains south of DeLamar, and will shortly move it to a timber patch east of Meadow Valley Wash in the vicinity of Pennsylvania district where a million or two feet of timber can be got out.

Last Thursday afternoon at Dutch Flat, Mrs. John Smith slipped and in falling, threw out her right arm. The contact with the ground resulted in a compound fracture between the wrist and elbow. She came up to Panaca on Friday and Dr. Campbell was summoned from here and went down to set the broken limb. The lady promises to be all right in a few weeks.

Deerledge is not mentioned as a point on the new mail route between here and Milford. This is probably because no postoffice has been established at Deerledge as yet. There are people enough there already however to justify opening one, and the probabilities are that before the new service begins in July the route will be changed so as to include Deerledge.

Denton-Hunter.

The wedding of Will A. Denton and Miss Ella Hunter took place last Thursday evening the 13th. at the residence of Senator J. A. Denton here, according to announcements previously made.

Friends of the contracting parties and of the family to exceed 150 in number responded to invitations and the ceremony was performed by Herman Hartung, Justice of the Peace here, in the dining room of the hotel in the presence of as many as could gather in the room. The only fault the young ladies present were able to find, was that the ceremony was too short.

The bride and groom were arrayed the occasion and the immediate members of both families stood up with them. Immediately after the ceremony, an adjournment was had to Thompson's hall where one of the best dances of the season took place, lasting till five o'clock the following morning, over 175 being in attendance.

Beginning at midnight supper was served at the hotel and the dancers went off in sections, but the "ball kept rolling". Panaca was well represented, where Will Denton has many friends and the four horse coach and several private vehicles came up loaded in the afternoon.

Miss Hunter, the bride, formerly lived in Eureka, and the presents sent in, came from there and DeLamar and from those in attendance. They numbered upwards of fifty, too numerous to mention individually, and embrace articles of jewelry, silverware, glassware etc. customary on such occasions, some thoughtful ones contributing bed covering, flour, and a good sized ham.

Mail Route Ordered Changed.

The discussion of mail routes which has been going on some months past has taken definite form. The Post Office Department has decided to change the route between Milford and DeLamar so as to run via Stataline, Utah; Newlands or Spring Valley; Ursine, or Eagle Valley; Pioche, thence to Panaca. Another separate route will run from Panaca to DeLamar.

The distance on this route from Milford to Panaca is 116 miles, which is practically the same length as the present route to Pioche and the only difference to us will be that Pioche will be on the main line and our mail will arrive two hours earlier than now. All outside points having business with the county seat will be benefitted by the change; much time will be saved, particularly between here and DeLamar, while Stataline and Deerledge, two promising camps will be in close communication.

This change was recommended strongly last Summer and present action is due to a confirmation by a late postal agent who inspected the route, of other similar reports previously sent in.

Notices are out at the Panaca office for the submission of bids for carrying the mails over these routes for four years from the 1st day of July next, and all bids must be in by 24th inst.

A Quikie Jail.

Panaca now possesses one of the strongest and at the same time least expensive jails in the country. Court house rock, which stands at the north end of the Main St of the town has been utilized. A good sized passage way about 14 feet long has been cut and a chamber excavated in the solid rock about 12 x 14 feet in size. It will probably be needed most for old drunks, and their noise will never disturb the neighbors.

The Traction Engines.

A subject that has been talked of a great deal within the past week is the new scheme of delivering wood to the DeLamar mill. It is the object now of the DeLamar Company to haul their own wood and this will be done by means of two steam wagons. One of the wagons will haul a load of thirty cords and the other a load of fifty to seventy five cords at a trip and travel at the rate of four miles an hour.

One of the new machines will be in operation in about a month from now and the other will soon follow. They are built to haul a load up a fifteen per cent grade, which will enable them to pass over any part of the road loaded, that is now near the timber.

As will be seen in another column the Company are advertising for 100 wood choppers to commence work immediately and the first place selected is that near the Vietti saw mill, from which the wood will be obtained. There is but one contract our now with parties for 1000 cords and when that is filled, hauling the wood by horses to the DeLamar mill will be a thing of the past.—Lode.

The Silver Gar.

There are fishes comparatively common that it is almost impossible to keep alive in captivity, or even to make captive without injury. Among these is the silver gar. This fish is found in considerable numbers in these waters in summer; in southern waters it is common. It attains a length of two feet, is extremely slender and spindle in form, and its head and jaws are pretty nearly a quarter of its length, the jaws tapering almost to a point. It is liable when captured to do injury in the net either to the tip of the long jaws or to some part of its slender body. It is accustomed to swimming near the surface, in well-aerated water. Silver gar taken in Gravesend bay, though handled with the greatest care, have died before they could be got to the aquarium in this city. The silver gar is very different from the hardy, bony gar, of which there are several specimens now at the aquarium.—N. Y. Sun.
