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LOCAL AND OTHERWISE.

Sunday night last was the coldest of the season.

Sheriff Frensdahl returned last night from a ten weeks trip to Chicago and other eastern points.

Eggs are selling at three dozen for a dollar and are scarce at that.

Harry Turner took a run out to Deerledge for three days and returned on Sunday. He believes that district will come out all right this year.

Mr. John Smith, who suffered a broken arm from a fall at Dutch Flat last week, was up on Saturday. Dr. Campbell examined the break and found it to be mending nicely.

Ben Sanders is fitting up the stone building adjoining the postoffice on Main St. as a law office, and will make his headquarters here after the first of the month.

Hon. Geo. S. Sawyer has taken his son Geo. O. in as a partner in the practice of law. Hereafter the firm name will be Sawyer & Sawyer, and their office will be on Lacour St at the old place.

John Vietti is keeping a sharp look out on his interests in Eagle Valley District. A proposition is on foot to bond his interests for a good round sum. He passed through here on his return to DeLamar last Sunday.

Col. R. H. Aiken of Salt Lake, a mining man of long experience took the bond from Lytle, and others on the Eagle Valley properties on Tuesday. We hope he will go to work with vigor and open the claims up.

W. J. Kennedy, representing the Con. Impl. Co. of Milford was in town on Tuesday. He is making a general tour and will return to Milford via Pahrangat, The Muddy Valley St. George, Utah, thence north.

As a result of extensive and judicious advertising in the local papers of Carson by the home merchants the practice of sending to San Francisco for goods, has been practically stopped. Two candidates for State offices on the Silver party side have come forward in Storey county, says the Virginia Report. Joe Josephs for Secretary of State and Frank Langan for Attorney General are in the fight. These two are open announcement but according to other advices, Storey county has an aspirant for each office on the state ticket.

The summit mill started up on Monday, a day or two later than expected on account of cold few days previous which affected some of the pipes. A second Wilfley concentrating table has been put in, new shoes and the present run is expected to be continuous. The new table increases the capacity to between 35 and 40 tons a day.

The children hereabouts are not through with the rounds of Chicken pox apparently, though there are fewer cases than were reported a month ago. We don't hear of children over 13 or 14 years being affected. Though some of the cases are accompanied with sore of the throat, which has caused alarm in several cases, no fatalities are reported, nor any serious results from any that have suffered from the epidemic.

THE PECK BROTHERS.

Their Process For Working Tailings Has Both Made and Cost Them a Lot of Money.

The Carson Appeal recently published an article which reflected severely on the integrity of the Peck Brothers, and their patented process for working tailings. It was evidently based on occurrences which have recently taken place at Dayton in Douglas county, where the Peck's had one of their plants in operation.

The Peck concentrator has cost its patentee over a million dollars in all and after expending large sums the inventor failed for over \$125,000 before it was put in operation. Peck's creditors offered to release him for fifty cents on the dollar. The offer was accepted until he could get his feet, when with his concentrator in successful operation, Mr. Peck paid his obligations dollar for dollar with six per cent interest.

The process, being special, works with varying degrees of extraction according to the bases contained in the tailing or slimes which are being treated, and consequently it has failures to record as well as successes.

A month or two ago the Dayton mill, shortly after starting, broke down, and the machinery had to be replaced by special castings made in Pennsylvania. During the shut down, Douglas, one of the parties interested in the tailings there, levied an attachment against the whole plant. It is thought to be a plan to freeze the Peck Bros. out, and the Appeal article is a part of the game.

J. E. Peck, who has the lease on the Bullionville pits has expended some \$30,000.00 in putting in his mill there, and is now in Chicago making final arrangements about his plant.

Justice's Court.

The Justice's Court was occupied all of Tuesday afternoon with a case between John Frei and Gus Yorda. Frei sued to recover \$140.00 on a note given by Yorda last Summer. Yorda defended on the ground that the note was void, that it was given without consideration as it represented expenses which Frei claimed he was out in bringing to this country, the woman, whom Yorda afterwards married. The case was tried before a jury of 8 men who brought in a verdict for Yorda, with costs.

TEMPLE BAR COMPANY.

At Work on Its Extensive System of Placers.

The Kingman Miner says: "The Temple Bar Consolidated Mining company has twenty men at work at Temple Bar putting in the big piers and glauze boom. The company expects to have the work completed before the spring rise in the river."

The work is going on about twelve miles above Riville, on the Colorado river, and it will be remembered that this same enterprise was interrupted last Spring, and a good portion of the company's work destroyed by a sudden rise in the river due to general storm in Utah, Arizona and Colorado. By the time the waters subsided it was too late to finish the work. It is intended to catch several thousand cords of drift wood during high water in the Spring season as otherwise wood must be brought up the river on steamers at great expense.

The company has about 1800 acres of placer ground and has extensive system of work mapped out and one which will involve an expenditure of some \$200,000.00 to complete.

With gold producing properties at the extreme northern and southern lines of our country it is safe to say that many a gold mine yet remains undiscovered between the two points, and it lends strength to the assertion that Lincoln is the richest in mineral resources of any county in the State.

Another Bond on Eagle Valley Mines.

Chas. Lytle, Geo. Moody, and Jas Knight came in from Eagle Valley District on Monday to execute bond on certain property they are interested in there. F. R. McNamee and Jack Ryson, came in also from DeLamar being interested. A working bond was given time not made public on the Lytle group consisting of the Goldbug, Idlewild, Sledgehammer, Sunrise, Chippy and Water Canyon Millsite. The figures also are private but are said to be between \$50,000 and \$100,000.

STATELINE MILL.

Running Satisfactorily and Its Capacity to Be Doubled.
