OPENING OF THE SENATE AND ASSEMBLY.

At 12 o'clock Monday the Senate was called to order by Acting Governor Sadler. Prayer by Rev. Mr. Nash. T. J. Osborne was chosen temporary secretary, and P. S. Corbett temporary sergeant at arms.

The six newly elected senators presented their credentials and were sworn in by Chief Justice Belknap. The entire number, fifteen senators answered to the roll.

A. J. McCune of Storey, was chosen president pro tem, the three Republicans voting for Keyser of Churchill.

Keyser read the list of attaches nominated at the Silver caucus last evening. All being duly sworn in, Governor Sadler called Mr. McCune to the chair and presented him with the gavel, resigning to him his seat as President of this honorable body.

A vote of thanks was given to Chief Justice Belknap for his services.

A committee of three waited on Governor Sadler, notifying him that the Senate was now organized and ready for business, and another committee of three similarly notified the Assembly.

Secretary of State Howell called the Assembly to order, and appointed N. W. Raff temporary chief clerk.

The roll of the Assembly was called and all reported present.

Rev. Mr. Eddy of Carson then opened the session with prayer.

G. R. Bradley was appointed temporary sergeant at arms.

Judge Bonfield was invited to visit the Assembly chambers and administer the oath of office to the members.

Permanent officers and attaches chosen by the caucus was elected as above named.

A message was received by the Senate and Assembly from the Governor transmitting his first biennial message, and announcing that he had appointed E. D. Kelley as his private secretary.

The Senatorial caucus resulted as follows: Senator Jones received the endorsement of the entire Assembly, [with the exception of the two Republican members, Hodgkinson of Washoe, and Oliver of Ormsby, who did not participate in the caucus. Five Senators also absented themselves from the caucus, viz: Summerfield, Kasser and Mills, Republicans, and Comins and Skages, Independents. The ballot of the joint caucus gave Mr. Jones 35 votes and Mr. Nixon 3, the latter being the Humboldt delegation.

Immediately after the adjournment of the caucus, Messrs. Powning and Gorman invited the entire membership of both houses, as well as many others, to the Arlington, and champagne flowed freely amid eulogistic speeches of Nevada's veteran Senator.

A Pleasant surprise.

Monday evening about forty-five persons met at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. A. S. Thompson and from there went in a body to the residence of Mr. F. W. Dickle, where the Hon. G. F. Talbot resides during his stay here in court sessions and agreeably surprised his Honor. The Judge was out taking a walk at the time the merry party arrived at the house and all were seated inside when he came home and found his quarters in the possession of a jovial throng. The evening was spent most pleasantly, dancing, card-playing, instrumental and vocal music took up the greater part of the evening. About 12 o'clock all sat down to an elegant spread to which ample justice was done. About 2:30 after wishing the Judge a pleasant ride home and the pleasure of meeting again, took their departure.

Sheriff Freudenthal and Deputy-sheriff Jake Johnson left Tuesday evening with J. Seeley, Wm. Latimer and Wm. Owsley for the Penitentiary. Seeley is sentenced for one year; Wm. Latimer for three years and six months and Wm. Owsley for five years. This is the most that has been sent from Lincoln county at one sitting in twenty years. Justice being meted out in this manner will have a good effect on the general tongs that come into the county.
