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LOCAL AND OTHERWISE.

Wesley Williams and Dave Borland were in town on Monday from Jack Rabbit District.

T. J. Osborne left on yesterday's stage for Salt Lake on a business trip and will be absent about a week.

Wilkes Campbell is recovering nicely from a poisoned hand which has practically laid him up for the past ten days.

Sheriff Freudenthal landed his wards, John Bingham and Combs safely at the Reno Asylum on Saturday.

Mrs. W. A. Liston, after upwards of a month spent here under the care of Dr. Campbell, returned home on Monday much improved in health.

The two older children of Wm. Whentley are recovering from attacks of what is supposed to be scarletina, something unusual for this section of country.

Governor Sadler has sold his interest in the mine adjoining the Diamond mine in Eureka to the Diamond Mining Co., for \$13,000.—Free Press.

Warm days but pleasant nights will probably rule for a month to come, though the weather of the past week has been of good summer temperature.

The Board of County Commissioners hold their regular monthly meeting on Monday next. Be sure and itemize your bills and file them before noon on Monday.

Business is light in and around the court house just now. With the exception of the Assessor's office, where the assessment roll is being made up, a general lull prevails.

Miss Louise Evans is under Dr. Campbell's care for an attack of fever. No serious consequences are feared but the opening of school will be delayed for a week or so, in consequence.

All the books and office effects of the Phoenix Reduction Co. have been moved from Bullionville to the Pioche Con. Co's office here and the Peck Bros. are in full charge at Bullionville.

The post office at Bullionville was ordered closed last month but a resumed there caused the order to be rescinded and the Department of the operations about to be reconsidered within two days after it was issued and Bullionville will retain its post-office.

The Peck Bros. are making rapid headway with the work of reconstructing the Bullionville mill. The old pans and settlers have been taken out, the building re-roofed and it will soon be in condition to receive the new machinery. The old mill hardly be recognizable to even its old friends when the new operations begin.

The proposition to construct a telephone line between here and Bullionville has been abandoned. It was thought a phone line would possess many advantages, and denying the right of the Board to reject the lowest bid when funds are advertised, and order a re-advertisement.

The \$1600.00 in the fund is now being advertised for the third time. At the opening of bids in July and in August, plaintiff was among the lowest bidders, but a majority of the Board voted to reject the bids and ordered the money re-advertised.

The present suit will determine whether the Board can re-advertise indefinitely, and thus place any value they desire on scrip against the General Fund, and is of more than passing interest since it involves the finances of every man who holds such claims or who may hereafter be called to serve as a district court juror, school census marshal, or in any capacity where payment is to be made from the General Fund.

Letter from Ely. A gentleman who left this section ten days ago and went to Ely expecting to drop on to something from general reports extant of the place, writes back as follows to a friend here:

We arrived here safely after a hot and tedious journey. I find things very quiet and much misrepresented. The company is completing a ten stamp mill, but working only a few men in the mines and there is no show to get work till they start up the mill, and that may be a month yet.

I cannot advise anyone to come here at present in the hope of obtaining work. The company is putting up a telephone line between here and Eureka. They have finished their ditch and waterworks but have not yet put in their dynamo or machinery. There are a great many men here looking for work.

At Temple Bar.

The Company operating on the Colorado, twenty miles above Rioville will be delayed longer than expected in getting its plant in.

The high water of last spring came so suddenly as to stop operations on the big flume but work is not being resumed.

The last issue of the Mohave County Miner says:

H. J. DeLamar returned from Temple Bar last Thursday afternoon. He reports that the piers, built in the river a few months ago, are all right and now the glance boom will be attracted to them and floodwood gathered right along. The big plant for working the auriferous gravel deposits is in course of construction in San Francisco and will be shipped to the mines in about two months.

Mr. Sneed, the new minister of the Episcopal Church here, held regular morning and evening services at the church on Sunday last, delivering two interesting and pleasant sermons. He is a young man and is being well spoken of. We hope he will be successful in his new field of work.

The Hamden Minstrel's held forth two nights here. The first night witnessed a full house but the second played to almost empty benches and immediately after the show they hunched up and pulled out for Meadow Valley Wash. When a show falls in on us from the outside we expect it be more than passable.

Mining matter continue to move evenly but we are not able to chronicle any new strikes. The prospects in the quartzite to the south of Cedar Wash look encouraging, but the main ledge has not yet been cut in any of them. The mineral formula is very extensive and good assays are frequently found, but the mother vein or pocket has not been encountered.
