A Handsome Gift.

LINE WILL BE BUILT.

Extend to Salt Lake.

The DeLamar Look of August 28, contains the following.

Knowing how the Superintendent of the DeLamar mine and milling Co. and mine boss or superintendent of the mine are respected, we should hardly have anticipated such an insurrection as the telephone message of the latter to Supt Swindler would indicate.

On Friday just before one o'clock, when all the miners were present, the Superintendent received the startling announcement that there was trouble at the mine and Mr. Oxnam did not like to take the responsibility of settling it, and would Mr. Swindler come up. He answered it at he would go at once, and in a moment he was seen to strike the trail. On his arrival at No. 5, he found the miners assembled there and he must have thought he was up against it. Mr. Oxnam stepped forward and in a few well chosen remarks stated that when the report first started, that Supt P. Swindler has sent in his resignation there was at once a call by all for a subscription to be raised for the purpose of showing how much the gentleman, was thought of by all under him and with the proceeds of the subscription they purchased a diamond ring, which they hoped he would wear in remembrance of them, but he trusted that the date was far distant when he would have to say good bye to all. This of course changed the current of his thoughts and it was an embarrassing position, but Mr. Swindler saw the point at once and replied in a nice little speech, saying how surprised he was and pleased with the way the boys had shown their esteem for him and how much he should treasure their gift, and their good wishes.

It was clearly to be seen how moved he was at the confidence and respect his men had placed him in. The surprise, however, did not end here, as Mr. J. Right, shift boss then stepped up to Supt. Swindler and handed him a box identical with the other, asking him to present the contents, another fine diamond ring, to Mr. Oxnam, this turned the tables and Mr. Oxnam was even more surprised than the Superintendent had been, he soon overcame his embarrassment however, and acknowledged his appreciation in a few words of thanks to the miners, stating how pleased he was with the good opinion the men had of him and how much he should treasure their gift.

The affair goes to show that the best of feeling exists between the managers and the miners, a state of things very pleasant to our citizens for whom the managers have done so much on every occasion, and on whom the very life of the camp depends.

Since January 1, 1900, there have been filed in the Secretary of State's office the papers for eighty-three corporations, with an aggregate capital stock valued—in the papers—at \$54,614,200 or about as much as the assessed valuation of the whole State. In the preceding years only forty-five were filed. Most of these companies are from California and the East and they find our Nevada laws more favorable to their organization.

The Supreme Court has issued a writ citing the County Commissioners of Storey to appear before that body on September 3rd and show cause why they should not apportion the county officers on the official ballot at the coming election, as demanded.

The Tribune announced by telegram from Los Angeles recently that W. A. Clark has bought the Terminal road, which he had been after for some time, and that the line was to be extended to Utah. Subsequent information with what had transpired before, proved that it was true but if further proof were needed General Manager F. K. Rule comes out in an official confirmation of it in the San Francisco Chronicle which is the newest reading railroad circles will have for a long time. The line is to be built through to Salt Lake without a connection with the Rio Grande Western, Oregon Short Line, Utah and Pacific, Santa Fe or Southern Pacific. Not only this is officially announced but the Terminal people will be here shortly to look into the local situation. Mr. Rule is quoted in the Chronicle as follows:

"We are certainly going to build the Salt Lake line. We have abundant capital for the purpose and will not be put to the necessity of floating bonds to pay the construction costs. United States Senator W. A. Clark of Montana has become a heavy stock holder in the Terminal line, with the other stockholders will put all the money necessary to see the undertaking accomplished. I may say that the Los Angeles Terminal railway is only fulfilling the plans it has had in view since its organization, which have been delayed until the present time largely on account of the delay in the improvement of San Pedro harbor.

"None of the stock holders of the road have parted with any of their holdings of stock. Senator Clark's interest having been created by the purchase of unissued stock remaining in the treasury of the company. The company is capitalized for \$3,000,000. Of this amount Senator Clark owns one-half.

"Surveyors are at work today surveying a line for the proposed line eastward from Los Angeles. Our first objective point is San Bernardino, a distance of sixty miles. From there the road will be built to Salt Lake City. We shall not build to any western extension of the Union Pacific or Rio Grande Western. We shall not stop until we have reached Salt Lake City, where we can connect with all transcontinental lines having terminal there. We want the business of all lines that are in Salt Lake or will ever get there, among which latter is the Burlington. Work on the surveys which are in charge of Henry Hawgood for many years with the engineering department of the Southern Pacific, will be pushed with all possible speed, and the actual construction work will begin within three months."

It has been hinted, says the Chronicle, that the announcement of the Los Angeles Terminal railway's construction plans is intended to scare the Southern Pacific and Santa Fe into making a bid for the little local line in Southern California, which has fifty-two miles of track between Los Angeles and San Pedro, Los Angeles and Altadena and Los Angeles and Glendale. This is indignantly denied, however, by General Manager Rule. He says that Senator Clark, who has extensive interests both in Utah and southern California, is convinced that the proposition to build the Salt Lake road is an alluring one, and is willing to see it through, while the other stockholders, among whom are Senator Elkins of West Virginia, R. C. Kerens, George B. Leighton, Geo. E. Leighton, S. A. Bennis, John T. Davis and B. F. Horbart, all wealthy residents of St. Louis, are similarly inclined.

The Southern Pacific and Santa Fe have officially announced that a road would be built to Salt Lake. Now comes the Los Angeles Terminal with the same assertion. Ten years ago Chas. Francis Adams graded 135 miles of the line and started to lay track, but he was not backed by his company and the project fell through. The time will realize that in that one respect President Adams showed wonderful foresight. A short time ago the Utah & Pacific was built with but little cost outlay, but when it got to State line it stopped, and the Oregon Short Line to date has, seemingly, refused to help it along further.

It will be remembered that when the Southern Pacific-Santa Fe announcement was made that the road to Salt Lake would be built, President Leighton of the Terminal said

it was all bosh, and if he were at liberty he could at that time tell how and by whom the road would be built.
