At a Meeting of the Silver Party Central Committee of Lincoln County, held on the 27th of August, A. D. 1900, it was ordered that the County Convention for the election of delegates to the State Convention be held on

Tuesday, September 25th, at 10 o'clock A. M. for the purpose of nominating County officers.

The polls to be held at the regular voting places, and to be open at 9 o'clock P. M. of the day.

At these Primaries the following named precincts are allowed the number of delegates set opposite to their names to represent the precincts in the County Convention.
