SMELTERS AFTER ORE.

Down in the neighborhood of old Pioche, there is an endless tonnage of low-grade fluxing ores, it is said, and some of the engineers of the American Smelting and Refining company have preceded the new railroad that is to be built in a short time and taken options on a few of the big properties in that locality. There is no secret about the large smelting plants being in the market for fluxing propositions, and the greater number of independent refiners that are placed in commission down the valley, the stronger the competition for the low-grade properties in the nearby mining camps.

Another feature to this announcement is the fact that the A. S. & R. company have given it out, through its field engineer, that it is the policy of the company to employ a large force of men to mine the low grade ores and upon the completion of the railroad that old camp will be the scene of great activity in the mining industry. In addition to the immense low-grade propositions, there are some valuable minerals in that section, such as is found within the territory being extensively operated by the Nevada-Utah company. At this property a large force of men have been employed in cleaning up the old workings of the mine, and as soon as all the debris has been removed, the management will place several shifts of men to work on developing the property on an extensive scale. —Telegram.

All freight teams that have come in the past six weeks have received all the back loading they wanted, which made it much more profitable for the teamsters. All the back loading is from Bristol, being supplied with ore which Lloyd, Christian and Cook are taking out of the Bristol Copper Company's properties, under lease. We understand that they have enough ore out and in sight to keep the teams supplied for some time to come which is news of the best.

The Local Paper.

Speaking of what a news paper does for a community United States Senator David Davis, of Illinois, made an address that remains ever green in the memories of news paper men. He said: "Every year every local paper gives from 500 to 5000 free lines for the benefit of the community in which it is located. No other agency can or will do this. The editor in proportion to his means does more for his own town than any other man. He ought to be supported not because you happen to like him or admire his writing, but because a local paper is the best investment a community can make. It may not be crowded with great thought, but financially it is of more benefit than both preacher and teacher. Today editors do more for less pay than any men on earth. COMPLIMENTARY

H. E. Freudenthal, who was in charge of the Mineral Exhibit at the St. Louis World's Fair and his wife, who was Hostess of the Nevada State Building received Sunday from the Exposition officials each a bronze medal.

In the composition of the obverse of the medal are shown two figures, one of which, Columbia, tall and stately, is about to envelop the youthful maiden by her side, typifying the Louisiana Territory, in the flag of the stars and stripes, thus receiving her into the sisterhood of States. The other figure is depicted in the act of divesting herself of the cloak of France, symbolized in the emblem Napoleon, the busy bee, embroidered thereon. In the background is shown the rising sun, the dawn of a new era to the nation.

The reverse of the medal shows an architectural tablet bearing an inscription giving the grade of the medal. Below the tablet are two dolphins symbolizing our eastern and western boundaries, the whole surmounted by an American Eagle, spreading its wings from ocean to ocean.

The medal was designed by Adolph A. Weinman. The design was approved by a committee composed of J. Q. A. Ward, Daniel C. French and Augustus T. Gaudens.

The dies were engraved and the medals struck by the United States Government Mint at Philadelphia. The alloy for the medals was made especially for the Exposition after samples were submitted and passed upon by expert medalists.

F. W. Burke, a former resident of Reno, who three years ago obtained \$3,190 from Governor Sparks, was arrested at Pocatello, Idaho, last Tuesday, and is now on the way to Reno to answer the charge. Governor Sparks alleges that Burke in February, 1903, asked him to sign a note payable to the Investment and Loan Company of Denver for \$3,190. This money, Burke claimed, was to be used in purchasing cattle and the cattle were to be given to Governor Sparks as security for the payment of the note. Instead of buying the cattle Burke pocketed the money and left Reno. From that time until shortly before the warrant was issued, Burke was not heard from.
