SALT LAKE ROUTE.

A year ago this month the "Salt Lake Route," or, more strictly speaking, the San Pedro Los Angeles & Salt Lake Railroad, completed its line between Salt Lake and Los Angeles, and already it has proven a great blessing and benefit to the immense area of country that it has brought into touch with the outside world, and the volume of business transacted by this new road has been much in excess of the most sanguine hopes and expectations of its promoters. As a cut-off from Salt Lake to Los Angeles it has had a wonderful passenger traffic, and its business in the freight-carrying line has been most satisfactory in every respect. As a matter of fact, every officer of the Company is well pleased with the business for the first year, but the most gratifying feature of the building and operation of the road has been the decided stimulus it has given to numerous mining camps and districts along its route; and these are forging to the front in a manner that is astonishing to those who are acquainted with conditions under which they formerly labored. In Lincoln county, Nevada, especially, are to be seen the beneficial results of convenient and speedy transportation, and in this locality there has been a resurrection of old camps that is truly marvelous to behold while many new ones have come into existence since it has been made possible to advantageously operate in sections along the line or contiguous thereto. Caliente, Nevada, has scored a substantial growth since the completion of the road. Las Vegas, now a "giant of the desert," owes its origin and success to this new through line. Searchlight, "the camp without a failure," has more than doubled in size and importance since the "Salt Lake Route" went through; Nippeno and Crescent have taken on new life and vigor, and all is push and pleasing activity at Good Springs and adjoining camps; while, as for Pioche and DeLamar more heavy work and successful operation is noticeable in these great wealth-producing sections than ever before.

Mining camp traffic has been heavy with the "Salt Lake Route" ever since its first through train announced the completion of its line. Since then there has been a steady unloading of mining supplies and machinery of every kind and character, while, coming to the smelters of Salt Lake valley, there has been a constant stream of ore which, in itself, is undisputable proof that in the country opened up by the road there abound mining camps that are rich in their possession of great wealth producers.

The success that has attended the "Salt Lake Route" during the past year has placed this enterprise far beyond the realm of an experiment. It has done more, for it has demonstrated the wisdom of its promoters, and it has given to Salt Lake and Los Angeles, and intermediate region, something for which they will ever feel thank ful.—Salt Lake Mining Review.

J. E. Davison, the district attorney of Esmeralda county, against whom charges of a serious nature had been pending for some time, was removed from office last week by the County Commissioners. Efforts had been made with a view to secure his resignation but without avail, so the commissioners raised his bond from \$5000 to \$55,000. As he was unable to secure the requisite bond, the commissioners declared the office vacant, appointing Frank Douglas as his successor. The deposed official has signified his intention of carrying his case to the higher courts.

It is claimed that the Nevada wool clip will fall considerably below the average this year.

A contract has been let for the construction of the left wing of the Riverside hotel at Reno. The improvements will cost \$50,000.

Nearly a quarter of a million dollars consigned to the bank of Nevada at Reno laid out all night last week at the depot of that place.

Nineteen applications for physician certificates were made at the session of the State Board of Medical Examiners at Carson last week.

There is a feeling in Fallon against the incoming of so many Mexicans and they are being run out of town at every opportunity.—Herald.

Daniel Casey, who was stabbed by Sherman Bryan at Mill Station last week, is dead, of the wound. The autopsy showed that he died of peritonitis.

Wadsworth, one of the best known towns in Western Nevada, once a railroad city of considerable magnitude, may soon be a dry town, the only one in the State of Nevada. This distinction is about to be thrust upon the place by the Interior Department of the United States Government, as the Indian bureau fears that liquor is in some manner finding its way into the hands and stomachs of Piutes quartered on the Pyramid Lake reservation. The whole of Wadsworth is within the reservation lines.

Manhattan's professional force has been augmented by a lawyer from San Francisco, Miss B. M. Wilson, for some years past the secretary of the United States circuit court of appeals. While enjoying a very honorable and lucrative position in the coast metropolis, Miss Wilson believed in the wider horizon and greater opportunities to be found in a live mining camp, and selected Manhattan as the most promising opening. The dullness created by the fire did not change her opinion, and she is preparing for a mining brokerage business, in combination with legal work, and possible other investments in the town.

"All San Franciscans who are not obliged to but their money into buildings and commercial interests in that city," says Miss Wilson, "are looking to the mines to give them speedy returns for investment. I predict a greater interest than before in mines and mining stocks, especially those showing good development work done."

Miss Wilson has the distinction of being the first woman admitted to practice in the federal courts on the Pacific coast and has a unique certificate in her office in the new Vermilyea building on Erie street.—Manhattan News.
