CLIFFORD NEIL GOES BACK TO FACE CHARGE. Miner Accused of a Statutory Offense Against Bessie Farnsworth, Seventeen Years Old of Bingham, Accompanies Officer to Utah to Stand Trial. Clifford Neil, arrested last Friday night by Deputy Sheriff Fitzgerald at the request of the sheriff of Salt Lake county, was returned to Utah Wednesday morning in charge of Deputy Sheriff Jack Forbes of Bingham; Governor Dickinson having recognized the requisition from Governor Spry.

Neil is a miner and is charged with having committed a statutory offense against Bessie Farnsworth, 17 years old, of Bingham. The date of the alleged offense is May 20, 1908. Neil had been in Pioche only a short time.
