MUCH TALKED OF MERGER.

It is a source of universal regret in Pioche that the Nevada-Utah Mines & Smelters and Ohio-Kentucky companies failed to reach an agreement respecting the consolidation of the properties in which they are jointly interested in this camp. Greatest hopes were held out that this matter would be settled while the representatives of the two corporations were on the ground; but it seemed impossible for them to come any closer to an understanding than they did six months ago. Several subsequent conferences were held in Salt Lake and still they could not agree. It appears that the Nevada-Utah company insisted on 51 per cent of the stock in a new holding company which it was proposed to organize; while the Ohio-Kentucky officials would not listen to this one minute. They were willing to go in on a half and half basis; but further than that they were unwilling to make any further concessions. Besides the 51 per cent interest in the stock, it is said that President Learnard of the Nevada-Utah insisted on a majority representation on the board of directors; which was objectionable to the representatives of the Ohio-Kentucky, who declared that to acquiesce to such a proposition as that would simply amount to giving one of the most valuable mines in Pioche over to the control of the Nevada-Utah, which was the very thing they had objected to from the very beginning of the negotiations. It was satisfactory to the representatives of the Ohio-Kentucky for each company to name an equal number of men to represent them on the board, three each, leaving the seventh member to be selected by the original six members. This was not satisfactory to Mr. Learnard, who fought for the extra one per cent.

The Record believes, however, that the merger will be made and that a satisfactory understanding will have been reached not later than April 1. Before Mr. Learnard left the Utah capital for the east he urged the Ohio-Kentucky officials to meet him in New York ten days later and they have consented to do so. We believe the whole matter will be fixed up then and that orders will soon be given to place these mines on the active list again.

Salt Lake papers quote Mr. Learnard with having made the significant assertion that both properties are too valuable to lie idle very long; that they will be worked. He made this statement just as he was about to leave for home.
