The Horn Silver property has been idle since last fall but plans have been about completed to resume development work in the near future.

MANGANESE ORE FROM THE PRINE CON. MINE.

The Prince Consolidated management has begun hauling 300 tons of manganese ore for shipment to the Tintic smelter.

Superintendent Lloyd, however has experienced difficulty in securing teams and for that reason has not been getting the ore out as rapidly as he expected to. The product is being brought over the divide to the Pioche depot, where it is being loaded onto cars for dispatch to the Tintic plant.

The Prince management, until the railroad is built around to the mine, does not expect to break any records in the way of getting out ore. But with transportation facilities at hand, it will be a different story.

In the meantime, there is no let-up in the campaign of development and every day's work sees the ore reserves showing up better and better.

SEARCHLIGHT ENGINEER PAYS VISIT TO POCHE.

M. L. Cook, engineer for the Quartette and other mining companies at Searchlight, was in the city this week on a brief business trip and was quite disappointed because he had no opportunity to visit some of the local mines. He says conditions at Searchlight are quite satisfactory in a mining way and that the Quartette is maintaining the usual production of gold bullion.

SEVEN HUNDRED IN THE BOSTON & POCHE.

From the direction of the Boston & Pioche mine, controlled by the Scott Mines company comes the information that conditions on the 700 level have materially improved during the past week. A large body of mill ore was encountered recently on this level.

It is understood that Superintendent Pembroke has a car load of high grade ore ready for shipment which was encountered in development.

PAUL WALKER COMES TO SEE GOLDEN PRINCE

Paul Walker, of Topeka, Kansas, was here this week to inspect the Golden Prince and Gold & Silver Prince mines in which he is interested as a shareholder.

Mr. Walker is assistant to M. A. Low, general attorney of the Chicago Rock Island & Pacific railroad; and Mr. Low is president of the Golden Prince company. Mr. Walker was accompanied by C. H. Thompson of Salt Lake, who is also identified with the Golden Prince associated mines.

Splendid headway is being made with construction. The boarding house to be utilized by the Golden Prince and Gold & Silver Prince, is about finished; excavations have been made for the assay office and several residences; while at the Gold & Silver Prince, the machinery ordered recently has been installed and is ready for commission; but workmen are not quite through with the galowsframe. The Gold & Silver Prince shaft is down 60 feet and the one at the Golden Prince, 450 feet. In the latter, more ore was struck this week, and officials feel much gratified over the showing there.

LUCY GRAY STRIKES MORE RICH ORE.

Work is humming at the Lucy Gray mine near the California state line in the southwestern part of the county, says the Las Vegas Age. The recent rich strikes have imbued the miners and the management with new energy. A double shift will be on the main shaft May first and the force of miners increased. An order for a carload of mining timbers was placed April 28 for timbering the shaft and building the ore bins. The shaft has advanced since April first, 21 feet and an effort will be made to double that distance in May.
