ORE SHIPMENTS FROM THE DAY MINE

The Nevada-Utah company is shipping between 150 and 200 tons of ore per day from the Day mine and Manager Gaskill is preparing to increase this output by adding more ore cars to the equipment of the Jack Rabbit railroad.

HOMESTEAD LANDS.

Large Area in Lincoln and Clark Counties Open to Settlers.

All of the following lands, that are non-mineral in character and not otherwise entered or withdrawn from entry, have been designated by the secretary of the interior as "Subject to the Act of February 19, 1908" (320 acre homestead). Application for such vacant surveyed lands can now be filed in the local U. S. land office will be furnished by qualified officers, to bona fide applicants at the time application is made. DUNLAP IN BAD SHAPE.

Former Pioche Man in Salt Lake Hospital For Treatment.

A letter from Salt Lake to Harry MacSherry conveys the information that Al Dunlap, formerly in the employ of B. S. Nunn in this city, is a very sick man and at the present time, is undergoing medical treatment in a hospital in Utah's capital city. The writer says further:

"After arriving at Ogden, and finding the water at the Hot Springs just what he did not need, Dunlap came to Salt Lake to undergo a thorough medical examination when it was found that he had leakage of the heart, Bright's disease, dropsy and other complications. Dunlap remained in the Cullen hotel about ten days and was then ordered taken to the hospital by the doctor.

"He gradually sank until he had a paralytic stroke and his life was despaired of. He lost his voice and for six days could say nothing; although conscious of what happened, or what was said to him. At present his right hand, shoulder and part of his face and tongue are paralyzed.

"He wishes to thank yourself and other Pioche friends who gave him assistance when he left there."

"The writer of the letter indicated that while the attending physician held out hopes, the chances of the patient's complete recovery is not the brightest.

Dunlap was employed here the greater portion of last year and was well liked by those who knew him. He was known to be kind and generous to a fault.



NEVADA HOMES FOR THOUSANDS OF PEOPLE

Approximately 157,670,000 acres of land in the various western states to which the 320 acre homestead bill applies have been designated by the Secretary of the Interior Ballinger as coming within the provisions of the act. The area of land in each of the states is as follows:

Oregon, 7,004,160; Washington, 3,576,960; Utah, 7,044,486; Wyoming, Nevada, 19,512,960; Arizona, 26,567,280; Colorado, 20,160,000; Montana, 19,864,640.

It was stated at the department recently that approximately 40 per cent of the area designated, except in Nevada, is now held by individuals through "some color or title" and it is now believed that a large percentage in Washington and Oregon are so held. Were all the lands designated suitable for entry there would

be about 490,000 homesteads. The lands in question are not susceptible of irrigation from any known source of water supply.

ALDRICK DeHASS DIES IN LOS ANGELES.
