NEVADA MINERAL EXHIBIT.

Effort Being Made To Have Creditable Display at Goldfield.

An effort is being made to collect an attractive mineral exhibit from the mining camps of Nevada for display to the delegates and visitors to the next session of the American Mining congress, which convenes at Goldfield next September.

The Record is in receipt of a communication from Milton M. Detch, secretary of the board of mining congress commissioners, in which the writer sets forth that solicitors have been chosen to visit the various mining districts for the purpose of collecting minerals for this exhibit.

"We have chosen these solicitors," Mr. Detch states, "after the receipt of the names of numerous applicants basing our selection upon their integrity and business qualifications, to successfully carry out the law and collect a Nevada mineral exhibit, at the same time endeavoring to secure the exhibitors the safe return of exhibits loaned for this purpose, if desired. All exhibits are sent here under the law, to be returned, provided the exhibitor desires; otherwise, they will be forwarded to the State University, where a state exhibit of the mineral resources of Nevada is being collected."

PERKINS HEARS THE WEIR CASE

Orders Julius Weir Jr., Held To Action of Grand Jury—Elder Weir Discharged.

Julius Weir Jr., was held to await the action of the grand jury by Justice Alfred Perkins last evening, at the conclusion of the preliminary hearing which lasted not quite two days. The prisoner's bond was fixed at \$5,000, but up to the hour of going to press a sufficient number of sureties had not been obtained and the defendant was still in the custody of the sheriff.

Young Weir, his father and mother, Julius Weir Sr. and Mrs. Kate Weir, were arrested on the 12th inst. at Bristol Wells on a warrant issued for them from the office of District Attorney John M. Breeze, they having been suspected as being responsible for the death of Charles Todd, whose body was found at the bottom of a well near the Weir home by Antonio Bissio and William Garton about ten days ago.

Many witnesses were examined during the progress of the hearing in the justice court; but Justice Perkins concluded that insufficient evidence was produced to connect either the elder Weir or his wife with the alleged crime. But as to the younger Weir, he was not so certain, and deemed that the ends of justice would not be met unless the latter was required to stand trial in the district court.

Witnesses testified that young

Weir had had trouble with Todd on the day the latter was last seen alive. This was the story told by William Blackwell, and which was substantiated by his wife; also by Walker Lee, who was at the Weir place the date on which the tragedy is supposed to have occurred.

It was also shown by the testimony of several witnesses that a demon of whiskey played an important role in the days events and that Todd and members of the Weir family imbibed freely of the contents.

The defendants were represented by Attorney Jesse Simmons; while the state's side of the case was conducted by District Attorney J. M. Breeze and assisted by Attorney Charles Lee Horsey.
