

NEW MINING LAW PASSED BY NEVADA LEGISLATURE.

The following is the text of the new mining law passed by the last legislature of Nevada:

Chapter LXV.—An Act supplementary to an act entitled "An Act to encourage the mining, milling, smelting or other reduction of ores in the state of Nevada," approved March 1, 1875. (Approved March 14, 1907.)

Section 1. Any person, a citizen of the United States, may enter upon any unenclosed and unimproved land in the state of Nevada, held in private ownership excepting mining claims and mining property already located or occupied for mining purposes, and may prospect thereon for gold, silver, or other valuable mineral or metal, being responsible to the owners of the land for all damages done thereon.

Sec. 2 Any person, a citizen of the United States discovering a lode or other valuable mineral or metals in or upon unenclosed or unimproved land in this state held in private ownership, excepting mining claims or mining property already located or occupied for mining purposes, may locate such lode or deposits in accordance with the laws of the United States, and of this state, in respect to the location of mining claims, the same as though such lode or deposit was found upon the public domain and may acquire title to such land so located by means of the special proceedings prescribed in this act. The said special proceedings shall be substantially as follows:

There shall be filed in the clerk's office of the district court in the county where the real estate is situated a petition verified according to law, stating therein the names of the person or persons presenting the petition; that he or they have discovered a lode or deposit containing gold, silver or some other valuable mineral or metal; the description by metes and bounds or by some other accurate designation of the tract or tracts of land, located in the manner of mining claims as herein provided and described to be appropriated for mining purposes that said land is more valuable for for which the same is being held; the names of those in possession of said land, and those for which the same is being held; the names of those in possession of the land, and interest therein, so far as the same can be obtained by reasonable diligence.

Sec. 3. That the proceedings following the filing of such petition shall be as prescribed in that certain act of the legislature of this state entitled "An act to encourage mining, milling smelting or other reduction of ores in the state of Nevada," approved March 1, 1875, in so far as the same are inconsistent with the provisions of this act.

Sec. 4. If upon the hearing of the petition filed as provided in this act it appears to the satisfaction of the court or the judge thereof that the land in question is more valuable for mining than the purpose for which the same is being used, then the petitioner or petitioners shall acquire title thereto in manner similar to that prescribed in the act to which this act is supplementary.

Sec. 5. In determining the value of the land as a basis for the compensation which the petitioner or petitioners shall pay to the owners thereof, the minerals therein contained shall not be considered as going to make up the value, but the value which shall govern is the reasonable value of the land for the use to which the same has previously put, or reasonably might be expected to be put in the future, by the owners thereof.

BRISTOL CONSOLIDATED MAY BUILD A TRAMWAY.

W. C. Brace, manager of the Bristol Consolidated mine, departed for Los Angeles Thursday morning after having spent a week in making an inspection of the properties of the foregoing named corporation at Bristol.

Just before getting aboard the train Mr. Brace told the Pioche Record that the company would soon begin work on its own account and that the construction of an aerial tramway would be started in the very near future.

The Bristol Consolidated has been confronted with the proposition of finding a means of economic transportation for its ores; the building of a tramway will bring about a solution. The Bristol mines are situated on the opposite side of the Bristol range from the Day mine at Jack Rabbit and at present the only means of getting the ore to market is by an expensive wagon haul to Pioche.

With a tramway in commission the product of the mine can be landed for not to exceed 35 cents a ton, so Mr. Brace states, to a convenient loading point on the Pioche Pacific railroad, and enable the company to mine profitably much ore which cannot be handled under existing conditions.

Mr. Brace says the company will probably let a few more leases and states that those now working are meeting with good success. Some of them are hauling ore to Pioche this week for shipment to the Utah smelters.

Mr. Brace expects to return to camp again about October 1.

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
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
