NORTHWEST NOTES

Floyd Bushman, aged 5, died at Missoula as the result of spinal injuries received when run over by an automobile several days before.

Washington State college has followed the example of the University of Montana by announcing the abandonment for the period of the war of intercollegiate athletics.

One hundred delegates were in attendance at the opening sessions of the twenty-fourth annual meeting of the Utah State Medical association which assembled Tuesday morning at Salt Lake.

James J. Ryan, a locomotive fireman of Salt Lake, who poisoned his seven-year-old son and took poison himself, will probably recover, but the boy is dead. Ryan's wife suicided some time ago.

So heavy has been the demand for farm loans in Montana under the state law that at this time there are 885 applications pending, amounting to \$1,751,750, which exceeds the money on hand by about \$700,000.

Governor Stewart has notified the National Red Cross that the White House wool sold in Montana through that organization has netted \$295,47. Gilman paid the most for the wool, with Boulder a close second.

It is estimated that 10,000 absent voters in military service have applied for and will be sent ballots, that they may participate in the election in Montana on November 5. About 6000 names have already been certified.

A jury in the case of Ole Sandwick, postmaster at Mitchell, Mont., found dead in his barnyard, returned a verdict to the effect that he had been kicked by a horse and fallen into a pool and drowned. Murder had been the theory.

Coal production in Utah is hampered at present to a slight extent through a shortage of open cars, according to A. D. Pierson, assistant to State Fuel Administrator Moroni Heiner, who has just returned from a conference of coal men in Denver.

Salt Lake is to have a government hospital similar to the Walter Reid hospital at Washington, D. C., and constructed probably on the \$1,000,000 scale used in the erection of that institution, which is the largest of government hospitals.

President Wilson was asked, in a resolution passed by the International Gold conference, held at Spokane under the auspices of the Northwest Mining association, to name on the United States commission to Russia a practical mining man.

The Polytechnic institute at Billings, Mont., has been designated for membership in the students' army training corps. The war department has designated more than 400 colleges for this corps, which will be used for training the 18-year-old boys.

The fall run of sheep and cattle from the Nevada territory is now on, and according to officials of the stockyards at North Salt Lake, the movement is likely to be the heaviest in the history, range and hay conditions making it necessary for the flockmasters to cut down their herds.

In the civil war period Mrs. Alice Machin, now of Helena, was a sturdy Ohio farm girl. Every able-bodied man in her district went to war and she plowed. Last week, at 77, she was awarded a silver cup for a prize war garden, of which every inch and plant has been cultivated by herself.

Lists compiled by the Helena Independent show that in fourteen Montana counties, Non-partisan league candidates for the senate were nominated at the primary of August 27, while in twenty-six counties candidates pledged to the Non-partisan league have been nominated for the house.

James F. Callahan, millionaire mining operator of northern Idaho, was granted a divorce from Mrs. Helen Elizabeth Callahan by Judge R. N. Dunn in district court at Coeur d'Alene. Mrs. Callahan was awarded \$50,000 alimony, attorney's fees of \$20,000, and \$18,230 suit money. In addition to \$5000 attorney's fees already allowed her.

J. C. Johnston and C. A. Wylgriss of Anaconda pleaded guilty to selling liquor at a farmers' picnic without a license. The men were fined \$100 and costs. The affair is the aftermath of an attempt to sell liquor in a secluded part of the picnic grounds. The Boy Scouts found the "blind pig" hidden among some bushes and notified the officers.

An alibi which showed it was impossible to be in two places at the same time was responsible for the release of four men who have been held at the county jail at Bozeman for four weeks on the charge of having attempted to blow a safe at Three Forks, July 15.

More than 100 young men of Butte and Anaconda have already enrolled for entrance to the branch of the students' army training corps, to be established at Mount St. Charles college, Helena, this month.

Arthur Verling, aged 6, of Butte, sustained the loss of his right hand when a dynamite blasting cap to which the child had applied a match exploded, tearing off the member and severely lacerating the hands of his sister, 5 years old.

Fred McCullough was found dead in his barn near Chimney Rock, Mont., and conditions indicated that he had been dead two days before the body was discovered by neighbors. McCullough was about 76 years old and was living alone while his wife was near on a visit.

OFFICER WINS HIGH PRAISE

Second Lieut. John I. Conroy of the Marines Highly Commended by Commanding Officer.

The bulldog tenacity and nerves of steel which characterized the operations of the United States marines in their classic capture of Chateau Thierry and Belleau wood in the second battle of the Marne earned unusual commendation for Second Lieut. John I. Conroy of the marines. The commanding officer of his regiment wrote to the brigade commander that Lieutenant Conroy was "conspicuous in his services to the battalions in line, carried on his duties at a storm center of bombardment by enemy high explosive, shrapnel and gas shells."

"Throughout this period he supplied the troops in line with ammunition, rations, water and engineer stores with tireless energy, marked executive ability, foresight and absolute fearlessness at all hours of the day and night. He never faltered in a crisis and only bulldog tenacity and nerves of steel made it possible for him to discharge his multifarious duties. When enemy fire exploded an ammunition dump under his charge his energy and coolness confined the damage to a minimum."

LOSSES DOWN TO MINIMUM

Warfare Mortality Statistics Should Give Comfort to Those With Loved Ones at the Front.

Great as the danger and large as the losses in the aggregate, the individual soldier has plenty of chances of coming out of the war unscathed, or at least not badly injured.

Based on the mortality statistics of the allied armies, a soldier's chances are as follows:

Twenty-nine chances of coming home to one chance of being killed.

Forty-nine chances of recovering from wounds to one chance of dying from them.

One chance in 500 of losing a limb. Will live five years longer because of physical training, is freer from disease in the army than in civil life, and has better medical care at the front than at home.

In other wars from 10 to 15 men died from disease to one from bullet; in this war one man dies from disease to every ten from bullets.

For those of our fighting men who do not escape scathless, the government under the soldier and sailor insurance law gives protection to the wounded and their dependents and to the families and dependents of those who make the supreme sacrifice for their country.


