Quarterly Conference

The opening session of the Stake quarterly conference was a meeting of the priesthood which convened at the stake tabernacle Saturday morning at 10 o'clock. Elders George F. Richards and Andrew Jensen, representing the general authorities of the church, were present. Opening song, "O Say What is Truth," by the congregation. Prayer by John J. Shumway. Singing, "Come O Thou King of Kings." Reports were given by members of the High Council who had visited the various wards of the stake. The name of David Cook was accepted as worthy of advancement in the priesthood to the office of an Elder. Elder George F. Richards stated that reports showed a falling of and spoke of the benefits of enquiry in the stimulation of interest and energy, and how neglect creates indifference. SATURDAY AFTERNOON

Singing by the choir and congregation, "Guide Us O Thou Great Jehovah." Elder Andrew Jensen compared conditions in the valley at present with conditions when he first came here. Singing, "We Thank Thee O God for a Prophet." Elder George F. Richards referred to early Church history and the reputation of the Mormon people. Singing, "O Say What is Truth." Benediction by Bishop George C. Dewey.

SUNDAY MORNING

There were 589 souls present at the Sunday morning session of the conference, which convened at 10:30 o'clock. Opening song, choir and congregation, "Now Let Us Rejoice." Prayer by Oluf Johnson. Singing, "If You Could Hie to Kolob." Elder George F. Richards was the first speaker and devoted his remarks to the benefit of Wednesday night home meetings for Religion Class workers and the training of children. The choir sang the Anthem "O My Father," to the tune revealed to Elder Thomas Durham, entitled, Nephites and Lamanites.

Bishop L. H. Kennard, Jr. who has been called to preside over the Hawaiian mission, referred to his love for the work of the Lord and his earnest desire to magnify his calling. Elder Wilford Ward who recently returned from a mission to New Zealand gave a report of his labors. Counselor C. E. Smith addressed the meeting and made a strong plea for saints to live purer and better lives. Singing by choir, "Inspiration of Ancient Seers." Benediction by Francillo Durfey.

SUNDAY AFTERNOON

At the Sunday afternoon session at 2 o'clock, there was an attendance of 732 people. Singing by the choir, "The Glorious Day Has Rolled On." Prayer by Joseph H. Watkins. Singing, "Joseph the Seer." Terrific Clowd-Burst

A terrific rainstorm and clowd-burst did considerable damage to the district west of Riverside and Fielding Monday afternoon. In fact, Fielding was visited by one of the heaviest down-pours of rain on record. The Hillside Ranch and property adjacent thereto was terribly washed out by the clowd-burst and the canal overflowed its banks washing dirt and mud into the irrigated fields below, where the beets were simply covered over with mud. The water in the canal was as thick as molasses and big rocks were carried down in the hillside to the fields below.

Meeting of City Council

The regular meeting of the Garland City Council was held Sept. 2, 1919, at 8 p. m. at the Council rooms, Bank of Garland. Mayor L. W. Preston presiding and following Councilmen present. J. W. Chambers, John Garrett, R. T. Shaw, also Marshall G. S. Mowry. Minutes of meeting held Aug. 19, read and approved. A number of claims allowed.

E. R. Owen of Logan, Division Manager of the Utah Power & Light Co., met with Council for purpose of hearing any complaints or suggestions for bettering light service in our city, also asked that Council pass ordinance if deemed necessary, allowing Light Company and Telephone Company to trim branches from trees within city limits when same interferes with lighting or telephone wires. Mr. Owen also made several other valuable suggestions for improvement of our city.

Marshall G. S. Mowry asked that a new revolver be purchased for use of city Marshall. Moved by Garrett and seconded by Shaw that Marshall be allowed to purchase gun.

After hearing the reports of the different committees, Council adjourned.

REGISTRATION AGE 6 TO 18

The first day is important. Every pupil who expects to attend school should be at school on time to get his right assignments. As a matter of convenience, those who have finished the eight grade and who wish to attend school later, or who wish to apply for permission, may do so during the first week, through the principal of the nearest school. The new law requires all over 6 and under 18 years of age to register. The Board is required to report to the County Attorney all those who ignore this request. The law says the County attorney shall prosecute such offenders.

The Box Elder High School will register 9th year students (to-day) Saturday Sept 6th, also others that find that time convenient.

Meantime please continue the good work started in March 1919, and continue throughout the summer courses educating your pupils and other in Thrift and in the Savings Habit. Kindly understand that the U. S. Government recently made a thrift Regulator requiring all War Savings literature to be printed at Washington.

The press of Utah will advise the names of the gentlemen who, commencing September 1st, will have charge of War Savings activities, and other Land Organizations for the benefit of our beloved government, the United States. At this time the writer takes great pleasure in thanking you for himself and Captain Noyle, of the law firm of Moyle & Ray, for the very loyal support you have given War Savings since the writer received his appointment from Secretary McAdoo November 17, 1917, and through the country newspapers and the press in general throughout Utah, I wish to express thanks to publicity Director R.
