

**Breadth Storm on the Coast of Great Britain,**

The London Times of the 31st of May, says that on the Monday previous a dreadful storm ravaged the north east coast of England, by which not less than one hundred and fifty vessels were wrecked, and a great many lives lost. Such a storm at that season of the year was regarded as an unusual occurrence.

During the height of the gale eight ships, with all on board, foundered in sight of thousands of spectators on Falmouth Beach.

A Dutch steamer, bound on an excursion from Rotterdam to Zwill was caught by the gale and foundered off a place called Moorlyk, and eighty persons went down with her.

These are but a few of the mere disastrous effects of this terrible storm. The number of lives lost will probably reach one thousand. The loss of property on sea and those in consequence of it are immense.

It would appear that this is a year of storms, earthquakes, hurricanes and tornadoes.
