

STATE BRIEFS

Butte, Jan. 30.—The inquest on the bodies of those killed by the explosion has not yet been concluded.

Helena, Jan. 26.—An earthquake was felt here at five o'clock this morning. Small articles were shaken off of shelves and sideboards.

Phillipsburg, Jan. 27.—John Nixon, treasurer-elect of Granite county, died to-day at 9 a.m. at Granite from bronchitis.

Livingston, Jan. 27.—Con Lowney, an old-time Cooke City miner, was instantly killed in the Herr coal mines Friday morning by an explosion of coal gas.

LIVINGSTON, Jan. 26.—In the district court to-day Judge Henry sentenced Jacob Fieshman to five years in the penitentiary. The prisoner is aged 18 and was convicted of criminal assault. He outraged a 12-year-old girl on the Upper Yellowstone last January.

Hamilton, Jan. 27.—The Ravalli County Fair and Racing association held a meeting in the club rooms yesterday at noon. Articles of incorporation were adopted, making the capital stock \$10,000. The erection of buildings will be commenced at once.

Butte, Jan. 26.—An inquest was held this afternoon to determine the cause of the death of James Tracy. A number of witnesses were examined and the jury found that Tracy came to his death from an overdose of morphine, supposed to have been administered for purposes of suicide.

Deer Lodge, Jan. 26.—To-day Fred Byers, Louis Byers and John F. Jones were sentenced by Judge Brantly to the penitentiary for seven years each for stealing cattle from Spencer Johnson. The ranchmen of Deer Lodge valley have been losing a great many cattle and these are the first to be convicted for a long time.

LIVINGSTON, Jan. 26.—A rousing anti-county division mass meeting was held here to-night at which Judge Savage presided. The size and enthusiasm of the meeting was sufficient refutation of the statement that many Livingston people favor the creation of a new county. Ringing resolutions were adopted memorializing the legislature not to pass the Sweet Grass county bill. A strong lobby will go from here to Helena Monday.

Helena, Jan. 25.—Herman Blume, an old timer, was killed in a snow slide in McClellan gulch recently. The accident happened near his cabin. He had been missing two weeks. A rescue party was formed to look for him, and after three days' search the idea occurred to them that he might have been caught in the slide. They began digging in the snow and found the body after an hour and a half's work. Blume had been in Montana since the early sixties and was placer mining on the Big Blackfoot a number of years. A nephew came over from Butte this morning and went out after the body.

Glendive, Jan. 26.—An epidemic of suicides appears to have struck Dawson county. Two cases of intended suicide were reported yesterday. William Dobbins, aged 33, unmarried, who resides with a married brother on Cedar creek, 12 miles from Glendive, shot himself in the right ear with a .32 revolver. He will recover. Financial troubles were the cause of the attempt. The second case was a man named Hefern, employed as a domestic at the Glendive hotel. It appears he was in love with a lady in the hotel, which passion was not returned by the lady, and after crying in his room for several hours over the disappointment, he called the proprietor, George Burns, to his room and told him he was going to cut his own throat. He pulled out a dirk knife and made a stab at his throat. Burns caught his arm and the knife took effect in his right shoulder, inflicting a slight wound. He was able to be around and attended to his duties to-day.

He stood at the entrance to a dentist's office, and over and over he glanced up the stairway, and something like a shiver passed over him. A score of pedestrians observed him and smiled as they passed on, but by and by one halted and said: "My dear sir, you have my sympathy." "Thank you," he replied. "I've been right here myself and know how it is." "Yes?" "I have stood where you stand and felt as you feel." "You have, eh?" "But I realized that I must face the inevitable, and so I walked up stairs and had it over with." "Did he hit you very hard?" "Jin? How do you mean? It hurt to have the tooth out, of course. Perhaps you've got to have two out?" "Oh, no! My teeth are all right." "Then what's the matter?"

"Why, I'm a collector. I've a bill seven years old against this dentist, and last time I was here he said he'd knock my jaw off if I ever came again. Oh, no, I haven't the toothache! I'm just waiting around here to get my sand up and go up and tackle him for \$1.50 and get out alive."—Detroit Free Press.
