

ALL-ROUND SLASH

North Dakota Appropriations Extensively Cut by Governor Allin.

SCHOOLS GET IT THE WORST.

More Than Likely That the University and Normals Must Close.

BISMARCK, March 25.—Governor Allin has filed appropriations bills, as reduced by him from the amounts appropriated by the legislative assembly. The cut in the appropriations is heavy, especially as affecting the educational institutions of the state, although other institutions are reduced wherever it was possible to do so. The sum total of appropriations, as passed by the legislative assembly, was \$399,000, and the total reduction will reach \$125,000. The several state institutions are reduced as follows from the original appropriations:

Believes It Necessary.

In the mind of the governor, after due and careful examination of all the possibilities of income for the state, this cut is absolutely necessary in order to carry the credit of the state safely through. Every item in each appropriation which it was thought could be gotten along without has been stricken out. The heaviest cuts are those of the state university and normal school appropriations, and it has but one meaning—the practical closing of these institutions. The appropriation left for the three is just about sufficient to close up the school year, and beyond that it will not go.

Upon the penitentiary and state asylum appropriations also, the cut will necessitate the most rigid economy. Some officials and positions in the two will have to be altogether dispensed with, and the salaries of guards and employes will also be

Reduced to Meet the Cut.

The most intense interest has prevailed all through the state for the past two weeks as to the possible fate of some of the institutions. Especially has this been so in Grand Forks, and at Mayville and Valley City. Almost every day the governor has been visited by delegations from these institutions asking that enough of the appropriations be allowed to carry the institutions through the two years. These delegations have been all politely received, but no assurance has been given that any policy different to the one already decided upon would be pursued, and the final disposition of the matter proves that the governor considers the closing of some of the institutions absolutely necessary in the present financial condition of the state.

PROBABLY SUFFOCATED.

Bodies of Three Men Found in a Box Car at Trinidad, Colo.

DENVER, March 25.—A special to The News from Trinidad, Colo., says: Section Foreman Norman on the Santa Fe, at Springer, N. M., while inspecting cars, made a horrible discovery of three dead men in a box car standing on the siding at that station. The men were seen the previous night about the depot and carried with them a common tinner's stove. It is supposed that they took up quarters in the car for the night and started a fire with charcoal in the stove. The doors were closed and probably the gas suffocated the men. When found the bodies were just becoming cold and had been dead but a short time.

LOOKING TO GLADSTONE.

Rosebery's Health Such as to Cause Considerable Speculation.

LONDON, March 25.—The condition of the health of Lord Rosebery is not changed, but there is no question that he is seriously ill, and that the complications of the political situation are such as to deprive the premier of the energy necessary to fight difficult and delicate questions. Under these circumstances it is not astonishing that the wildest rumors are circulated and that many people are turning their thoughts towards Mr. Gladstone as likely to be the man who will guide the Liberals once more out of political darkness and into the sunshine of political harmony. Mr. Gladstone is now on his way to London.

RESIGNED THE PRESIDENCY.

President of the Reichstag Quits on Account of a Snub for Bismarck.

BERLIN, March 25.—The reichstag by a vote of 163 to 146, rejected the proposal of the president of the reichstag, Herr Von Levetzow, that the house congratulate Prince Bismarck upon his birthday, whereupon Herr Von Levetzow, amid vociferous cheers from the members of the right, announced that he resigned the presidency.

ADVOCATE OF FREE SILVER.

Colonel Ingersoll Believes the Republican Candidate Will Be One.

LAPORTE, Ind., March 25.—In an interview on the prospects of Republican presidential candidates, Colonel Robert G. Ingersoll says that the nomination in 1896 will go to an advocate of free silver, and that no candidate on a single issue can hope to be successful.

Japanese Repulsed.

SHANGHAI, March 25.—A dispatch from Formosa says the Japanese have attempted to make a landing at the Peacore islands, but were repulsed with slight loss.

Owatonna Mills Burn.

OWATONNA, Minn., March 25.—The Riverside roller mills burned to the ground early in the morning, being a total loss. The origin of the fire is not known. A high wind was blowing at the time, and the adjoining buildings were saved with difficulty. Loss, \$12,000.

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
