Dr. C. A. McNulty performed an operation known in the scientific vocabulary of medicine as "staphyloplasty" on the cleft palate of D. T. Stokes, a few days ago. Stokes had been thus affected since his birth and the impediment in his speech was so marked as to make his conversation almost unintelligible. The operation consisted of uniting the divorced sections of the palate, the surface of which had first been freshened. Surgical authorities consider, in such an operation, the cutting of the muscles controlling the palate an imperative necessity, but of course the palate will perform its functions better with these muscles intact. For this reason, Dr. McNulty hoped to complete the operation without cutting these necessary muscles, and this he finally succeeded in doing, and as his palate is now as it should be, muscles included, Stokes will in future be able to articulate distinctly and naturally. In fact his speech is very much improved even now, and as the operation was a success in every particular, his voice will greatly improve in a short time. The operation, we understand, ranks high in delicate surgery.

INCOME RETURNS.

Important rulings as to Deductions of Debts.

Deputy Internal Revenue Collector Wm. Morris, calls the attention of probable income tax payers to the following:

Acting Commissioner Wilson, of the internal revenue bureau, has sent to Collector Lyman the following instructions relative to deductions that may be made for debts in making income tax returns:

"Only debts which were contracted during the year 1894, and found in said year to be worthless, and losses from the sale of bonds, notes and other personal property purchased in said year, can be deducted from income as 'worthless debts' or 'losses actually sustained' in computing income for that year.

"Collectors should require both persons and corporations in making return to state specifically in answering questions on page three of returns, when debts reported as worthless were contracted, and when property, from the sale of which losses are claimed, was purchased.

"Attention is particularly directed to the fact that all returns should be made full and complete, as designated on forms 365 and 366, and no income return should be received unless it clearly appears from the statements in such return that all deductions therein are allowable by law and conform to the rule above stated. G. W. WILSON, Acting Commissioner."


