

THE HORSE FAIR.

The Annual Exhibit of Horse Flesh at the Bridges.

The clerk of the weather had one of his periodical fits yesterday; consequently the attendance at the horse show and racing was not as large as was expected. However there was quite a respectable showing in the afternoon, when Judge Lott called out the animals for exhibition. The first one to show up was James Shewmaker's French coach horse "La Tulipe," a splendid representative of his race, and one which elicited general admiration. John Wilhart followed with his Norman grade, "Bopman," and C. N. Edwards with a Percheron, "Bismarek" both fine animals and excellent representatives of their very useful class. S. D. Mullinix's "Kentucky Whip," a general purpose horse, 16 1/2 hands high and weighing 1500 pounds, is a descendant of "Old Kentucky Whip," and made a fine appearance when he was led out. M. H. Lott exhibited two horses—one a Cleveland bay 14 years old, and as frisky as a colt; and the other a seven-year-old full blood Norman. Both are very fine specimens of their respective breeds, and gained much commendation from the horsemen who critically examined them. A 9 year old Norman, "Giant" by W. H. Sturbaugh, was also a favorite among the horses exhibited, and was a great favorite with the assemblage. The premiums awarded were as follows: Percheron-Normans—W. H. Sturbaugh, 1st; M. H. Lott, 2d. Grade Normans—C. N. Edwards, 1st. John Wilhart, 2d. Cleveland Bay—M. H. Lott, 1st. French Coach—James Shewmaker, 1st. Standard Bred, Archie Hyndman, 1st. All Purpose horse—S. D. Mullinix, 1st; H. B. Cheney, 2d. Sweepstakes—James Shewmaker, 1st. There were several other horses on the fair grounds, but, on account of the unfavorable weather, they were not brought out on the exhibition grounds. Owing to the slippery condition of the track consequent upon the morning rain, the running race between Tom Chamber's "Sir Thomas" and Fred Counters "Gemonia" was postponed until next Saturday. The trotting race, mile heats, best three in five, in which Tom Chamber's "Italy," C. W. Estes' "Bellstone," and Fred Counters' "Justice" were the contestants, was won easily by the latter in three straight heats. The judges were: S. D. Mullinix, of Sheridan; W. E. Tebay, of Whitehall, and Frank Woodfin. Following is the summary.

DELL GETS \$30,000.

The Hershfield Damage Suit Compromised. Dell Hershfield's legal troubles with her husband, Aaron, and his brother, L. H. Hershfield, and Mrs. L. H. Hershfield are about ended. At any rate the big damage suit instituted by her against L. H. Hershfield and Mrs. Hershfield has been declared off. The compromise was effected Monday afternoon, after the case had actually been commenced.

It will be remembered that Aaron Hershfield married Miss Hogan at Chicago, in November, 1893. In December, after a few days of apparently happy wedded life, and after the couple had returned to Helena, Aaron Hershfield suddenly left town, and has been away ever since. He was induced to go largely, or altogether, because of the objections of his relatives to his wife. Last year Mrs. Dell Hershfield began suit against Mr. and Mrs. L. H. Hershfield on the ground that they had alienated from her the conjugal affections of her husband and had induced him to deny his society from her; and further, that they unlawfully persuaded him to abandon her and leave the state. For all these alleged wrongs, the injured wife claimed that she had been damaged to the extent of \$75,000, and she brought suit for that amount. It is understood that by the terms of the compromise Dell Hershfield is to receive \$30,000, she is to bring suit for a divorce, which she will probably get. The \$30,000 will be allowed her as alimony, while the damage suit will be dismissed at once.

Simon Jacobs, Battle's Treasurer Committed Suicide.

Simon Jacobs, who has served Battle as city treasurer several years, committed suicide Sunday morning by shooting. He was short in his accounts about \$50,000 and preferred death to living disgrace.

Jacobs has always been regarded as a most exemplary young man. He conducted a clothing establishment on the corner of Main and Park streets and did a good business. He had served three years as city treasurer, always being elected by large majorities. This spring he was not a candidate however, and his shortage was not discovered until he turned over his books to the incoming administration. What he did with so large an amount is a mystery as he had no bad habits. His body was found in an abandoned shaft house a few hours after the occurrence. In his right hand was the pistol with which he killed himself. A bullet hole in his right temple told the rest of the sad story.

The Cut in Miners' Wages Done to Retaliate Against Railroads.

BALTIMORE, May 6.—According to private information the strike of the bituminous coal miners along the line of the Norfolk and Western railroad was prompted by the coal operators in retaliation on the road for increase on the rate on coal to tide water. Attempts to have the rate reduced failing, the operators announced that there would be a reduction of 20 per cent on all coal mined. The miners refused to work at the reduction. There are over 40 mines along the Norfolk and Western roads, which are controlled by 38 mining concerns. Of this number 32 entered the combination and made the reduction in wages.

Quiet at Pocahontas.

ROANOKE, Va., May 5.—A telegram received here from Pocahontas reports all quiet in the coal region. The Southwest Improvement company and the Browning mines are the only corporations at work. The strikers are trying to induce 1,000 men employed at these mines to go out.

Ask an Increase in Wages.

MILWAUKEE, May 6.—The executive committee of the Union of Street Railway Employees, which has charge of the matter of the new schedule of wages, called at the office of the Milwaukee Street Railway company and asked for an increase of pay to 20 cents an hour. There is little likelihood that the company will accede to the demands and a strike is looked for.


