#### BAD FOR SCHOOLS.

##### School Funds Will Suffer on Account of a Code Error.

The startling discovery was made yesterday that the state of Montana has no law by which a tax can be levied for school purposes. There is a clear omission from the codes of two sections—the most important in the school law, too—which will necessitate either an exceedingly liberal construction of the remaining laws or a special election in every school district in the state to remedy. As the matter now stands not a public school of Montana has a cent of money to begin the new year on, and it has not been officially decided how the omission is to be corrected. The trouble is laid to the typewriter by those who ought to know. A careful comparison of the printed bill, as it passed its first and second reading in the state senate, after having passed the house, with the code, which was taken from the enrolled copy, gives color to the excuse. The explanation offered is that when the clerk distributed the typewritten engrossments among his assistants, either he or they omitted a page. It happened so that, although a break was made in the middle of a sentence, the ends connected smoothly, and the error was not discovered. But it was an egregious error, nevertheless.—Independent.

#### AN IMPORTANT DEAL.

##### Lease of the Red Bluff Mines to a Helena Capitalist.

The Red Bluff mines were leased this week by Elling, Ward & Stewart, the owners, to Frank J. Bennett of Helena. The mine is one of the most promising gold properties in the state, and an abundance of water has prevented the owners from working it extensively in the past. It is understood that Mr. Bennett has means and will put in pumps and other necessary machinery and will push the work with vigor. The deal is regarded as one of importance. Mr. Bennett's lease includes the mill. He has also leased the Mohegan mine.
