

# AS SEEN BY DEPEW.

Cleveland, He Says, Is Certain to Be the Next Democratic Nominee.

Whitney Could Not Be Elected and Is Shrewd Enough to Know It.

No Real Objection in the Democratic Party to the Third Term Idea.

NEW YORK, Sept. 9.—Chauncey Depew was interviewed in London by The World correspondent upon President Cleveland.

"Cleveland," he said, "is as certain to be the Democratic nominee as the national convention is to meet. Whitney could not be elected. He knows it, and he is too shrewd a man to sacrifice himself."

"What about the third term idea?" "That has no real influence with the mass of the Democratic party. They do not regard him as a Caesar, nor fear Caesarism from his continued administration. It was different with Grant and Jackson, and even Washington. They were strong individual characters. Cleveland has persuaded his party, at least, that he is only the mouthpiece of the best desires of the people, with no personal purposes or even personal ambitions. Either he has extraordinary luck in accidentally doing the right thing, or he is really a great statesman. I confess I am not sure in which aspect I regard him."

### BRINGING SPAIN TO TIME.

American Prisoners in Cuba to Receive Prompt Justice.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 9.—The state department has received a cablegram from Consul General Williams at Havana stating that Aguirra had been released by the Spanish authorities, and that Sangulily would be granted a civil trial soon. This was welcome news to the department, as the case of these two United States citizens imprisoned in Cuba has dragged tediously for months. Consul General Williams was active in seeking protection for Aguirra and Sangulily, so that he offended the former Spanish minister, Maragua, who requested his recall. Later the state department made very energetic representations at Madrid and Havana. The release of Aguirra and the prompt trial of Sangulily will secure everything for which the United States has contended.

### CARLISLE FOR PRESIDENT.

His Wife Said to Have Written a Friend He Will Be a Candidate.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Sept. 9.—A special from Clarksville says that Mrs. Carlisle has written to a friend in Christian county, Ky., that Secretary Carlisle is a candidate and will have his name announced before the party as the present administration's favorite.

Further than a general statement that this is true, none of the details of the letter are given, except that such prospective candidacy is the reason for Secretary Carlisle's support of nominee Hardin in Kentucky, along with the assistance of the administration forces.

### Why Maragua Resigned.

LONDON, Sept. 9.—A dispatch from Madrid says that Maragua, the former Spanish minister at Washington who resigned, has made a public statement that he had proof that the Conde de Venadito was justified when she fired at the Allianca, that the American steamer carried contraband goods and was but a mile and a half from the Cuban coast. He would not consent that Spain should be put in the wrong.

### Mrs. Perkins Bound Over.

MINNEAPOLIS, Sept. 9.—Mrs. Lora Perkins has been bound over to await action of the grand jury on the charge of murder, Mrs. Hawkins being the victim. Judge Holt arrived at that decision after listening to five days of testimony. Considering the strong evidence put in by the defense in the last two days, the action was a surprise to nearly all who have been watching the case.

### Watterson Retires From Politics.

NOBLESVILLE, Ind., Sept. 9.—Hon. Henry Watterson in an interview here stated that he had decided to retire entirely from politics. Under no circumstances, he said, would he make any further political speeches, and he further stated that it was his intention to go to Europe next year to avoid participating in the national campaign.

### Lawther Advocates Protection.

LONDON, Sept. 9.—Rt. Hon. James Lawther, member of parliament for the Isle of Thanet, division of Kent, presided at a meeting at which it was resolved to address a manifesto to the English people in favor of adopting a protective policy with preferential treatment of the British colonies.

### Denounce the Emperor.

CARDIFF, Sept. 9.—The Trades Union congress at its session passed a resolution by unanimous vote of the delegates protesting against Emperor William's interference with the liberty of the press, and expressing sympathy with the working men of Germany in the struggle for liberty.

### To Prevent Cholera.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 9.—The members of the local board of health in-

spected the Chinese quarter to ascertain what means might be advisable to take to lessen the chances of cholera obtaining a foothold here. The Chinese general has promised to co-operate with the board.

### To Stop Gambling.

ST. PAUL, Sept. 9.—The council committee appointed some time ago to see if there was any gambling in St. Paul, has reported. They found plenty of joints running wide open, and recommended that they be closed.

### Bayard Dined Eckels.

LONDON, Sept. 9.—United States Ambassador Bayard gave a dinner in honor of Hon. J. H. Eckels, comptroller of the currency, and his wife. Several English financiers were present.

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
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
