

# CITIZENS SHOT DOWN

## Bloody Work of Soldiers in the Capital City of Colombia.

## Mob Refused to Disperse and Troops Were Ordered to Shoot.

## Fourteen Guards Also Killed While Attempting to Desert.

SAN ANTONIO, TEX., Nov. 18.—A special from Bogota dated Nov. 18 says: Heavy firing in the barracks drew an immense crowd which was ordered to disperse. The crowd was so large that it was impossible to move quickly and the impatient officers ordered the troops to charge bayonets, which they did, but, meeting with resistance, and five shots being fired from the crowd, the troops began firing upon the people. A regular battle ensued and the crowd, being unarmed, were obliged to flee, leaving 28 killed and wounded. The cause of the firing in the barracks was that part of the guard had attempted to desert and resisted when arrested. Fourteen were shot.

## SULTAN'S LATEST MOVE.

### All Unemployed Armenians in Constantinople to Be Shipped Out.

LONDON, Nov. 18.—A dispatch to The Daily News from Constantinople says that the sultan is engaged in examining every resort of the Armenians in the capital for the purpose of arresting and shipping all of the unemployed Armenians in Asia Minor. The measure is regarded as a cruel one, even admitting that they reach their destination, the people being mostly inoffensive. The Daily News also publishes an extract from a private letter from Erzurum to the effect that Armenian priests have already buried over 400 bodies of persons supposed to have been killed in the second massacre. Thousands are wandering homeless and starving.

## Armenian Lawlessness Reported.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 18.—Official dispatches received here contain additional accounts of Armenian lawlessness. It is reported that the Armenians have attacked the villages of Forakh, Bitohli and Brehanis, near Zeitoun, firing 87 houses in all. They also burned the village of Kurbel and one Mohammedan was burned alive. Eighteen Mussulmans of both sexes were killed and 15 wounded by the rioters at Tohoukharhisar. The town of Tohoukharhisar was totally destroyed.

## For a Joint Naval Demonstration.

LONDON, Nov. 18.—The Vienna correspondent of The Daily News says that a Constantinople dispatch received there reports that the ambassadors will, on Saturday, give notice to the sultan of their intention to arrange for a joint naval demonstration.

## CUBA IS MORTGAGED.

### Spain Will Let England Have Her for Borrowed Money.

SAN ANTONIO, TEX., Nov. 18.—A special from the City of Mexico says: A prominent Spaniard here, who is in close touch with the Spanish government, says that before Spain will concede Cuban independence or permit the island to come under a United States protectorate or rule, she will throw Cuba into the hands of England, conceding to England ostensible possession for a number of years, until England collects the sum of money which is due her from Spain for advances made to carry on the war with Cuba.

## FORTY-EIGHT DROWNED.

### British Marines Perish by the Sinking of a Launch.

SHANGHAI, Nov. 18.—A steam launch belonging to the British cruiser Edgar is reported to have been lost near Nagasaki. Forty-eight men are said to have been drowned.

LONDON, Nov. 18.—The admiralty has received confirmation of the dispatch from Shanghai saying that the launch of the British cruiser Edgar had been sunk with a loss of 48 lives. The disaster occurred off Nagasaki, and the boat contained 48 marines.

## HEIR TO RUSSIA'S THRONE.

### Daughter Born to Czar Nicholas and Wife.

ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 18.—The announcement of the czarina occurred Friday evening. At 9 o'clock a daughter was born. Both mother and child are doing well.

Court physicians in attendance at the announcement report the child to be a handsome girl, and they add that the mother is rapidly recovering. Services connected with the birth of the infant were held in accordance with the rites of the orthodox Greek church. The baby has been named Olga.

Mrs. Gougar Appeals Again.

BOZEMAN, Nov. 18.—Mrs. Helen Gougar, whose \$25,000 damage suit against Congressman Elijah A. Morse for alleged libel has been settled for a second time by a verdict against the plaintiff, has filed a motion for a new trial on the ground that the verdict rendered in the recent trial was not in accordance with the evidence submitted.

## Anant the Pope's Health.

CLEVELAND, Nov. 18.—Rev. Joseph M. Koudetka of this city has just returned from a visit to Rome. In regard to the pope's health he said: "I was shocked to find how he is broken in health. He had to be carried into the room in a chair, for he could not walk, and his form and face are much emaciated."

## THE RAILROAD WAS DEFEATED.

### Supreme Court Decision Affecting Great Northern Land Interests.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13.—The supreme court has decided the case of C. A. Weeks against Coleman Bridgman, appealed from the Minnesota supreme court. Chief Justice Fuller delivered the opinion and sustains the court below. The Great Northern road, as beneficiary of certain acts of congress, was interested in the case, and opposed the claims of the defendant in error, who acquired title through George F. Brott, a mail contractor. The court holds to the same doctrine as in Barden vs. Northern Pacific, and the railroad company loses.
