NOTICE

For Proposals for the care of the County Poor and Furnishing Medicine and Medical Attendance.

Notice is hereby given that the board of county commissioners of Madison county, Montana, will, at its regular December, 1895, session, receive, and it hereby invites sealed proposals for the care, support and maintenance of the sick, poor and infirm of said county, for the term beginning on the first day of March, 1896, and ending on the 31st day of December, 1896; such proposals to include and cover the entire cost of provisions and clothing for and nursing of the sick, poor and infirm, and all burial expenses that may occur during said term. Sealed proposals are also invited at said December, 1895, session, from resident practicing physicians of said county, to furnish medical attendance and medical and surgical treatment to the sick and infirm poor of said county and such persons as may be confined in the county jail during the calendar year 1896. Such attendance and treatment to include attendance upon and medical and surgical treatment of such sick and infirm poor and persons that may be confined in the county jail, whether affected with contagious or infectious diseases or otherwise.

The board also invites proposals at said session, for furnishing medicines for the sick and infirm poor and such persons as may be confined in the county jail for said year 1896.

Such proposals must be addressed to the clerk of the board, plainly marked so as to designate what the proposal is for, and must be filed with such clerk on or before the second Monday in December, 1895. The contracts, if awarded, will be let to the lowest responsible bidder.

The board reserves the right to reject the proposal of any person whom they deem unsuitable as a contractor, or to reject any and all proposals.

DOINGS OF THE DISTRICT COURT

Judge Showers Makes Married People Happy

By Unmarrying Them—Selecting Grand and Pettit Jurors—Several Unimportant Matters Disposed Of—Notes.

The new jury law came in for a round share of abuse Monday evening and Tuesday morning, the victims of the recent draft of jurors being the most vigorous kickers. As no jury was called at the last term of court this was the first time its effect was experienced.

Of the thirty men drawn from the jury box last week, twenty-seven reported to his honor, Judge Showers, last Tuesday morning. They were: Chris Stoker, Samuel Ogden, L. L. Fowler, James D. France, W. J. Finney, Patrick Breen, Chas. Boyd, Floyd Tinsley, J. Joiner, Frank Redfern, J. O. Moulton, O. B. Walton, W. A. Mack, S. Galman, Sr., G. J. Calvert, J. W. Brook, John C. Stock, John T. Seyler, O. F. Parmeter, Crossland Brook, F. E. Benton, C. K. Morrison, Chris Lowman, J. K. Hart, C. A. Bartruff, J. N. Brickner, Elias Gilmer. Of those who did not appear Newton Orr was excused for sickness in his family, Ira L. Phillips because of personal sickness, a physician's certificate being presented in his behalf, and J. H. Patrick could not be found by the sheriff. Chris Stoker, J. Joiner, John Stock, W. A. Mack and Chris Lowman presented excuses and were allowed to go on their way rejoicing. Those remaining were then sworn as regular trial jurors for the term.

THE DIVORCE MILL.

Monday was devoted to the undoing of some unsatisfactory work of Cupid. Divorces were granted to Mrs. Nellie J. Howe and Caleb Eldred of Twin Bridges and W. R. Clark of Sheridan. Defaults had previously been entered against the defendant in each case. The proof in the case of Nellie J. Howe vs. C. H. Howe was to the effect that the husband and defendant had not supported his family for three years; that the plaintiff did not know where he was and that he had been guilty of habitual intemperance for more than 10 years. Mr. and Mrs. Howe were married in Bakersfield, California.

Mrs. Howe was given a decree of divorce and awarded the custody of the three children.

Mr. and Mrs. Caleb Eldred were married in Michigan about 12 years ago. One child was the result of the union. The proof was to the effect that the defendant had deserted her husband 10 years ago, and when last heard from was living with another man. The plaintiff was given a decree and the custody of the child.

The evidence in the case of W. R. Clark vs. Hattie Clark was to the effect that Mr. and Mrs. Clark were married in New York about 15 years ago. When Mr. Clark located near Sheridan about 10 years ago he allowed his wife to return to her home on a visit. She never came back and after waiting 10 long years, Mr. Clark brought this suit. The court granted his prayer and he is now enjoying single blessedness.

THE GRAND JURY.

At ten o'clock Wednesday morning Clerk Duncan called those summoned for the grand jury, the following responding: Wm. M. Donaldson, D. N. Jones, Patrick McCoy, P. V. Jackson, A. J. Bennett, J. M. Williams, Fred Counter, O. W. Jay, W. E. Thomas, J. M. Spellman, and Chas. Simpson. H. E. Bowers, whose name was on the list, could not be found by the sheriff. A. J. Bennett asked to be excused on account of sickness, and Fred Counter informed the court that he had important business at home which demanded his attention. The court, however, would not entertain the excuses. The following names, constituting the grand jury, were then drawn: Fred Counter, Patrick McCoy, Chas. Simpson, J. M. Stone, O. W. Jay, James M. Williams, and Wm. E. Thomas. The oath was administered and the jurors charged. Wm. E. Thomas was appointed foreman and Harry Warmington sworn in as bailiff. The jury then retired to deliberate.

MINOR MATTERS.

Thursday being a non-judicial day the grand and petit jurors received a holiday.

County Attorney, Callaway, filed the answer of the board of county commissioners in the suit brought some time ago by the receivers of the Northern Pacific Company to annul the tax sale of last year, and to restrain the treasurer of Madison county from executing deeds to lands sold. In a similar case Judge Knowls decided against Jefferson county.

Jack Newman, of mill stealing fame, who was arraigned Wednesday, entered

a plea of not guilty to the charge of grand larceny. "Mike" is looking well notwithstanding the scarcity of microbe medicine at Hotel de Haines. He has grown a magnificent crop of Boulevard whiskers. His case was set for December 4.

The suit of Con Crowley vs Ras Rochester as administrator of the estate of Dennis Collins, was tried Tuesday afternoon. The jury gave Crowley a verdict for \$404, the amount of his claim. Crowley's original claim against the estate was for something like \$700, but his bill was cut down by Ras Rochester.

The case of Nyhart vs Pennington is in progress this afternoon. This is an action brought to compel the payment of a commission of \$2,000 alleged to be due the plaintiffs for the part they took in the sale of the Pennington group of mines near Twin Bridges.

James Brooky, a witness who had been summoned for the Nyhart-Pennington suit, did not put in an appearance this afternoon. An attachment was issued for him.

Interest centers in the Jones murder case, which will be called Monday.

GEORGE HENDERSON'S LITTLE BONANZA

Work of the Summit Placer Company.

A Property That is Making \$10,000 a Year—Progress of Winter Work—Drifting on Bedrock Towards Baldy.

George Henderson, president and manager and principal owner of the Summit Placer Mining Company has unearthed a little bonanza, and not a very little one at that. Mr. Henderson was in town Wednesday, and the MADISONIAN man was successful in eliciting from him a few facts concerning his property.

The tunnel on this property is now in about 200 feet, drifting on bed-rock towards Baldy. Four men are taking out from \$1200 to \$1600 worth of gold per month. Nuggets are frequently picked out of the gravel before the water touches it. A few days ago Mr. Henderson picked up a \$25 nugget in the breast of the tunnel and Tuesday several, aggregating in weight about two ounces, were found. Mr. Henderson is prosecuting his work on a scientific plan and through the conveniences which he has caused to be placed in and around his property his men are enabled to work and be as comfortable in the winter as in the summer. The water is caught in the back of the tunnel and carried through boxes into the reservoir.

Mr. Henderson estimates his loss, directly and indirectly through the fire which destroyed his tunnel house last week, at about \$400. The tunnel house was 12x60 in dimensions and was the store-room for his mining tools and paraphernalia. The men made a heroic effort to prevent the fire from spreading into the tunnel, which was the principal danger, and checked it after the timbers had been burned for about 20 feet.
