

WANT LAWS AMENDED

Milwaukee Labor Leaders Ask That the State Legislature Be Convened.

Would Rescind Street Railway Charter and Let the City Run the Cars.

All Lines Now in Operation but They Receive but Little Patronage.

MILWAUKEE, May 25.—At a delegate meeting attended by 150 representatives of 50 trades, labor, Turner and other organizations, resolutions were adopted calling on Governor Upham to summon the Wisconsin legislature in extraordinary session to take action on the strike and boycott situation. It is desired that the legislature amend the state laws in such manner that the charter of the Milwaukee Street and Electric Railway company may be rescinded, or so amended that the city of Milwaukee can become the owner of the company's property in this city.

Cars Poorly Patronized.

The strike situation is practically unchanged. Cars are in operation on all lines, but the boycott and fears of violence prevents them being patronized. No attempt has been made to run cars Sundays since the street railway employees struck, but the company announces that it will start cars next Sunday as usual. The entire police force will be on duty, as serious disturbances are expected from sympathizers with the strikers.

TRIED TO KILL CORBETT.

Crank Pulls a Gun on the Puglist at Hot Springs, Ark.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., May 25.—Jim Corbett narrowly escaped losing his life at the hands of a wild-eyed crank armed with a revolver, at Hot Springs. As he was walking along Central avenue, a man suddenly sprang from a doorway, and, facing the puglist, demanded to know if his name was Corbett.

"If you are Jim Corbett," the crank yelled, "I'm going to lick you right here."

Corbett hesitated a moment and the crank, with a quick movement, drew a revolver from his pocket and pointed it at Corbett's breast. Corbett, realizing the situation, struck the weapon out of the crank's hand, and, seizing the man, held him until an officer arrived.

WRECKERS HAVE FINISHED.

World's Fair Grounds Turned Over to the Jackson Park Commissioners.

CHICAGO, May 25.—The wreckers who have for nearly three years been removing the remains of the great world's fair have formally turned the grounds over to the Jackson park commissioners. The only things which remain as a reminder of the grandeur are the Art palace and La Rabida convent, both of which are well preserved, the dilapidated German building and the badly soiled Statue of Liberty. The park commissioners will at once begin to restore the desolate ground to its former beauty as a park.

France Unpopular in Russia.

LONDON, May 25.—The Daily News publishes a dispatch from Moscow which says: Popular comments on the French mission are in no way flattering and the French alliance is strongly deplored by the lower classes, and even by the enlightened official classes, who have easily discovered that there is no depth of sincerity in the professed fellowship.

Food for the Starving.

St. Johns, N. F., May 25.—The wind is driving the ice in the whole northern coast, and hundreds of fishing craft, which have been waiting for a chance to reach St. Johns to procure their season's outfit, are now availing themselves of this opportunity. Steamers laden with provisions are also being dispatched to northern parts, where the people are almost starving.

Giving Troops a Job.

MILES CITY, Mont., May 25.—Through orders received from Washington, two companies have left Fort Coler for Cheyenne agency. The Indians are a little more restless this spring than usual, owing to continued promises which have been made year after year which have never been carried out, but nobody hereabouts has the slightest expectation of trouble.

Expelled Three Brokers.

DENVER, Colo., May 25.—The board of directors of the Colorado Mining Stock Exchange have expelled three brokers, Lorenzo Romms, W. L. Brentice and W. W. How, accused of having conspired to defraud the members of the exchange by giving a fictitious value to the Gregory gold stock. Losses of other members through the deal are estimated at \$9,000.

Ejecting the Squatters.

WEST SUPERIOR, Wis., May 25.—Pro-

ceedings have been instituted by the Northern Pacific to eject 35 squatters on Connor's point. These squatters are on property which the railroad claims is a part of its right of way. Some of these squatters have resided upon this property for many years and have grown to consider themselves permanently established.

Is 75 and Sues for Breach of Promise.

PITTSBURG, May 25.—Augusta Domagalka, aged 75 years, has entered suit against her son-in-law, Ludwig Sinder, aged 49 years, for breach of promise. The plaintiff alleges that her daughter, Mrs. Sinder, died last year, and a month later the defendant proposed marriage and was accepted. She asks for \$10,000 damages.

NEWS FROM WASHINGTON.

The house passed 58 pension bills Thursday.

Silver men oppose the early adjournment of congress.

Hancock's equestrian statue was unveiled at Washington.

Judge Lochren has qualified as United States district judge for Minnesota.

The senate will not investigate charges of election irregularities in Alabama.

Senator Nelson addressed the senate in opposition to the restriction of immigration.

The senate refused to allow Dupont a seat in the senate from Delaware by a vote of 31 to 30.

The treasury department has authorized the seal monopoly to take 30,000 male skins this year.

The confirmation of Napoleon T. J. Dana as first deputy commissioner of pensions will be opposed.

The Illinois delegation made a joint gift to Vice President Stevenson's daughter at her marriage.

The president has signed the act making provision for the deportation of Canadian Crees from Montana.

There is said to be some doubt whether the senate will confirm Tarsney as associate justice of Oklahoma.

No agreement has been or can be reached by the Republicans and Democrats of the senate finance committee on a bill to increase the revenues.

The house committee on interstate and foreign commerce ordered a favorable report on the Mahone Nicaragua canal bill, as amended by the subcommittee.

General Fitzhugh Lee, the newly appointed consul general to Havana, has arrived at Washington, and will prepare for his departure to Cuba as rapidly as practicable.

The river and harbor bill, as passed by the senate, carries \$76,000,000, of which \$12,000,000 is direct appropriations, and \$64,000,000 under the continuing contract system.

Presidential appointments: John Fowler of Massachusetts to be consul of the United States at Che Foo, China; Robert Lee Jenkins of North Carolina to be consul of the United States at Palos, Greece.

The house committee on judiciary has ordered a favorable report on the bill to establish a site for the erection of a penitentiary to cost not exceeding \$150,000 on the military reservation at Fort Leavenworth.

The department of agriculture has sent out circulars to its agents and animal inspectors to use their offices for the promotion of humane treatment of animals to be slaughtered for food, on the ground that abusive treatment detracts from the quality and value of the meat.

POLITICAL NEWS.

Wyoming Republicans endorse free silver.

West Virginia Republicans declared for McKinley.

The Idaho Republican convention declared for free silver.

Washington delegates to St. Louis are instructed for McKinley.

The Louisiana legislature declared the entire Democratic state ticket elected.

The Chicago labor congress has pronounced for Debs for president of the United States.

Ex-Governor Peck has been chosen chairman of the Wisconsin Democratic central committee.

Chauncey I. Filley bossed the Missouri Republican convention, turning down R. C. Korens.

Senator Murphy is said to have joined hands with Tammany Hall to fight Senator Hill of New York.

Adicks and Higgins factions will each have delegations from Delaware in the St. Louis convention.

The A. P. A. is at war over the question of participating in the presidential canvass, one faction being opposed.

Wisconsin Prohibitionists adopted free silver resolutions. The vote was a tie, the chairman casting the deciding ballot.

It is now said that Colorado Republicans have no intention of bolting the Republican nominees or platform at St. Louis.

Ninth Texas district Populists have

nominated Judge G. W. Glascock for congress against Colonel Joseph D. Sayers.

Teller leads the Colorado Republican delegation. No instructions, except to follow Teller's lead, were given to the delegates.

A member of the Wyoming Democratic convention caused a scene by introducing a protection resolution. The convention is free silver.

RAILROAD NEWS.

Sale of Northern Pacific properties will begin Aug. 1.

A railroad from Duluth to the Missouri river, in North Dakota, is projected.

The Great Western has cut freight rates between St. Paul and Chicago 5 cents per 100 pounds.

A convention to demand lower freight rates is to be held at Moorehead, Minn., four states to be represented.

The Green Bay, Wisconsin and St. Paul railway will not be absorbed by any other system, but will be operated by a new company.

NEWS OF NOTED PERSONS.

Sir John Millais, president of the Royal Academy, is in a critical condition.

United States Minister to Japan, Mr. Dunn, arrived at San Francisco by the steamer China. He is on a vacation and will visit his home in the East.

KILLED MANY INFANTS.

Notorious Mrs. Dyer Sentenced to Death in London.

LONDON, May 25.—The woman Dyer, who has been on trial on the charge of murdering numerous infants entrusted to her care, has been sentenced to death. She was arrested at Reading, together with her son-in-law, a man named Palmer, charged with having strangled to death a number of infants whose bodies were recovered from the Thames weighted down with bricks. The coroner has been puzzled for some time by the extraordinary large number of infants' bodies found in the Thames between Wapping and Battersea. It was impossible to trace the murder of all those thus found to Mrs. Dyer and Palmer, but it has been suspected that they were responsible for a large number of the deaths of the children thus found.

Official's Take Action.

Filibuster Steamer Three Friends Escorted Outside the Three-Mile Limit.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., May 25.—As a result of telegrams that have passed between Collector Bisbee and the treasury department the steamer Three Friends will be escorted beyond the 3-mile limit by the revenue cutter Boutwell. This presumably is done to prevent the steamer taking men on board. The Three Friends has a large cargo of arms, ammunition and coal and provisions sufficient for a long voyage. Captain Broward, her commander gives Key West as her destination.

The steamer Laurada arrived at the bar but left again for sea. She landed her cargo and men successfully on the coast of Cuba last Tuesday.

THE TURKS SURROUNDED.

The Situation in Crete Said to Be Very Serious.

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 25.—The news from Crete is of the gravest character. The Turkish troops in the district of Sphakia are surrounded by insurgents, who are being aided by the inhospitables.

LONDON, May 25.—A dispatch to The Times from Athens says the successes of the Cretan insurgents have caused a panic among the Turkish rural population, which is fleeing to the towns of the Island of Crete for refuge thus constituting a great danger of stirring the dormant fanaticism of the Turkish population in the towns, which is greatly in excess of the Christian population.

MADISON, Wis., May 25.—The supreme court has handed down a decision in the case of The State vs. William French, who, in March, 1891, shot Gavin M. Steele at Ashland. Insanity was French's defense.
