SHERIDAN BRIEFS.

Alias Summons.

IN the district court of the Fifth judicial district of the state of Montana, in and for the county of Madison.

Henry Elling, plaintiff vs. Frederick J. Robinson and Mary Robinson, defendants. Alias summons. Action brought in the district court of the Fifth judicial district of the state of Montana, in and for the county of Madison, and the complaint filed in said county of Madison in the office of the clerk of said district court.

The state of Montana sends greeting to the above named defendants:

You are hereby summoned to answer the complaint in this action which is filed in the office of the clerk of this court, a copy of which is herewith served upon you, and to file your answer and serve a copy thereof upon the plaintiff's attorney within twenty days after the service of this summons, exclusive of the day of service; and in case of your failure to appear or answer, judgment will be taken against you by default for the relief demanded in the complaint.

Said action is brought for the purpose of obtaining a judgment and decree of the court foreclosing a certain mortgage given upon the following described property, to-wit: north-east quarter of section 26, in township 2 south, range 6 west, Montana meridian, and appurtenances, given to secure the payment of a certain promissory note, executed and delivered by the defendant to the plaintiff, bearing date of September 28th 1888, for the sum of \$520 with interest at the rate of one and one-half per cent. per month, due one year from date, and to obtain a judgment for the amount due on said note, to-wit: the sum of \$520 with interest thereon at the rate of one and one-half per cent. per month, from March 28th, 1890, and the costs of suit, also to obtain judgment for the sum of \$28.44, taxes paid by plaintiff on said mortgaged premises, on January 20th, 1893, for the sum of \$10.67, taxes paid on said mortgaged premises December 1st, 1893, for \$5.99, taxes paid on said premises December 1st, 1894, and \$5.55, taxes paid on said premises December 1, 1895, with interest on the respective sums from their respective dates at the rate of one and one-half per cent. per month, and a decree that the property be sold to satisfy said mortgage, judgment and taxes and costs, as will more fully appear from the verified complaint on file herein to which reference is hereby made.
