the remark was made though imperfectly stated—which gave the excuse to the Miner to place upon it the unfair and unwarranted construction of my having "disdained" the aid of democrats and "offered gratuitous insult" to them.

I am constrained to believe that the "vaulting ambition" of my friend Quinn has rather "o'erleaped itself." He is also a candidate for congress. Permit me to say to him in all kindness that he will not do his candidacy any good by adopting unfair methods with his adversaries.

His own self-respect and the confidence and esteem of the public will be secured and retained much more surely by adopting a course marked by fairness and fidelity at all times, and by a courage which does not waver when the supreme test comes.

After all is said, of what importance are the political fortunes of any one man, except as they may tend to promote the success of the great cause upon which depends the welfare of the entire people.

At the present time it happens to be my lot to represent Montana in the lower house of congress. It is but just and proper, in view of the recent unfair utterances of the Miner, that I publicly acknowledge my obligations to the people and press, but with few exceptions of all parties, of Montana for the generous treatment which they have uniformly extended to me while it has been my fortune to serve them in a representative capacity.

Should the fortunes of the campaign find my friend Quinn and myself pitted against each other as opposing candidates for congress, I shall devote my time and attention to furthering the cause of silver as best I may be able in states where such work is required.

Neither honor I can afford to waste our time in petty bickerings or sparring or cunning attempts to create animosities against each other. The battle of bimetalism is on. It is far above the petty strifes of individuals for place. It is the battle of the standards. Upon the result depends the salvation of the producers and wage earners of this country. There should be no contention in our ranks. By the united efforts of all bimetalists of all parties in the nation the cause will surely win. I sincerely hope that the splendid ability of my friend Quinn will hereafter be directed exclusively to the support of the cause of which he is so able and distinguished a champion, and of which I am an humble advocate. I do not believe the people of Montana are as much concerned as to who shall represent them in congress as they are in the success of the silver cause in the nation.

Whoever is elected to represent us in congress, we know he will be a loyal advocate of the free coinage of silver. Should Mr. Quinn or any other staunch friend of silver be declared the choice of our people for that high position, no

one will be more willing than I to give him what assistance may be in my power for the furtherance of the success of this great cause.
