

# THE NEW MAHATMA.

THEOSOPHISTS SAY HE IS W. Q. JUDGE'S SUCCESSOR.

**He Is to Be Invisible—Thought Waves Would Kill Him Were He Known—He's a Real Smart One, Though, and Knows a Thing or Two.**

The theosophists have got a new mahatma, or initiate or adept, or leader. Furthermore, it has been discovered that he is right here in New York. The theosophists at the headquarters in Madison avenue will not announce in so many words that he is in New York, but it is plain from their conversation that he is. He is a foreigner, though. He is not to become known to men as yet. Indeed, only a few of the elect are to know of his identity for the next twelve months.

It may seem to the world at large an odd thing for the theosophists to have an invisible leader after they have had two leaders so much in evidence as Mme. Blavatsky and William Q. Judge, but so it is. They had an option on a visible leader, for Mrs. Annie Besant is still alive and has often been talked of as Judge's successor, but however guarded the theosophists are in their conversation as to the real identity of the new leader, they are strenuous in their demands that Mrs. Besant is or could be in the place held by Mr. Judge. She is going off on another tangent, it is said, and is trying to swerve the theosophists off to a Hindu movement and to form a society solely for the discussion of esoteric problems. This the genuine theosophists will have none of.

"When a reporter went to Mr. Claude H. Wright to ask for further information about the prospects of the Theosophical society and about their new leader, Mr. Wright was not inclined to give very many particulars.

"The announcement made in this morning's paper," he said, "is substantially correct, wherever you got it, but there is not very much as to detail that I can give you."

"Do you know the new leader?" Mr. Wright was asked.

"I have knowledge of him," he replied.

"Is he here?"

"That I cannot say."

"Is he a native or a foreigner?"

"He is a foreigner."

"Man, woman or child?"

"I refuse to answer."

"Is he to be at the convention?"

"No, for that would involve his becoming known, and that must not be."

"The convention is to be held in the Madison Square Garden concert hall on Monday, April 26. Although Mr. Wright does not like to acknowledge that the place of meeting of the convention had been changed from Chicago to this city at the dictation of the new leader, he admitted that it was done at the leader's suggestion.

The reason ascribed for the year of ignominy of the new leader is a curious one. Mr. Wright said: "If he were known, the tremendous thought waves that would come at him from all over the world would in his sensitive condition kill him, just as they killed the late Judge and Mme. Blavatsky. On the other hand, if knowledge of his identity is deferred for awhile there will be less curiosity and the thought waves will have become settled. Moreover, he will have time to form psychic connections with many pupils and thus enable himself to work with freedom."

Of his power to make these connections Mr. Wright had no doubt. "I know him to be of great power and attainments," he said. "I know that at this present moment he can tell the character of every person in the society, although they are all unknown to him, and that he can tell whether any one is for or against him as a leader. He can tell also their status and their mental, psychic and spiritual condition. I have had a very strong personal demonstration of these powers in the new adept."

The society is fortunate in having in this new leader one of better health than his predecessors, for notwithstanding the great powers of mind worshiped and developed by the theosophists Mr. Wright admits that health is essential to great leadership. Mr. Wright added: "He has more vigor and opportunity than Mme. Blavatsky had or more than Judge had in his last years. By using opportunity I mean that the time is coming soon when the world will have a striking demonstration of the new adept, and of the fact that the society has a special work to do. I don't see just why we have been laughed at so much. Laughter does no harm and I suppose it will continue for a time in spite of Roentgen's demonstration of things unknown. To those who are at all able to stand it the demonstration will be clear. And it will come soon."

"And what about the rest of the people?" the reporter asked.

"For the others they will have to get on," said Mr. Wright. "Of course to students it will be the clearer."

"Can you speak of the character of the coming demonstration, Mr. Wright?"

"It will be a demonstration of the existence of the soul," he answered, "and, secondly, of the fact that matter as we now know it is not all that is

seems; thirdly, of the fact that man possesses higher powers than ordinary mentality; fourthly and finally, that there are human beings, living men, possessing developments and ability far beyond the average mortal man, and, further, that development to such a point of perfection is possible to all."

Mr. Wright said that while perhaps not all that had been written about Judge was true, yet he, Mr. Wright, believed that Judge had unquestionably the power of a high adept; that he was in communication with the initiates—the theosophists like that word better than mahatmas—and that he possessed powers of mind far beyond those of ordinary men.—New York Sun.

## NEWS OF THE WEEK.

### NEWS FROM WASHINGTON.

An examination for superintendent of construction of fish hatcheries will be held Sept. 15.

A commission has been appointed to treat with Crows and Flatheads of Montana for a cession of their lands.

The government is in need of kindergarten for Indian schools. Civil service examination will be held Sept. 18.

Judge John E. Carland has been appointed United States judge for South Dakota and Charles F. Amidon is named for a similar office in North Dakota.

### POLITICAL NEWS.

Fusion failed in West Virginia.

Wisconsin Democrats, free silver men and Populists have fused.

John C. Sheehan, the Tammany Hall leader, has declared for Bryan.

Mr. Bryan has been formally notified of his nomination by the silver party.

Mr. Bryan is reported as saying he is satisfied with the outlook in the East.

Democrats carried Arkansas by increased majorities over two years ago.

President Cleveland declines to say anything regarding the Indianapolis ticket.

Vermont Republicans elected their entire state ticket by largely increased majorities.

Vey Holman of Maine will run the literary bureau of the National Democratic party.

The nominees of the Indianapolis convention will be formally notified at Louisville Sept. 12.

Ex-Secretary Hoke Smith will make four speeches in Georgia in behalf of the regular Democratic ticket.

Mr. Bryan addressed a great concourse of workmen at Sharpshooters Park, Chicago, on Labor Day.

District Attorney Perry of Kansas was taken to task for denouncing Democratic-Populist fusion in that state.

At the New Hampshire Republican convention George A. Ramsdell was

nominated for governor by acclamation.

Middle of the road Populists have issued a call for a state convention to nominate Bryan and Watson electors for Kansas.

Judge Bundy of the Tenth Wisconsin district, has refused the Democratic congressional nomination, because of dissensions in the party.

Congressman John C. Bell has been unanimously renominated by the Populist congressional convention for the Second district of Colorado.

General John C. Black has declined the nomination of the gold Democrats of Illinois for governor, principally for the reason that his election is impossible.

The Democratic majority in Arkansas elections will probably reach 70,000, or about double the majority of two years ago. The vote polled was the heaviest in the history of the state.

The national silver committee has ordered and is getting out 10,000,000 documents, which are being distributed at the rate of 250,000 a day. The national Democratic committee is also distributing 2,000,000 documents.

Senator John M. Palmer of Illinois and General S. B. Buckner of Kentucky were nominated for president and vice president, respectively, by the sound money Democrats, and a vigorous honest money platform adopted.

### FOREIGN NEWS.

Spain is threatened with another Carlist uprising.

The outbreak in the Philippine islands is growing more serious.

Southern England reports a largely increased yield of wheat.

The czar and czarina met the emperor and empress of Germany at Breslau Saturday.

More conspiracies against the Spanish government by Philippine Islanders have been discovered.

The advance upon Dongola has begun by the starting of the Third brigade for Absarat, from Kosheh.

Luis Payrol Martinez, a member of an expedition landed by the steamer Three Friends, was executed at Havana.

New York Herald's Havana special says insurgents seized a Spanish convoy and killed or captured the entire force of 300 men.

The Italian government has demanded an indemnity from the porte for the massacre of Italian subjects in Constantinople.

The czar and czarina have started for Breslau, where they will meet Emperor William of Germany and witness a portion of the military manoeuvres.

Herr Krupp, the gun manufacturer, has dismissed all foreign workmen and officials from his employ on the ground of betrayal of secrets to foreign governments.

The steamers Buenos Ayres and San Fernando have arrived at Havana with another detachment of troops for Cuba, consisting of 109 officers and 8,980 men.

The Crete assembly, after consulting with the revolutionary committee, has accepted the reform plans drawn up by the powers and approved by the sultan of Turkey.

Premier Greenway states that the report that the Manitoba government has agreed to settle the school question in return for the gift of the portfolio of the interior to Attorney General Difton is absolutely false.
