

# THE WEEK IN VIRGINIA

## HAPPENINGS OF A LOCAL NATURE.

A Record of the Happenings of the Past Seven Days—The Doings of Virginians Personal and General Matters.

Court will open next Monday. Jerry Harrington of Laurin is in the city today.

John S. Allen visited Helena this week on business.

John Staudaher, of Sheridan, was in the city Tuesday.

John T. Saylor, the Twin Bridges cattle king, is in the city.

Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Closser have returned from a two week's sojourn in Anaconda.

Rev. Smith will hold regular service in the Methodist church Sunday night at 7:30 o'clock.

Hon. W. A. Clark, member elect of the house of representatives, accompanied by his mother, departed for Bozeman, Wednesday.

Commissioner George Cope came up from Sheridan Thursday to represent his district in the official canvass of the returns of the recent election.

The regular quarterly examination of teachers will be held on the 20th and 21st of this month instead of the 20th and 31st, as erroneously advertised.

Henry Kammerer, of this city, has signed a contract to play professional ball, as catcher of J. J. Hill's team next season, and will leave for St. Paul in the early spring.

President Mountjoy of the literary society has decided to reconstitute that lively organization of last winter, and a call is published, over his signature, in another column of this paper.

Big Hole made a record as the banner Democratic precinct. Ten ballots were cast for Smith, Spiegler, Hogan, Nolan, Collins, Poindester, Buck, Judge Parker, M. Duncan and Birchard. Bryan electors stood 9 to 0, as did the balance except a few local candidates.

Hon. L. C. Fyhrle, one of Dillon's most indefatigable business men and whose public spirit has been the motive power in many of Dillon's enterprises, was in the city this week, accompanied by Rene Curin, superintendent of the gold dredging plant at Ban-  
nack.

County attorney Callaway was called to Gaylord Wednesday to appear for the county against one Thomas Perrot, charged with having burglarized a Gaylord saloon. The case was tried before Justice Patrick Carney, and resulted in the acquittal of Perrot, on account of insufficiency of evidence.

On the first page of the MAMMONSIAN this week will be found the result of the official canvass of the returns of the election week, which the canvassing board did Thursday. It is absolutely correct—a copy of the official table at the court house, and all who take an interest in electoral matters of the county should cut it out and keep it for future reference.

W. B. Millard, of the Kennett, left for Omaha Monday, after a three day's sojourn in Virginia. He will return in May from which time on he expects to push development work on this property. His father, J. B. Millard, who was one of the pioneer bankers of Alder gulch and who built the banking house now occupied by Messrs Hall & Bennett, expects to spend some time in Virginia next summer.

Governor-Elect Robert B. Smith will probably visit Virginia next week, as he is interested in a number of cases which will come up for hearing at the present term of the district court. "Bob" Smith is always welcome to the ancient capital, where his popularity is not limited to race, color, or previous condition of servitude—everyone likes him; and as the chosen chief executive of our commonwealth, he is doubly welcome. It is quite probable and highly probable, that some demonstration will be given in honor of him.

Fairweather Tent, K. O. T. M., of this city decided last night, to give a grand public ball at armory hall Thanksgiving evening. The committee in charge consists of Ira French, Dr. LeRoy Southmayd, Dennis Mahagan and Oscar Sedman, to represent the younger element, and James Powell representing the old married men. A resolution to the effect that any Sir Knight enjoying single blessedness, who failed to materialize at the dance with a young lady under his protection, should be fined 50 cents, was adopted. The ball will undoubtedly be a very pleasant affair, and will be largely attended.

The attention of persons having claims against Madison county is called to the following order, made Dec. 13, 1894, by the board of county commissioners: "The business of the board having been heretofore hindered and delayed by the presentation of bills and claims against the county, during the session of the board: It is therefore ordered, that at future sessions of the

board, no bills or accounts shall be examined or paid upon, unless the same shall have been presented and filed on or before the first day of the session of the board, and the clerk is authorized to make due publication of this order.

Frederick Sheldon, the victim of the Twin Bridges tarring episode, had a preliminary hearing before Justice McGowan on a charge of perjury, preferred by county attorney Callaway, and was discharged. W. A. Clark appeared for Sheldon. It seems that there was some conflict in the testimony given by Sheldon at the preliminary hearing of the men charged with having tarred Sheldon. In a deposition, taken before notary A. J. Wilcomb he made some conflicting statements, and the charge of perjury was preferred. Justice McGowan held that Sheldon was having more than his share of trouble and discharged him.

George A. Shufeldt has brought suit against George Farnsworth, owner of the Fortune group of mines, to recover the sum of \$3,400, which Mr. Shufeldt alleged in his complaint is due him on the following grounds: In May of this year, the plaintiff alleges that Mr. Farnsworth authorized Shufeldt to sell the Fortune group, for which he agreed to allow him reasonable compensation and expenses. The same month Shufeldt brought from St. Paul, Philip Shufeldt, who agreed to purchase the property for \$15,000, which the plaintiff alleges was \$5,000 more than the defendant asked, and Farnsworth declined to sell and still continues to do so. Shufeldt considers \$3,000 reasonable compensation and commission for his services, and alleges that his expenses in the transaction were \$400. He asks for judgment for \$3,400, R. B. Smith and Julian A. Knight are his attorneys.

NOTICE is hereby given that the board of county commissioners of Madison county, Montana, will, at its regular December, 1894, session, receive, and it hereby invites sealed proposals for the care, support and maintenance of the sick, poor and infirm of the said county, for the term ending on the first day of January, 1895, such proposals to include and cover the entire cost of provisions and clothing for and nursing of the sick, poor and infirm, and all burial expenses that may occur during said term.

Sealed proposals are also invited at said December, 1894, session, from resident practicing physicians of said county, to furnish medical attendance and medical and surgical treatment to the sick, and infirm poor of said county and such persons as may be confined in the county jail during the calendar year 1895. Such attendance and treatment to include attendance upon and medical and surgical treatment of such sick and infirm poor and persons that may be confined in the county jail, whether affected with contagious or infectious diseases of otherwise.

The board also invites proposals, at said session, for furnishing medicines for the sick and infirm poor and such persons as may be confined in the county jail for said year 1895.

Such proposals must be addressed to the clerk of the board, plainly marked so as to designate what the proposal is for, and must be filed with such clerk on or before the first Monday in December, 1894. The contracts, if awarded, will be let to the lowest responsible bidder.

The board reserves the right to reject the proposal of any person whom they deem unsuitable as a contractor, or to reject any or all proposals.

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
