or Wednesday probably, and they  
will be promptly confirmed."—

## OHIO COUNTY CHILD MEETS AWFUL FATE.

Wheeling, W. Va., Dec. 27.—  
During the absence of her mother,  
who went to the spring with a buck-  
et of hot water to thaw the ice,  
Ethel Loginson, aged four, daughter  
of Oscar Loginson, a wealthy farmer  
and stock raiser of Fork Ridge, drop-  
ped her Teddy bear, a Christmas  
gift in the fire in the parlor and  
while attempting to rescue her toy,  
her clothing ignited and burned the  
child to death. Her father who had  
been to school to bring his son home  
in a sleigh, found his child cremated  
with the Teddy bear clasped in her  
hands. When the mother returned  
she fainted and the husband found  
her near the dead body of her child.  
The mother is still in a serious con-  
dition.
