INSURGENTS

ARE RAMPANT—CHAIRMAN LLOYD IN WASHINGTON.

Washington, Aug. 6.—Chairman James Lloyd, of the Democratic Congressional Committee, is just back from the Pacific coast and States between here and the Mississippi river and brings with him words of encouragement for the Democratic party. Not only does he predict Democratic gains in Kansas and other middle western States but he asserts that the wave of disapproval of the Republican administration and Congress has reached the Pacific coast.

"The Democrats will capture three Congressional districts in California and will elect the next Governor of that State," said Mr. Lloyd.

"Insurgency," added Mr. Lloyd, "is rampant throughout the middle West. It is impossible to see how things could be growing worse and faster for the Republicans. One of the most encouraging things for Democrats is that the feeling between the two wings of the Republican party is so bitter that the Regulars would rather see Democrats elected than to suffer defeat at the hands of the Insurgents."

Mr. Lloyd says in his own State, Missouri, the Insurgents are strong and have been controlling some of the conventions, while he predicts that Kansas will follow the example of Iowa in rebuking President Taft.

Refusing to give out figures, Mr. Lloyd clearly indicates in all he says that he expects a large Democratic majority in the next House of Representatives.

It appearing to the board of education that the total valuation of all the taxable property in this district according to the last assessment thereof, is \$322,280, being real estate to the value of \$18,415 personal property to the value of \$5,313 and railroad and other property assessed by the board of public works to the value of \$40,683 as certified to this board by the Assessor, and it appearing from the foregoing estimates that it is necessary to raise by levy, after deducting all credits, \$200.36 for building purposes and \$918.35 for teachers purposes. It is determined that a levy on each One Hundred Dollars valuation of 25 cents for building purposes and 25 cents for teachers purposes will be necessary to produce the estimated amounts as aforesaid for the ensuing fiscal year.

NOTICE OF ELECTION.

At a meeting of the Board, of Education of Hartford Independent District on the 9th day of August, 1910 the following order was entered: It appearing to the Board, that the maximum rate of levy authorized by law will not produce sufficient funds for the current fiscal year to cover the expenditures.

That there will be needed for the Teachers fund \$262 38 in addition to the sum to be raised by the maximum levy aforesaid and the same for the Building fund making a total of \$524 76 that the aggregate amount of taxable property in the district is \$262 389 and that it will be necessary to levy ten cents on each one hundred dollars thereof for each of said funds in addition to the maximum rate of levy as aforesaid in order to produce the additional amount estimated herein to be needed.

It is therefore ordered that the question as to such additional levy for two years be submitted to the voters of this district at an election to be held at the usual place of voting on the 22 day of August 1910 as provided by law.

Said election to be held, and conducted in the manner required by law.

REMOVE PART OF EYE.

Philadelphia, August 9. — One of the most delicate and surgeons operation known to modern surgery was performed successfully for the first time at a hospital here when a portion of cornea, the transparent film enveloping the eye, was removed from the eyeball of a man employed at Baldwin's Locomotive Works, whose eye was permanently destroyed by a silver of steel.

After removing the diseased film the trephined piece was transplanted to the eye of a woman who had been blind from infancy. One of her eyes had been removed and she could not see with the other, it being effected with meconatorum, the cornea becoming clouded and absolutely opaque.

She can now readily distinguish object a few feet away, and the surgeons believe her sight will gradually become stronger.
