

Later from Mexico. New Orleans, Sept. 21. Dates from the city of Mexico to the 31st of August have been received. A decree has been published extending the contract time for building the Tehuantepec railroad to nine years. The Government were to have two fifths of the stocks, proposals were to be received on the 30th ult. The New York Herald, commenting upon the late news from Mexico, says the general aspect of affairs in that distracted country is, if possible, far more serious and perplexing than ever. Although little has been heard of Santa Anna for some time, it is now apparent that he is quietly but busily engaged in directing most of the insurrectionary movements against the Government. He is liberally the barometer of Mexican politics—rising with the clouds and disappearing with the storm. It is currently reported that some of the leading men in Yucatan are zealously endeavoring to secure the annexation of that territory to the United States.

Window Sash.—Putty is down—it is no longer needed—an improvement in the setting of glass has been effected which dispenses with it. The sash is of wood, the outside permanent. The inside is framed in such a manner that the bars can be readily removed for the purpose of inserting the glass, which is placed between slips of India rubber, which, when the parts of the sash are replaced, causes the glass to be perfectly firm. The moveable parts of the sash are secured to their place by a knob-screw, which makes a pretty finish.

The authorities of Ripley refused to assist the claimants of the negroes to recover their property, and considerable indignation at their course was manifested.
