Bodies of All But J. W. Fiddler

HAVE BEEN FOUND IN THE OHIO RIVER AND SHIPPED FOR BURIAL.

PARKERSBURG, Sept. 23.—The bodies of two more victims of the explosion of the launch Blanche M. near Gallipolis, Monday evening, were recovered, and but one remains in the waters of the Ohio. The bodies recovered were the remains of Edward Brake and J. C. Simmons, of Harrisville. The body still unaccounted for is that of J. Willis Fiddler.

Prosecuting Attorney S. M. Hoff, of Harrisville, has been on the scene directing the work of searching for the bodies. Last night he sent a long distance telephone message, stating that the body of J. C. Simmons, of Harrisville, druggist, has been found five miles below Huntington, and 44 miles below the scene of the tragedy, securely lodged on the dikes, which had been built there of stone to prevent a change in the course of the stream.
