around the polling places.
One arrest of a wet voter was made for illegal voting and others will be made tomorrow.

Steuenville, with 90 saloons, went 648 wet. Mingo, with 26 saloons, went 55 wet. Toronto, with fifteen saloons, went 66 dry. Dillonville, with 24 saloons, went 84 wet. Grover, with four saloons, went seven dry. Amsterdam, with three saloons, went nine dry. The country districts rolled up one-sided dry majorities.

Three Other Counties Vote.
COLUMBUS, O., Nov. 24.—Sandusky county, of which Fremont is the county seat, in the northern part of the State, voted out, 47 saloons with an unofficial dry majority of 550. Fremont, with 26 saloons, went wet by 246. Clyde, with six saloons, went dry by 240. Only two precincts in Fremont went dry. The dries carried 20 out of 37 precincts in the county.

Huron county went wet by 34 majority, after an exciting local option campaign. The city of Norwalk went wet by 490; Chicago Junction dry by 150; Bellevue, wet by 115; New London, dry by 196; Greenwich, dry by 87; Plymouth, wet by 14.

Clermont county was carried by the "dries" by a majority of 972. Fifteen saloons were voted out. All of the larger towns and the county voted dry. The wets carried only five of the fourteen townships, and these were in sections where there were saloons.
